

Family Handprint Art Project

After reading *Once Upon a Kwanzaa*, the students will discuss the theme of family and the importance of community. Each student will put their handprint on a piece of paper, draw a picture of their family inside the handprint, and write a few things that are important to them to represent the seven principles of Kwanzaa. This project makes connections to the story by emphasizing how important family, community, and connection is during Kwanzaa, while allowing students to express their creativity and uniqueness.

This will be an individual project where each student makes their own handprint.





Washable paint



Construction or printer paper



Crayons



Markers



Step by step directions



Read the story *Once Upon A Kwanzaa* and ask the students to think about their family and what is important to them.



Once you've finished reading the story, start by handing out a piece of paper and some paint and have the students put their hand print on the piece of paper.



Let it dry for a couple of hours (or a day) and then come back to it

Step by step directions (cont.)



Ask the students to draw what their family looks like in the hand print and have them include something that is special and important to them. Give them examples of things that are important to you so they can get an idea of what they may include.



Ask students to create a drawing using markers or crayons that represents what makes them unique and highlights what makes their family special to them. Around the fingers, they can add drawings or words to represent the seven principles of Kwanzaa and how it relates to their own family or community.




Once completed have the students come into a circle and share their artwork. Have them share with their classmates what they decided to add to their hand and why it's important to them.
