Activity Overview

Students will be will be assigned an illustration from the text and expected to analyze/annotate it in relation to one of the themes found in the story. This annotation should include; analysis of the colors used, fonts, mood, and tone. Students will also make connections to the theme, message, and prior knowledge when analyzing their assigned illustration.

Materials

- Writing Tools: Pens, Pencils, Sharpie etc.
- Colorful element: Crayons, Colored Pencils, Markers
- Sticky notes or anyway to add
- Photo copy of selected pages

Directions

- 1. Students will be broken into groups of 2 or 3 and assigned pages from the text. (We recommend pages; 20, 21, 27, 48, 69, 91, 115, 160, 177, 202, 232, and 274.)
- 2. Students individually will be given two minutes to look at the page and write down first impressions (for example: colors, fonts, and images).
- 3. Students will then be given 5 minutes for comparison in discussion form with their group members to review first impression notes.
- 4. Students will then take 15 minutes combined for group annotation and to develop their final project.

Continued Directions

- 1. Students will then use guided questions in their groups such as: What do you see? What do you think is happening? What happened before and what might happen next? How does this picture connect to the big ideas or themes in the story? Why do you think this illustration was included?
- 2. Students will share in small groups their connections to the illustrations.
- 3. Students will then receive feedback from their peers in the form of one positive and one added suggestion.
- 4. Students will then go back to their original groups and review feedback as well as make changes needed.
- 5. Lastly, students will submit their final project and participate in a gallery walk in order to observe others' work.

Additional Suggestions

Ways to extend the activity further:

Have students research the Black Panther Party or historical context and seeing how it further connects to Cecile's activism.

Ask specific guiding questions:


- a. What do you know about this character?
- b. How did this character feel in the scene?
- c. How does this picture connect to the main theme in the story?

Students write a short paragraph connecting their illustration to one of the novel's themes.

- Possible modifications or accommodations (to differentiate for a variety of learners, for different grades/ages):
 - Creating sentence frames for learners who need support with reading. For more skilled readers, they could find at LEAST one quote to support their claim.

Additional Suggestions

- Ways to assess the activity:
 - Observe class discussions
 - Check that annotations include connections to the themes
 - Neatness and organization of final product
 - Students are engaged and participating in productive discussions and collaboration
- Other recommendations
 - Always show your students an example so they can get the best understanding of the activity.
