# Studying in London Leads to IAFS Student Thesis

On March 22, 2017, a terror attack occurred at the Palace of Westminster in London, England. For Global Grant recipient Fallon Porter (IAFS, CMCI '18), this felt too close to home—she was sitting at a desk, less than three miles from the palace. For her spring 2017 semester, Fallon took classes through the CAPA England: London program, studying the city's history, culture and politics. This experience would serve as a catalyst for graduating CU Boulder with magna cum laude honors.

2017 saw multiple major terror attacks in the U.K., negatively affecting London's image and industries. It was a pivotal semester for Fallon to be there. "I spent many evenings conversing with Londoners, learning their historical account and interpretations of events happening in their country," explains Fallon.

### Pushing Beyond the Comfort Zone as an Intern

Going door-to-door and talking to strangers isn't typically an introvert's favorite thing to do, and Jeffrey Nonnemacher (IAFS, PSCI '19) does it often. As an intern for a local political campaign in the fall 2018 semester, Jeffrey has spent hours canvassing and calling Colorado residents.

Jeffrey's passion for politics has been shaped by news, classes, and conferences. In 2016, headlines were nonstop about the United Kingdom EU membership referendum (Brexit) and the United States presidential election. After seeing the dramatic events unfold for both, Jeffrey found himself invested in politics, particularly political behavior. "For me, it is fascinating to see how information is relayed to voters and its impact on how they participate in a political event," says Jeffrey.

His internship with the <u>Jared Polis for Colorado Governor campaign</u> provides him with academic credit and offers hands-on experience with civic engagement. Academically, his internship is an easy, natural fit, but socially, it forces him beyond his comfort zone. "Having to knock on doors and talk to people I have never met, about politics no less, is challenging," explains Jeffrey. "As an introvert, it isn't easy, but it has shown me that I can overcome my limitations." He also says the internship is giving him better problem-solving techniques and a stronger ability to think on his feet. Jeffrey credits his internship with teaching him more than just how to ask people questions—it is showing him the confidence he needs and has for a future career in politics. After graduation, he plans to travel to Europe,

enroll in graduate school, and study EU politics and political behavior.

Next year's Fulbright Program grant recipients were selected for their academic and professional achievement as well as for their record of service and leadership potential in their respective fields.


