





Notes from a Rocky Road Quarry tour provided by Doug Bachli to Al Pace and Bill Deno and other various sources:

Those quarries identified by number in the Buckhorn Valley below Masonville are active operating quarries of Lyons formation buff sandstone. Those quarries un-marked by number are abandoned quarries no longer in operation. This includes those shown on the east and west sides of Carter Lake.

Quarries on the west mountain side of the valley are the Permian age Lyons formation unique in color and hardness. The hills(hogback) east of the valley contain stone from the Dakota formation period which is difficult to quarry and work as the Lyons sandstone is easy to work.

Masonville buff stone ranges in earth tones from off white to dark brown, but no reds. It can be split along fracture lines much like stone around Lyons, but it is more dense and can be polished to a high gloss, a unique feature of this particular stone.


All quarries marked are either closed since the 1930s, abandoned, or on public or private lands often with limited access, for example, most reservoir shoreline quarries are only accessible by boat and some are now under water.

The numbered quarries were larger operations, the most being the Stout quarries operated by the Union Pacific Railroad. A spur line was used to carry the stone north to the main line. The American Red Stone Quarry near Bellevue was quite a large operation with its own rail spur and fabrication shops. Stone was rail-shipped around the state and beyond in the first decades of the last century.

Quarry locations not keyed on map are small operations also closed as above and are not named. Most were used by local masonry contractors on an as needed basis.

Generally, quarries located north of Eltuck Bay were Ingleside formation, massive redorange sandstone, and those located south of that point were dominantly Lyons formation buff stone. Both did not have clear laminations and resulted in thick cut stone as opposed to thinner strip stone as found in the Lyons, Colorado area.
