Required Textbook: Microeconomics with MyLab, 9th Edition, by Pindyck and Rubinfeld, Pearson Publishing, ISBN 9780134153988. Students are required to have access to MyLab (which includes an eBook) at a minimum and can optionally choose to purchase a paper text. MyLab is where you will read your textbook and complete graded assignments. You will access MyLab through our course website on Canvas.

Prerequisites: ECON 2010 and ECON 1088 or MATH 1081 or MATH 1300 or MATH 1310 or APPM1350 or FENC 2010 (all min grade C-)

Course Description: This course introduces the theoretical framework for analyzing the economic behavior of individual decision-makers, such as consumers, workers, and firms. The course will be divided into 3 parts. The first will be an introduction to microeconomics, along with a review of supply and demand. The second part will be a discussion of consumer and firm behavior in competitive markets, along with an analysis of these markets. In the final part of this course, we will relax some of the assumptions built into our model of competitive markets and consider cases where these assumptions do not hold.

- Grades will be uploaded to canvas as assignments are graded.
- I will not curve any individual assignment or quiz, but I may apply a curve at the end of the course.

Recitation

- Recitation is designed to be a low stake learning environment where you get guided practice and group work. It is extremely valuable.
- There is no separate recitation score.
- While recitation is not explicitly included in the score for the course, failure to regularly participate in recitation will result in your letter grade in the course dropping.
- Your TA has complete authority to set the standard for sufficient participation.

Early Module Assignment

- These are low stakes Canvas quizzes designed to refresh and stimulate your mind in preparation for the week's material.
- The assignments are short, so you only have 30 minutes to complete them. You get two tries for each quiz.
- Your two lowest assignment scores are dropped
- There will be an assignment due **before Tuesday**'s class every week, including exam weeks, starting 1/18/2021.
- Working in groups on these is encouraged.

MyLab Assignment (Homework)

- These are medium stakes online curated assignments done through Pearson MyLab.
- Starting 1/29/2020 these assignments will be due every week Friday at 11:00 pm MT.
- Each week I will post the homework assignment and the practice assignment.
- The practice assignment is worth no points and can be submitted at any time (ignore the due date for the practice assignment).
- You only get **one attempt per graded assignment**, but some **questions** allow two attempts.
- Working in groups on these is encouraged.

Exams

- We will have 3 midterms.
- The midterms are taken during class on 2/18/2021, 3/18/2021, 4/22/2021.
- If you will not be able to take a midterm for **university sponsored content**, you **must** meet with me at the **start of the semester**.
- Final: The final is cumulative. It will have a similar format to the midterms.
- Final: Date TBD
- Both: Midterms and the final are designed for the student to take individually. Students cannot seek outside help, use their notes, or search the internet for answers.
