Course Description:

This course is designed as an introduction to statistics and econometrics. For many of you, this may be your first course in statistics. As a result, one of the main goals of the course is to cover a broad range of concepts and techniques, as well as applications of these concepts. We will make use of Microsoft Excel at various points throughout the course; however, this class is primarily a statistics course, not a computer applications course.

Prerequisites:

Econ 1000 or 2010-2020 and Econ 1078-1088 or equivalent math courses

Textbook:

The Basic Practice of Statistics (4th Edition) by David S. Moore

Technical Requirements:

We will use Microsoft Excel, which is available in all campus computer labs, including the one in the basement of the Economics building. You may find a graphing calculator (such as TI-83 or 84) useful, but I am not going to require that you have one.
