TEXTBOOKS

Besanko, David, and Ronald R. Braeutigam, Microeconomics, 4th Edition, Wiley Publishing is the required textbook for the course. *It is recommended that you wait till the first day of classes to purchase the textbook.* In addition, you may purchase as an optional supplement, A Cartoon Introduction to Economics: Microeconomics by Yoram Bauman and Grady Klein.

COURSE OVERVIEW

This course introduces a theoretical framework to model the behavior of individual decision makers. The course is divided into three parts: preferences and consumer behavior; decision making by firms; and interaction of firms and consumers in markets. We will consider three market structures: perfect competition, monopoly and oligopoly. The techniques covered in this course will be essential for anyone intending to pursue field courses in economics including, but not limited to, industrial organization, international trade, labor and environmental economics.

Prerequisites

- 1. Economics prerequisites: ECON 1000 or 2010
- 2. Mathematics prerequisites: ECON 1078 & ECON 1088 or MATH 1300 or MATH 1310 or MATH 1081 or MATH 1080 & 1090 & 1100 or APPM 1350 or equivalent. The material covered in this course requires basic calculus. It will be assumed that every student has a working knowledge of calculus. The mathematics prerequisites will be strictly enforced and you may be administratively dropped from the class if you do not meet them.

GRADING

Your course grade will be calculated as follows:

25% (Midterm 1) + 25% (Midterm 2) + 40% (Final) + 10% (Article Analysis)

LECTURES

Attendance will be taken daily. If you miss 7 or more of the scheduled class meetings, your course grade will be automatically lowered two levels (e.g. if you get a B+ but have missed 7 or more classes, your grade will be lowered to a B-). These absences are

intended to cover both valid (illness, family emergency) and invalid reasons for missing class. I reserve the right to record an absence for a student who spends class time on non-class activities e.g. sleeping, texting or surfing the internet.

You are responsible for all information covered in class lectures. **I do not post or give out my notes**. If you miss a class, you should be able to get the notes from one of your classmates. You are encouraged to come to my office hours to discuss the material you missed, but you must first obtain and go over the notes.

Please review the material covered in the previous lecture before coming to class.

Full participation in class activities is expected.

PRACTICE PROBLEM SETS

Practice problem sets will be periodically posted on the course website. These will NOT be graded and are for your practice only. It is highly recommended that you do all the practice problem sets.

EXAMS

Each exam will be composed of two sections: a multiple-choice section and a short answer section. Please bring a #2 pencil and a non-graphing/non-scientific/non-financial calculator to the exam (a ruler is also recommended). If you bring a graphing calculator or cell phone calculator to the exam, 10 points will be deducted from your grade on that exam.

Midterm exams will not be cumulative. Exam material will be based on the lecture notes, articles and practice problem sets. I will announce before each exam the topics that will be included.

Midterm 1 will take place on **Thursday, February 17**th and midterm 2 will take place on **Thursday, April 7**th. Midterm exams will be held in the usual classroom during lecture time. **The final exam will be cumulative** and will take place on **Tuesday, May 3**rd from **4:30 p.m. to 7:00 p.m.** It will be held in the usual classroom.

There will be **no extra credit opportunities**.

Note: If you have 3 or more final exams on the same day, you are entitled to arrange an alternative exam time for the **last** exam scheduled on that day. To qualify for rescheduling final exam times, you must provide evidence that you have 3 or more exams on the same day, and you must make arrangements **no later than Friday, February 18**th, **2011**.

ARTICLE ANALYSIS

Article analysis constitutes 10% of your course grade. There will be 3 articles out of which the best 2 will count towards your grade. The schedule of when articles are due is given below.
