ABSTRACT

An empirical thesaurus of meanings and meaning frequencies for a list of 90 common English words drawn from the Paivio, Yuille, and Madigan (1968) and the Toglia and Battig (1978) normative lists was compiled as a supplement to previous word norms studies to aid researchers concerned with linguistics and/or verbal behavior in the selection and calibration of verbal materials.

This technical report contains the complete method and tables referenced in the shorter paper by Desmond S. Cartwright and C. A. Nickerson, "An Empirical Thesaurus: Meaning Norms for 90 Common Words," The Modern Language Journal, 1979, 63 (in press).

An Empirical Thesaurus:
Meaning Norms for 90 Common Words

The demands of researchers concerned with linguistics and/or verbal behavior for information about the semantic properties of English words to be used in selecting or calibrating verbal materials has resulted in the publication of a wide variety of normative word lists. These lists present normative data on such semantic word properties as concreteness (Gorman, 1961; Paivio, Yuille, & Madigan, 1968; Spreen & Shulz, 1966; Toglia & Battig, 1978), imageability (Paivio, Yuille, & Madigan, 1968; Toglia & Battig, 1978), meaningfulness (Locascio & Ley, 1972; Noble, 1952; Paivio, Yuille, & Madigan, 1968; Spreen & Schulz, 1966; Toglia & Battig, 1978), frequency (Thorndike & Lorge, 1944), categorizability and categorization (Battig & Montague, 1969; Cohen, Bousfield, & Whitmarsh, 1957; Shapiro & Palermo, 1970; Toglia & Battig, 1978), familiarity (Toglia & Battig, 1978), number of features (Toglia & Battig, 1978), pleasantness (Toglia & Battig, 1978), pronunciability (Spreen & Schulz, 1966), and associates (Battig, 1964; Palermo & Jenkins, 1964; Perfetti, Lindsey, & Garson, 1971; Postman & Keppel, 1970). Interestingly, there are no empirical norms available for word meanings, presumably because researchers have relied upon dictionary and thesaurus meanings when information is needed about this particular semantic attribute. Reliance upon dictionary and thesaurus meanings is an unsatisfactory solution, however, because

subjects may know all the possible dictionary or thesaurus meanings of a word, they may also know only some or even none of them, and they may even be aware of word meanings which would not ordinarily be listed in a dictionary or thesaurus, such as technical terms and colloquial expressions. The experimenter, therefore, has no guarantee that subjects are responding to the meaning of the verbal stimulus that he thinks they are responding to. This problem is compounded by the fact that neither a dictionary nor a thesaurus gives any indication of the Likelihood that any particular meaning will be the meaning responded to; the meanings in dictionaries and thesauruses are not arranged from most to least common or frequent, as is commonly supposed.

In recognition of this problem, the present study presents empirical meanings and frequencies for a short list of 90 common English words. These words were drawn from the Pavio, Yuille, and Madigan (1968) and Toglia and Battig (1978) normative lists so that information about the other semantic properties of the words might be readily available. It is hoped that these meaning norms will prove a useful supplement to the battery of normative tools already available for choosing and calibrating verbal materials and that they will also serve as an aid in interpreting the semantic ratings of words in the previous normative studies. For example, many of the words in the Paivio, Yuille, and Madigan (1968) list have multiple meanings. In rating a word for concreteness, different subjects may have

been rating different meanings of the word. If some of the meanings rated are abstract, while others are concrete, then mean concreteness ratings of about 4 on a 1 (abstract) to 7 (concrete) scale may indicate not that the word is characterized by an "intermediate" level of concreteness but that multiple meanings of the word have been rated.

Method

Subjects

One hundred and ninety-seven University of Colorado students enrolled in an introductory psychology course served as subjects in partial fulfillment of course requirements. All subjects spoke English as their native language.

Materials

The ninety stimulus words for which meanings were to be obtained were chosen from two sources. Thirty of these words comprise a short list that has been used in the preliminary testing of hypotheses regarding the nature of linguistic concreteness-abstractness (Cartwright, 1977). These words were originally drawn from the Paivio, Yuille, and Madigan (1968) normative list and were chosen so that ten of the words would have high concreteness ratings, defined as a Paivio, Yuille, and Madigan C rating of 7.0, ten would have medium concreteness ratings (3.8 \leq C \leq 4.2), and ten would have low concreteness ratings (1.0 \leq C \leq 1.7), and so that all words would have fairly high meaningfulness (M) ratings (M \geq 5.32).

The thirty words were as follows:

An additional sixty words were chosen from the Toglia and Battig (1978) word norms. A frequency distribution of the concreteness (CON) ratings of the 2854 words in the Toglia and Battig list yields a bimodal distribution, with the modal points occurring at CON ratings of 3.0 - 3.5 and 5.5 - 6.0. This distribution was used to select CON values to define low concreteness, medium concreteness, and high concreteness for the set of sixty words drawn from the Toglia and Battig list. Low concrete words were defined as those having CON ratings less than or equal to the midpoint of the interval of the mode closest to the low concrete end of the scale (CON \leq 3.25). High concrete words were defined as those having CON ratings greater than or equal to the midpoint of the interval of the mode closest to the concrete end of the scale (CON > 5.75). Medium concrete words were then defined as those whose CON ratings placed them into the lowest portion of the trough between the two modal points (4.0 \leq CON \leq 5.0). Words were selected so that there were twenty high concrete, twenty medium concrete, and twenty low concrete words, and so that all words had medium meaningfulness (MNG) values (3.5 \leq MNG \leq 4.5). The sixty words chosen were as follows:

In order to make the task a reasonable one for subjects to be able to complete within an hour, the list of ninety words was broken into two sets of forty-five words each. Five words from each of the three Paivio, Yuille, and Madigan concreteness categories and ten words from each of the three Toglia and Battig concreteness categories were randomly selected and assigned to word set 1; the remaining words were assigned to word set 2. Each subject listed meanings for the stimulus words of one word set only.

Each of the stimulus words was typed, centered and capitalized, at the top of a single page. A test booklet consisted of the forty-five stimulus word pages for a given word set, plus a cover sheet of instructions for the subject. The order of the stimulus word pages in each word booklet was randomized, so that the stimulus words were presented in a different order to each subject.

Procedure

Subjects were run in small groups of ten to twenty. Test booklets were randomized before distribution so that within each small group some subjects received word set 1 and some word set 2. The instructions printed on the cover sheet read as follows:

INSTRUCTIONS

The purpose of this experiment is to find out what meanings people commonly give to various words. The procedure will be as follows: at the top of each page in this mimeographed booklet is typed a word. You will be given 30 seconds to write down on the page beneath the word as many different meanings of the word as occur to you, in whatever order they occur to you. For example, if the word is MARK, you might write down the meanings

a boy's name

to grade papers

a foreign coin

etc. Please write only one meaning per line as shown in the example. When the 30 seconds are up, the experimenter will request you to turn the page. You are to

stop writing immediately and turn to the next page where there will be another word for which you are to write down meanings. This procedure will be repeated for a total of 45 words.

Should it happen that you are unable to read a word because of its being too lightly printed, wait quietly until the 30 seconds for that word are up and then when the experimenter requests you to turn the page, turn the page and begin writing meanings for the next word.

Do not turn the page until told to do so.

The thirty-second intervals were timed with a standard stop watch.

Results

Ninety-six subjects listed meanings for the stimulus words in word set 1; one hundred and one subjects listed meanings for the stimulus words in word set 2. A single meaning listed by a subject for a stimulus word will hereafter be referred to as a meaning-response. The actual phrasing of a meaning-response is termed a meaning-expression. The difference between the terms meaning-response and meaning-expression is rather subtle and is best illustrated by an example. If twelve subjects have written down "a scoundrel" for the stimulus word HEEL, there are twelve meaning-responses but only one meaning-expression. Within a single subject, however, a meaning-response is the meaning-expression of that response; listing "a scoundrel" in response

to HEEL is both that subject's meaning-response and his meaning-expression of that response. The legible meaning-expressions given by subjects to any particular stimulus word were categorized as 1) MEANINGS, 2) CONFUSIONS, 3) MISTAKES, 4) ASSOCIATES, or 5) BLANKS.

MEANINGS

If a meaning-expression listed by a subject as his meaningresponse to a given stimulus word could be found in a dictionary,
thesaurus, slang dictionary, technical reference, foreign
language dictionary, or other published reference work, or was
recognized as being a common usage of the stimulus word, it was
accepted as a legitimate meaning of that word. Legitimate meanings included:

- a. names of persons, or the meaning-expression "a name"
 examples: JOY "a girl's name"

 ARCH "short for Archie"

5. team names

examples: CARDINAL - "a football team"

BEAR - "a team name"

6. slang terms

examples: CRANK - "heroin"

BEAR - "something that is hard to do"

7. definition by example

examples: AUTOMOBILE - "Chevy"

DYNASTY - "Ming Dynasty"

8. metaphorical, poetic, or symbolic usage

examples: BEAR - "someone who is big"

MOLE - "a person with small eyes"

OLIVE - "a peace symbol"

9. the completion of a phrase in which the word is often found

examples: CAPITAL - "capital punishment"

CARDINAL - "cardinal sin"

10. commercial product names (including beverage names), brand names, company names

examples: JOY - "a dishwashing liquid"

ARROW - "a shirt company"

PASSION-"a drink"

11. technical or specialized terms

examples: CAMEL - "a skiing or iceskating maneuver"

FILE - "a deck of cards" (computer science term)

12. abbreviations

examples: MASS - "the abbreviation of Massachusetts"

CUSTOM - "short for customers"

13. foreign words

examples: DROP - "licorice in Dutch"

PARDON - "a French word"

14. parts of words

examples: IN - "a prefix"

IN - "a reagent in chemistry" (a suffix)

15. interjections, exclamations, and expressions

examples: WELL - "expression"

PARDON -"sorry"

HAIL -"Southern pronunciation of 'hell'"

16. references to games, groups, records, and songs

examples: ARROW - "a card game"

CHANCE - "a card in Monopoly"

DEVOTION- "a song by Earth, Wind, and Fire"

17. names of flowers, trees, and plants

examples: PASSION - "a flower"

COTTON - "a plant"

18. book titles and characters and places in books, in the movies, or on television

examples: OLIVE - "Popeye's girl friend"

EMERALD - "Emerald City (in The Wizard

of Oz)"

Different meaning-expressions denoting the same underlying idea were combined into a single meaning-class. Thus, the meaning-

expressions "a fool", "a bad guy", "a cad", "a scoundrel", "a jerk", "a fink", "an undesirable character", and "a creep" for the stimulus word HEEL were combined into the same meaning-class. Any one meaning-class may be composed of meaning-expressions representing one or several of the different kinds of legitimate meanings listed above. Generally however a meaning-class contains meaning-expressions which belong to only one syntactical class, i.e. the meaning-expressions within a meaning-class will refer only to nouns or only to verbs, etc. The set of all meaning-classes for a stimulus word constitutes the MEANINGS category of the stimulus word.

Each table lists the MEANINGS meaning-classes for a stimulus The different meaning-expressions within a meaning-class are separated by commas and are given exactly as the subjects wrote them, except that punctuation and spelling may have been changed to conform to ordinary English usage, an article "a", "an", or "the" may have been added to the meaning-expressions which refer to nouns, and meaning-expressions which are verbs or verb phrases are always given in the infinitive form. The meaning-expressions listed in a meaning-class are not exhaustive; there may be other meaningexpressions which belong to a meaning-class which are not listed. An effort was made to select the most frequent or most representative examples of the meaning-expressions included in a meaningclass, in order to prevent the repetition of meaning-expressions which are trivially different and to prevent the tables from becoming impossibly long. The table also lists, for each meaningclass, the number of subjects listing as their meaning-response

one or more of the meaning-expressions in that meaning-class (\underline{F}) and the number of subjects who listed as their first meaning-response one of the meaning-expressions in that meaning-class $(\underline{F}(lst))$.

CONFUSIONS

The second category of meaning-expressions listed in the tables is CONFUSIONS. A CONFUSION occurred when the subject mistook the spelling of the stimulus word to be that of another word, usually a word which has a similar or identical pronunciation.

Thus, the meaning-expression "a milk bag" for UTTER is a CONFUSION for the word udder. Generally, a subject who had as one or more of his meaning-responses meaning-expressions which were CONFUSIONS listed the CONFUSIONS in addition to one or more meaning-responses which were MEANINGS meaning-expressions. CONFUSIONS meaning-expressions were grouped into meaning-classes and tabulated in the same way as MEANINGS meaning-expressions, and the interpretation of F and F(lst) is the same for CONFUSIONS meaning-classes as it is for MEANINGS meaning-classes.

MISTAKES

MISTAKES occurred when the subject misread the stimulus word as a completely different word and listed meanings-responses for that word rather than for the stimulus word. For example, four subjects misread MIGHT as RIGHT and listed meaning-responses for RIGHT, and one subject misread MIGHT as MIDGET and listed meaning-responses for MIDGET. By definition, subjects whose meaning-responses were classified as MISTAKES meaning-expressions never listed as meaning-responses meaning-expressions which could be

MEANINGS or CONFUSIONS meaning-expressions for the stimulus word. The meaning-expressions for MISTAKES were not grouped into meaning-classes as were the meaning-expressions for MEANINGS and CONFUSIONS. Instead, an entry in the table merely states the fact that the stimulus word was mistaken to be some other word, specifies what that word was, and gives the number of subjects $(\underline{F})^{\dagger}$ who misread the stimulus word to be that other word. $\underline{F}(\underline{lst})$ has the same interpretation as \underline{F} for MISTAKES.

ASSOCIATES

An ASSOCIATE occurred when a meaning-expression could not be classified as a MEANING, a CONFUSION, or a MISTAKE. This meaning-expression was usually a word or a phrase related to the stimulus word but not a meaning of it. Thus, "contact lense" was an ASSOCIATE of VISION and "chipped" was an ASSOCIATE of BASIN.

ASSOCIATES were deleted from the analysis and are not listed in the tables.

BLANKS

The fifth category, BLANKS, occurred 1) when a subject listed no meaning-responses to a stimulus word, 2) when a subject listed no meaning-responses which could be classified as MEANINGS, CONFUSIONS or MISTAKES meaning-expressions - i.e. he listed only ASSOCIATES, or 3) when a word page was inadvertantly omitted or was otherwise missing from a subject's word set. F indicates the number of subjects whose word page for a stimulus word was BLANK. F(lst) has the same interpretation as F for BLANKS.

The MEANINGS, CONFUSIONS, MISTAKES, and BLANKS for each stimulus word are listed in a separate table. The tables for the stimulus words are arranged in alphabetical order. Each table indicates the number of subjects (n=96 or n=101) listing meaning-responses for that stimulus word. As mentioned above, the meaning-expressions in the meaning-classes for MEANINGS and CONFUSIONS are given exactly as written by subjects. Any comments or clarifications by the authors are enclosed in square brackets. Some of the more common clarifications occur:

- when it is unclear whether the meaning-expressions in a MEANINGS or CONFUSIONS meaning-class refer to the noun form or to the verb form of a stimulus word which can be interpreted as either a noun or a verb example: ARCH - "to bend, to curve"
 - "a bend, a curve"
 - "bend, curve [noun or verb unspecified]"
- when the meaning-expressions in a MEANINGS or CONFUSIONS meaning-class for a stimulus word which is an emotion do not specify the exact nature of the emotion but merely state "an emotion", or "a feeling" example: ANGER - "madness, being mad, ire, wrath,

fury, hostility"

- "an emotion [unspecified]"
- 3. when it may not be immediately apparent that the meaningexpressions in a MEANINGS or CONFUSIONS meaning-class refer to a slang usage of the stimulus word example: CRANK - "speed, heroin [slang]"

4. when the underlying denotation of a MEANINGS or CONFUSIONS meaning-class may not be immediately obvious

example: ANXIETY - "nervousness, uneasiness, fear apprehension, tenseness, uptightness, worried anticipation [a negative emotion]

- "anticipation, expectancy, anxiousness
 [a neutral emotion]"
- "eagerness, longing, hopefulness [a
 positive emotion]"
- 5. when a MEANINGS or CONFUSIONS meaning-class consists of many meaning-expressions which are definitions by example example: CAR - "an automobile, a vehicle, an auto, a motor vehicle [and any specified make of car]"
- 6. as explanations of CONFUSIONS example: THREAD - "a tire surface [confusion with tread]"
- 7. as explanations of MISTAKES
 example: SOUL "[word mistaken as SOUR]"

Within a category, the MEANINGS meaning-classes, CONFUSIONS meaning-classes, or MISTAKES explanations are ordered from most frequently to least frequently occurring meaning-classes or explanations, that is, from highest to lowest \underline{F} . If the $\underline{F}s$ for two (or more) meaning-classes are equal, the meaning-classes are listed in order from highest to lowest $\underline{F}(\underline{lst})$.

When the number of BLANKS for a stimulus word exceeds five, an explanation is given in a footnote to the table of that stimulus word.
