

Activity Overview

- This activity relates to Kwame Crashes the Underworld in the way that Kwame's culture is located in western Africa; in Ghana. In the book we see him delve into his culture and not only learn more about the Akan religion, but also understand where he is from and who his family is. This activity focuses on the religions that are practiced in Africa and how important they are.
- This activity should take about one to two class periods.



Activity Overview (continued)

- Each student is assigned an Indigenous religion that is represented in Africa (Akan, Yoruba, Dogon, Vodon, Igbo). Students will research their assigned religion and become confident in their knowledge on it. Students then, would be put into groups with students who were studying different religions than what they had, and share about their assigned religion. The goal of this activity will be for students to compare and contrast the beliefs of several Indigenous religions in Africa.
- Students will research their assigned religion individually, and then share their findings in small groups with students who researched different religions.

Directions

- 1. Introduce the project and how it relates to *Kwame Crashes the Underworld* by answering the reading questions (slide 7).
- 2. Students are assigned different religions established in Ghana, Africa. For example, Akan, Yoruba, Dogon, Vodon, and Igbo.
- 3. Next students will do research in order to comprehensively understand what religion they are working on. The research will be focused on questions that the teacher will be giving them at the beginning of the activity (slide 8).
- 4. After a period of time, the students will then get into groups of 5, each student having researched a different religion. These groups will then discuss what they learned and the greatest takeaways from their individual research.

Reading Questions

Before Reading Questions

- 1. How would you define religion?
- 2. Do you or your family members believe in any type of religion?

During Reading Questions

- 1. What is the name of the underworld that Kwame is pulled in to?
- 2. What are the names of the gods that Kwame encounters in Asamando?

After Reading Questions

- 1. What Indigenous religion is associated with the reading?
- 2. How does Kwame view his culture at the start of the book compared to the end of the book?



Research Questions


Make sure students have a clear understanding of what religion they are researching.

To help with this process, the students should focus on the following items:

- 1. What are the main beliefs of the religion?
- 2. What kind of traditions does the religion have?
- 3. What percentage of people in Ghana practice the religion?
- 4. Provide a brief myth or tale from the religion you are assigned.
- 5. How long has the religion been around?
