

### Activity overview

#### Objective:

Students will learn about climate changes in the book *El Niño*. We can see the impacts on different regions while developing reading and writing comprehension.

#### Introduction:

- Start by asking students what they know about weather patterns and how they connect to *El Niñ*o.
- Discuss key points, emphasizing the causes and effects of the climate.

#### **Group discussion:**

- Divide students into small groups and have them discuss some effects of El Niño and how it impacts plants and people.
- Ask them Have they heard of any recent weather events similar to El Niño in the

#### **Creative writing/art assignment:**

• Writing:

Ask students to write a short story from the perspective of a character that was affected by El Niño.

• Include:

Description how it affects the character and the emotions and challenges they faced

• Art:

Have each group illustrate an image to go along with their writing and how it relates.

#### **Presentation/Reflection:**

#### Presentation:

 Have each group present their writing and art, and give a brief description of their thought process and why it connects to the book

#### Reflection:


- Class discussion on how they think the activity went and how they could benefit from it.
- Ask students what they have learned from the book?

### Materials:

- 1. Copy of the book *El Niño*
- 2. Graph paper or a poster board
- 3. Markers
- 4. Colored pencils
- 5. Crayons
- 6. Chromebook
- 7. Notebook







### Instructions:

- The teacher will split everyone into groups.
- The students will review the story and pick a character.
- Students should describe how their chosen character was affected and describe the challenges that they faced.
- Each group should include an illustration, a written explanation, and a discussion of how their work relates to the story.

# Other suggestions for the activity:

If you have a student that may need support with group collaboration or writing activities:

- Have the student brainstorm with a friend they are comfortable with or individually a list of the climate causes and effects.
  - Option 1: Give each student a set of printed pictures to represent the climate changes in El Niño.
  - Option 2: Have the student draw illustrations to represent the story. Have students create a picture story and organize the before and after events of weather change effects.
- Have each student present their story to the class explaining each event and then have a class discussion after.
- This accommodation allows students to understand what is happening in the story through images rather than writing.


