




## **Activity Overview**

This activity ask students to identify the structure that the book uses for each principle of Kwanzaa (principle, meaning, and example). As the teacher reads the book aloud, students will identify the parts of this structure for each principle. At the end, students will share their notes in small groups.



## Materials


- One blank sheet of paper for each student
- Three different colored writing utensils for annotation (markers, pens, colored pencils, or crayons, etc.).



## **Step-By-Step Directions**

#### Review/warm-up


- Write the Nguzo Saba (the seven principles of Kwanzaa) on the board:
  - Umoja
  - Kujichagulia
  - Ujima
  - Ujamaa
  - Nia
  - **Kuumba**
  - Imani
- The teacher will introduce the concept of text structure as it appears within the story. Each of the seven principles follows the same pattern: the first sentence introduces the principle, the next explains its meaning, and the final sentence provides an example.
- The teacher can guide students with leading questions, such as, "What do you notice about how each principle is presented?" or "What similarities and differences do you see between them?"



## **Directions - Continued**

## Activity

- Each student will receive a piece of paper and divide it into three sections labeled "Principle", "Meaning", and "Example".
- As the teacher rereads the book aloud, the teacher will pause after each principle to allow students time to record their notes in each category (see example on the side for what they should include).



Wrap-up

 Once students have finished, ask them to share their papers in small groups (around four students per group).

# **Additional Suggestions**

**Drawing Element:** 

- Explain that they will choose one of the principles, write it on the paper, and draw a moment in their lives when they felt that principle. Use a moment from your own life as an example.
- Hand each student a blank piece of paper and provide drawing materials. Allow students time to choose a principle, think of a moment, and complete their drawings.
