Course Description:

How do individuals make choices? In economics, it is standard to assume that individuals are perfectly rational, self interested utility maximizers with unlimited cognitive abilities. What does this mean and is it true? In many cases, this standard model provides a good approximation to the types of behavior that economists are interested in. However, psychologists, experimental and behavioral economists have documented ways in which the standard model fails to explain people's choices. The goal of this course is to understand how individuals make choices and their implications.

In total, there will be around 8-10 in class quizzes so that each quiz takes 4-5% of the final grade. Each quiz takes around 15 mins.

In terms of the research project, students are expected to write a 10–15 page research paper on one of the topics covered in the course. The paper could be the outline of a new model, the description of a new an experiment, or an application of the models that we study in class in order to explain some real life phenomena. This can be a group project, which consists of at most three students. You can definitely work on it alone. At the end of the semester, each group will do a presentation of 8-10 mins. Everyone in the same group will receive the same grade.
