Activity Overview

Overview

This is an activity for when the book is over. It encourages students to think about the characters' personalities within the story and how those personalities help develop the story. This is an activity done individually, that the whole class will do. This is an activity that is done over a couple of class periods.

Objective

Students will examine one character and go in depth within explaining that character's thoughts, feelings, and overall personality. Students will also research the setting within the book and provide different facts they have learned about it.

Activity Overview (continued)

Connection

This activity is the perfect way for students to use their own creativity, while connecting what they know and learned from the book. Allowing them to go in depth about the character helps students to identify aspects of the book that aren't perfectly painted out for them. Allowing them to research the setting will help them to correcting research as well as learn about a real place and make a connection with the book. Next, allowing them to rate the book helps make them feel as if their voice is heard on what they liked and disliked. Lastly, allowing them to create a new book cover, gives them the opportunity to use their creativity as well as have fun in the classroom. Bumps in the Night has a lot of great learning within the actual book. The setting, characters, and visualizations are all incorporated very well within the book. The setting has key details to the actual location in real life which when researched students can propose an in-depth connection to the book relating directly to the academic standard.

This activity was overall adapted from my own elementary school experience.

Materials

- 1. Bumps in the Night
- 2. Empty Cereal Box (one per student)
- 3. Construction Paper
- 4. Pencils, Markers, Colored Pencils
- 5. Scissors
- 6. Glue
- 7. Printed Templates

Directions: Cereal Box Book Report

- The first class period should be introducing the project and explaining the end result as well as showing some examples of the project.
- Every student should bring in an empty cereal box.
- The first thing will be to complete the activities that are being put onto the cereal box.
- The front of the box will allow students to include their own drawing of the front cover (could be the same as the book or different) as well as authors, illustrators, and their own name.
- The back of the box will be an in-depth examination of one of the characters (the whole class could do the same character or different characters).







Directions (continued)

- One of the sides of the box will be the students rating of the book between 1 and 5 stars as well as a short summary on why they rated it the way they did.
- The other side will be a smaller "research" portion and summary of the setting of the book. This could be something they research or simply summarize from what they know from the book.
- There then should be a class period dedicated to gluing the parts onto the box and decorating encouraging your students to be as creative as possible.
- Wrapping up should include allowing a student gallery walk to encourage your class to see what other students may have done in order to reflect and think about what they could have done differently.



Additional Suggestions

Extensions, Adaptations, and Recommendations:

- Allow emergent bilingual students to write their cereal box in their preferred or home language.
- Similarly shaped boxes will work if a student is unable to get a cereal box.
- If you have the supplies, consider offering students the choice to paint their cover pictures.
- Allow students to work in teams of two.
 - We recommend not having groups be any larger.
