Course Description and Objectives:

This course will provide an overview of macroeconomic issues: the determination of output, employment, unemployment, interest rates, and inflation. Monetary and fiscal policies are discussed, as are public debt and international economic issues. It introduces basic models of macroeconomics and illustrates principles with the experience of the United States and other economies.

Course Level & Prerequisites:

Macroeconomics cannot be well understood without some grounding in microeconomics. You should have completed and successfully passed Principles of Microeconomics (Econ 2010). If you have not yet done so, you must see me during the first week of classes. You should also be comfortable with high school level algebra (i.e., solve simple simultaneous equations graphically and algebraically) and geometry (i.e., drawing and manipulating graphs). I will not spend any class time on review of microeconomic concepts or basic math skills.

Recitation:

Attending recitation is required. Recitation serves to bridge the gap between the theory presented in class and problems you will see on exams. It also provides you with an opportunity to ask questions in a smaller setting to facilitate the understanding of challenging concepts/problems. Your TA will describe his/her grading policy and what is expected of you during your first recitation.

Grading:

Your grade will consist of three exams, a cumulative final exam, recitation and homework assignments. Each portion of your grade will be weighted as follows:
