Study guide for Macroeconomics by Paul Krugman and Robyn Wells is a helpful source for practice problems and additional reviews. This guide is entirely optional.

Course Description and Objectives: Macroeconomics is the study of aggregate economic variables, the economy as a whole. This is in contrast to microeconomics, the study of the economic behavior of individual consumers, firms, and industries. We will study how economists model the relationships between aggregate economic variables and examine how various fiscal and monetary policies can affect the results. The main goal of this class will be to improve your economic literacy and ability to apply economic models to analyze world events.

Prerequisites: Principles of Microeconomics (Econ 2010). Students should be familiar with the concepts of supply and demand and have some experience using equations, graphs, and tables to analyze economic situations.

Lectures: In lecture, new material will be presented that will follow topics from the textbook, but may differ in emphasis. **All students are expected to attend lecture regularly.** Besides all the obvious reasons to attend lecture, some exam questions may not be covered in the text but only covered in lecture. In the off chance that you miss a lecture, you should get lecture notes from a fellow student, if they are willing to share. I don't give students my notes as they are only outlines of topics to discuss and will not be of much help to you.
