

Activity: You and Me!

Activity - Tulsi and Vanessa's lives through art!

You and Me:

- Individual project where the students will show their comprehension of the plot, characters, and who is telling the story.
- Students will pull important details about each character's life.
- Students can draw and write their responses and share with their classmates!




Materials

- Like You, Like Me book
- <u>Template</u> (see example after directions)
- Kid scissors (or have shape pre-cut)
- Colored markers
- Crayons
- Pencils



Directions 1. Read Like You, Like Me aloud to the class. 2.Hand out copies of template to children. 3. Have students fold on dotted line and cut along the outline of the person on Side A. 4. On Side A: Ask students to draw general characteristics of Tulsi on one half and Vanessa on the other, focusing on each character's identity. a. This will help guide their thoughts and make it more clear to them, when you re-read the book, which character is speaking and when.

Directions

5. Go back through book more slowly with the students, and ask questions guiding their thinking about who is telling the story on each page. Ex: How does Tulsi get to school? Which girl has two siblings? 6. On Side B: Have the students write at least 5 specific details or events that the two girls mention throughout After: Compare similarities and differences, reflect, and the book. make connections.



If students finish early, have them pair up with another student and make a version of the template comparing their own lives.


