Expectations

This course is intended to give you an in-depth look at topics in macroeconomics. It will provide you with the tools necessary to be able to converse intelligently on current, past and future macroeconomic events and to be able to derive and solve macroeconomic models.

Prerequisites

Economics prerequisites: ECON 1000 or 2020 or equivalent Math prerequisites: ECON 1078 and 1088, or MATH 1300, or MATH 1310 or MATH 1081 or MATH 1080, 1090 and 1100, or APPM 1350 or equivalent.

Textbook

The textbook for the class will be Charles Jones' *Macroeconomics*. The text is intended to be supplementary to lectures and is required. Additional readings are listed below and web links or full text will be posted on CULearn.

Class Attendance

Attendance at all class meetings is required and roll will be taken. Attendance does not constitute a percentage of your grade, but you must attend at least 80% of class sessions in order to earn a passing grade. Failure to attend at least 80% of classes will result in an automatic F. Participation in class discussions and questions are encouraged.

I do not post or give out my notes. If you miss class, you should be able to get notes from one your classmates.

Grading

As explained above, attendance is required. Failure to attend class equates to a failing grade. Otherwise, your grade will be determined as follows:

Exams

No exams will be given early or dropped. Midterms and exams will be given on the days listed below in the classroom. If you miss a midterm exam, the weight will be transferred to the final. Midterm exams are not cumulative and will focus on the material covered up to that point or between the exams. I will give a list of topics before the midterm that will be covered on the midterms. The final exam is cumulative.

You are responsible for bringing pens/pencils and a calculator to exam. Graphing calculators and cell phone calculators are NOT allowed under any circumstances. I will provide paper for the exams; blue books are not necessary.

Paper/Proposal

Part of your grade for this class will be an individual paper or proposal. The paper should be 4-8 pages in length and will be on a subject in macroeconomics of your choice. I encourage you choose either to give an analysis of a current issue in macroeconomics using the tools and theories we address in class or to create a proposal for a research project on an issue in macroeconomics that interests you. A polished draft of the paper is due Wednesday, June 17 and is worth 30% of the final paper grade. The final paper is due the last week of class. I encourage you to discuss your topic with me before turning in the draft.

Homework

There will be six homework assignments for the class. No late assignments will be accepted and none will be dropped.

Two Article Analyses: Two assignments will be (no more than) one-page analyses of a relevant news article. I will post an article on the website for each assignment. If you wish, you may choose another article so long as it is related to macroeconomic. Article analyses are due at 2:00 pm on the due date on CULearn. If you choose to read an article not provided, please attach a copy of the article with your assignment.

Four Problem Sets: Four assignments will be problem sets applying theory and concepts from the textbook and lecture. They will be posted on the website and will be due in class at the beginning of class.
