For Current Undergraduates

Art

Diversity in Arts Leadership Internship Program

Deadline: February 2018

The Arts & Business Council of New York's Diversity in Arts Leadership internship program strives to strengthen and advance diversity in the arts management field and provides college students working towards careers in the arts or business sectors with a hands-on introduction to arts nonprofits in New York City. The Arts & Business Council of New York matches undergraduate students from underrepresented backgrounds with energetic host arts organizations and business mentors, who guide the students' personal and professional growth throughout the summer. The internship is 10 weeks with a New York City arts organization, working full time Monday through Friday. You will attend an opening orientation, go on site visits to all participating arts organizations, participate in social gatherings and workshops, and attend a closing ceremony. Participating students come from across the country and from a variety of personal and academic backgrounds - as diverse as the disciplines of their host arts organizations, which include music, dance, theater, visual arts, museums, and arts services. Each intern receives a \$3,200 stipend.

Research

Summer Research Opportunities Program (SROP)

Deadline: November 1, 2017 and February 10, 2018

This program is a gateway to graduate education. Students are placed in a variety of widely-recognized summer research programs at participating top-ranked research institution who form part of the Committee on Institutional Cooperation (CIC). The goal of the program is to increase the number of underrepresented students who pursue graduate study and research careers. Students are able to enhance their academic and research skills by working one-on-one with a faculty mentor, attend weekly campus-based educational enrichment activities that will broaden their view of graduate education and research, along with strengthening their technical skills. Further, they will have the opportunity to attend campus workshops to inform them about graduate admission procedures, financial aid opportunities, test-taking skills, preparing a presentation, and expose them to a wide range of research fields. At the end of the summer, students present the results of the research project at a symposium or poster session held on their campuses.

Boston Lawyers Group Undergraduate Summer Internship Program

Deadline: February 9, 2018 (?)

One of the primary goals of the BLG is to increase the candidate pool of highly qualified lawyers of color for BLG member organizations. In an effort to achieve this goal, the BLG sponsors the Summer Internship Program for College Students, which introduces diverse students to careers in law. TRIALS at Harvard Law School

Deadline February 28, 2018

Trials is a unique partnership of NYU School of Law, Harvard Law School, and the Advantage Testing Foundation. It is a fully subsidized summer study program for students of modest means whose backgrounds are currently underrepresented at the nation's top law schools. For five weeks in the summer, Trials students take residence at Harvard or New York University. The residency alternates from year to year. Trials helps college students gain admission to the nation's leading law schools. Charles Hamilton Houston Scholars Program

Deadline: May 11, 2018

The Charles Hamilton Houston Scholars Program helps under-represented college freshmen and sophomores develop the academic skills needed to improve undergraduate performance and enhance their opportunity for admission to and success in law school. CHHSP focuses on the challenges often faced by minority students who may not have had or have utilized the social, experiential and cultural capital that facilitates success and enhances confidence. Weekly workshops designed and conducted by legal experts help empower students to meet and overcome these challenges. The program focuses on reading comprehension, analytical and critical thinking, writing skills, life planning and how to overcome barriers to success. Discover Law Pre-Law Undergraduate Scholars (PLUS) Program

The Law School Admission Council's DiscoverLaw.org Prelaw Undergraduate Scholars (PLUS) programs are targeted, but not restricted, to college students from racial and ethnic minority groups underrepresented in the legal profession. The programs are designed for students in the first two years of college, and preference will be given to students who have signed up for discoverlaw.org. The four-week programs provide an intense focus on the skills required to succeed in law school, the law school admission process, and legal career opportunities. Interested students should contact the schools directly for application information, including deadlines and selection criteria. **Note: You are placed in different law schools across the country and you have to check to see which law schools are hosting the program this year. The Lindsay Fellowship Program Summer Program for College Students

Deadline: February 2018 (?)

Every year, the court selects five or six Lindsay Fellows for a fellowship program that lasts approximately nine weeks. Each Fellow is assigned to a judge during the first month of the program. During that first month, the Fellows also attend an intensive program on legal research and writing, with an instructor from a local law school. Each Fellow is assigned to either the United States Attorney's Office or the Federal Defender Program during the second month of the program. Prior to graduation, the Fellows return to the district court to compete in a moot court program before a federal judge. This is a summer educational program, offering a stipend. The John Lewis Fellowship through Humanity in Action

The John Lewis Fellowship is a new Humanity in Action Fellowship program in Atlanta, Georgia. In partnership with The National Center for Civil and Human Rights, Inc., Humanity in Action will bring together a group of 30 American and European university students and recent graduates for an intensive program about diversity and civil rights in America. The program honors Congressman John Lewis, an icon of the Civil Rights Movement. The John Lewis Fellows will attend discussions with renowned scholars and activists at The Center, visit historical sites around Atlanta and engage in discussions on a range of political and social issues. They will also draw upon the immense resources of The Center and contribute to its extensive and innovative outreach initiatives. Dana-Farber/Harvard Cancer Center (CURE) Program

Deadline: February 2018 (?)

CURE (Continuing Umbrella of Research Experiences) is a mentored research experience augmented with professional development, career advisement, networking opportunities, and presentations of research findings to a world-renowned scientific community. The CURE program introduces college students from underrepresented populations to the world of cancer research by placing them in real research settings at local cancer research institutions. Our goal is to encourage students to pursue future careers in the biosciences—particularly cancer research—giving practical meaning to academic course work. At the same time, students make a valuable contribution to the DF/HCC research mission. By participating in a program at DF/HCC—an NCI comprehensive cancer center with more than 1100 researchers across seven Harvard institutions—students will learn from experts who are devoted to preventing, treating and curing cancer. Each year, a number of promising students are selected for this unique opportunity to expand and extend their interest in basic, clinical, or population science cancer research or nursing research.”

Summer 2017 Victory Congressional Undergraduate Internship

Deadline: February 17, 2018

The Victory Congressional Internship prepares young LGBT people to become informed decision-makers and influential leaders who can change their communities and our world. Each summer, the Victory Congressional Internship brings outstanding LGBT college students to Washington, D.C., for an intensive leadership program, including: 1) An eight-week Congressional internship with a member of the LGBT Equality Caucus or an LGBT-friendly member of U.S. Congress to learn firsthand about the federal legislative process and 2) An educational and leadership development program to learn about the legislative process and careers in policy-making. In December, students will attend the Victory Institute's annual international conference for three days of training, skills building, networking and discussion alongside hundreds of openly LGBT leaders in government, politics, advocacy, business and community

organizations. The Victory Congressional Internship is open to undergraduate students of all genders, orientations, abilities, races, and political affiliations. The Junior Summer Institute at UC Berkeley offers student participants a rigorous seven-week program of coursework designed to improve the participants' analytical and quantitative skills vital to success at top-level graduate programs in public policy and international affairs as well as law school. Additionally, the Institute includes a variety of activities intended to give participants a comprehensive knowledge of the opportunities for professional careers in public service. Asian Pacific American Institute for Congressional Studies- Congressional Fellowship

Deadline: January 7, 2018

The APAICS Summer Internship Program is an eight-week program that provides select undergraduate students the opportunity to work in Washington, DC., and experience American politics and public policy. APAICS interns are placed in U.S. congressional offices and federal agencies. The program develops leadership and professional skills, encourages political and civic engagement, and fosters a strong interest in public service careers.

All interns are required to participate in APAICS orientation and training programs, complete weekly journals, and submit a program evaluation at the end of the internship. A schedule of internship activities will be provided upon arrival to Washington, D.C.

APAICS Summer Internship Program provides a \$2,000 stipend and a round-trip flight within the continental U.S. sponsored by Southwest Airlines (limited additional support is made available on a case by case basis). <http://apaics.org/summer-interns/>

Taiwanese American Citizens League Political Internship Program

Deadline: ?

The program places college students in local and federal elected officials' offices for a summer internship that emphasizes identity and community impact while gaining leadership and networking experience. This year's nine-week Los Angeles program includes:

1. An internship Full-time placement in a local district office to learn the inner workings of the political process
2. Workshops: Two-day orientation and sessions throughout the summer on leadership, identity, policy, and networking
3. Advocacy: Summer-long intern group project culminating in a 3-day lobbying visit to Sacramento on an issue important to the TA community
4. Mentorship: Meaningful one-on-one relationship with an experienced mentor.

Charles B. Rangel International Affairs Summer Program at Howard University

Deadline: September 2018

The Charles B. Rangel International Affairs Summer Enrichment Program is a six-week summer program designed to provide undergraduate students with a deeper appreciation of current issues and trends in international affairs, a greater understanding of career opportunities in international affairs, and the enhanced knowledge and skills to pursue such careers. The program usually selects 15 participants from universities throughout the United States. Students live at Howard University, attend classes, and participate in a variety of programs with foreign affairs professionals at Howard and at diverse locations

Thomas R. Pickering Foreign Affairs Fellowship Program

Deadline: January 12, 2018

Funded by the U.S. Department of State and administered by The Washington Center for Internships and Academic Seminars, the 2016 Thomas R. Pickering Fellowship Program provides undergraduate and graduate students with financial support, mentoring and professional development to prepare them academically and professionally for a career in the U.S. Department of State Foreign Service. Women, members of minority groups historically underrepresented in the Foreign Service, and students with financial need are encouraged to apply. Undergraduate candidates: Up to \$37,500 annually for tuition, room and board, books, mandatory fees and some travel expenses for the senior year of undergraduate studies, and first year of a master's degree in fields related to the Foreign Service such as business administration, economics, public policy, international affairs, and other relevant fields. Two summer internships, one at a domestic office of the Department of State in Washington, D.C. and one overseas at a U.S. embassy or consulate. The program provides stipends, transportation and housing for these internships. They also provide orientation to the Program and the Foreign Service at the Department of State, mentoring from a foreign service officer throughout the duration of the fellowship.

NOAA Hollings Scholarship

Deadline: January 31st, 2018

The National Oceanic and Atmospheric Administration (NOAA) Ernest F. Hollings (Hollings) scholarship program is designed to:

1. increase undergraduate training in oceanic and atmospheric science, research, technology, and education and foster multidisciplinary training opportunities;
2. increase public understanding and support for stewardship of the ocean and atmosphere and improve environmental literacy;
3. recruit and prepare students for public service careers with NOAA and other natural resource and science agencies at the federal, state and local levels of government; and
4. recruit and prepare students for careers as teachers and educators in oceanic and atmospheric science and to improve scientific and environmental education in the United States.

The Hollings Scholarship Program provides successful undergraduate applicants with awards that include academic assistance (up to a maximum of \$9,500 per year) for full-time study during the 9-month academic year; a 10-week, full-time internship position (\$700/week) during the summer at a NOAA facility; and academic assistance (up to a maximum of \$9,500) for full-time study during a second 9-month academic year. For 2nd year students in a 4-year program, or 3rd year students in a 5-year program.

San Francisco Fellows Program

Deadline: January 15, 2018

Fellows work full-time on projects during the program that have a direct impact on City operations. The projects span a broad range of City functions, involving analytical, planning, and operational work. Past Fellowship placements have been in the Arts Commission, Public Utilities Commission, Recreation and Park, Airport, Municipal Transportation Agency, Controller, Public Works, and other City agencies. In addition to hands-on work experience and comprehensive professional development, Fellows will be paired with mentors in City government, seasoned leaders who wish to support the Fellows. Financial Clinic Fellowship Program

Deadline:

Fellows in the Financial Clinic Fellowship Program will serve for one year providing financial services to New York City's working poor, fostering a sense of civic engagement and social responsibility, and innovating solutions to the socio-economic problems they encounter. In addition to providing direct financial services to working poor over the course of their year of service, Fellows will be expected to write at least one white paper per month on a salient socio-political topic, and to research, design and develop a business plan or research proposal for a social innovation that will be presented at the end of the service year.

Prospective Fellows are civic-minded graduates or graduating seniors of leading colleges and universities with degrees in finance, business, or economics. Candidates must have excellent analytic, writing and

communications skills; envision themselves as a future finance or business leader; be able to handle and manipulate large amounts of data; and be prepared to travel to work with diverse, low-income communities. <http://thefinancialclinic.org/>

The Urban Fellows Program

Deadline: January 15, 2018

The Urban Fellows Program is a highly selective, nine-month fellowship which combines work in Mayoral offices and City agencies with an intensive seminar series that explores current urban issues impacting public policy. Program participants are diverse and come from all over the country to work in New York City.

After participating in an extensive interview process, New York City Urban Fellows are placed at an array of agencies across the City where they learn about public policy through a hands-on approach.

City Hall Fellows (Now San Francisco Fellows)

Deadline: January 15, 2018

This is a 12-month-long, post-college, pre-graduate school Fellowship program that integrates hands-on, full-time work local government work experience with intensive, comprehensive, real-politic-focused training in how cities work and the people, issues and organizations that influence local policy. Fellows spend their service year working on high-need, high-impact municipal initiatives in cities where they have personal ties. The year-long Fellowship starts with a 3-week orientation designed and run by City Hall

Fellows. The orientation grounds Fellows in the cultural, social and political history of their host community, builds cohort rapport and prepares Fellows for the Fellowship year. Thereafter, Fellows gather weekly for half-day sessions in our intensive, proprietary Civic Leadership Development Program (CLDP). Through guided discussions with policy-makers, policy-influencers and subject matter experts, workshops, behind-the-scenes site tours, reading assignments, and hands-on practice, Fellows develop the knowledge, skills and network necessary to become effective local civic leaders, both immediately and for the rest of their lives. <http://sfdhr.org/sfellows>

The Green Lining Institute
