



Activity Overview "Cheese Match"

- ★ In the book, there are many unspoken emotions that are displayed through the illustrations. Pictures that match with words on the cards will serve as a comprehension check of these emotions.
- ★ Intended to confirm students' comprehension of the book through a card matching game.
- ★ Make sure that the kids can name the main characters (Kat and Mouse), describe a couple characteristics, recall events throughout the book, and describe the setting.
- ★ Half of the cards will be questions and the other half will be answers or pictures that match the question.
- ★ Questions will be about the story's characters, setting, and events.
- ★ Students can work together to match the question.
- ★ This activity should be in small groups (around 3-4).






Step-By-Step Directions

- ★ The Main Event (Students and Teacher)
 - Scene-Setter: Okay, gather those small groups and let 'em know the drill: "We're
 playing Cheese Match to see how much of I Like Cheese! really stuck in your
 brains!" Explain that it's a card game to check their comprehension.
 - Pass Out the Loot: Get the essential bits into their little hands—the paper that looks like cheese (seriously, that's a genius touch), pencils, and the necessary coloring apparatus like colored pencils/crayons or markers.
 - <u>The Two Sides of the Coin</u>: Make it crystal clear: They're making two types of cards. One batch is for questions, and the other has little pictures that match.
 - The Subject Matter: Emphasize that all their genius questions must revolve around the story's main players (characters), where it all went down (setting), and what actually happened (events). This keeps them focused.

Jazz It Up! Extra Ideas & Accommodations

- ★ More Ways to Catch a Mouse
 - The Blueprint: Forget just cards; ask the kids to use their knowledge of the characters, setting, and events to draw a story map. A little "beginning, middle, and end" sequence—that's a solid extension.
 - <u>The Encore</u>: If they're feeling frisky, challenge those small groups to write a brand new scene for the Kat & Mouse Book. Like, what happens after the cheese sandwich is eaten? Endless possibilities!
- ★ Making it Work for Everyone (Modifications & Differentiations)
 - For the Little Scholars (Pre-K/Kindergarten): The teacher should prep all the matching cards beforehand. Their goal is simply to match. Keep the questions focused on things like characters—"What's Kat wearing?".
 - For the Older Scholars (Second/Third Grade): Insist that they formulate inference questions—the kind that requires a bit of detective work. Furthermore, the answer card must include a little snipped phrase or sentence from the book that acts as the 'proof' for their answer.
