Contextualizing and Introducing the Book

Kwame Crashes the Underworld is a love letter to Ghanaian culture, mythos, and values, centering complex and nuanced Black characters as they dive headfirst into a quest to save the mortal world, find connection, and learn how to say goodbye. They're plunged into a world they had only ever thought was a story, battling angry nature gods alongside a previously dead Queen Mother grandma, discovering dormant powers, encountering awe-inspiring creatures, and meeting heroes straight out of myths.

Activity Overview

- ★ Ghanaian mythology is central to the storyline of Kwame Crashes the Underworld. It's grounded in it.
- ★ Students will explore how characters, settings, or objects in the book are based on traditional Ghanaian myths by researching their original forms and comparing them to their modern versions.
- ★ This comparison will help them understand how ancient stories are adapted to reflect contemporary themes and introduce Ghanaian culture in a new way.







Materials

- ★ Laptop for research
- ★ Kwame Crashes the Underworld!
- ★ Annotation materials *optional* (post-it notes, highlighter)



Directions

- 1. Before reading Kwame Crashes the Underworld, introduce the project and optionally assign groups a character, setting, or object from the provided list so they can be more attentive to what they need to take note of.
- 2. While reading the book, students should take notes or annotate to gather information about their assigned topic.
- 3. Once finished with the book, groups will spend time researching the historical and mythological origins of their character, setting or object with a specific focus on the significance to Ghanaian culture.
- 4. Groups will then compare the historical/mythological source of their topic to the modern adaptation in Kwame Crashes the Underworld.
- 5. To finish they can present their findings to the class creatively as a slideshow, Venn diagram, poster, etc.

*The underworld is the main setting of the book and there is information on it in most chapters, hence the title!





Possible Guiding Questions



- What is this location like in the original mythology?
- How has the author adapted it to fit into the world of this book and a more modern setting?
- Are there any significant changes (landscape, occupants, vibes), and if so, why do you think these choices were made?
- What are the key traits, powers, or responsibilities of this character in the original myth?
- How are they similar or different in the book?
- In what ways have they been modernized?
- What significance has this object had historically and within mythological context, and in what ways has that been preserved or adapted to the modern setting/world of the book?

Additional Suggestions

- Ideally, the groups should have about 3-4 students but can be adjusted accordingly.
- Students could also do additional research on non-mythological topics from the book, such as dashikis, fufu, and other persisting components of Ghanaian culture.
- Another topic of research could be the queen mothers, who continue to remain an integral part of Ghanaian culture and play an important role in the story.

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
