

MESSAGE FROM PROFESSOR THOMAS PEGELOW KAPLAN INTERIM DIRECTOR



I stepped in as interim director of the Program in Jewish Studies this past summer at a time of repeated shootings on university campuses, most prominently at UNC-Chapel Hill. Disturbingly, the year quickly got a lot worse. The shock and trauma of the October 7 Hamas terrorist attacks on Israel that left some 1,200 Israeli women, men, and children dead have been overwhelming and devastating in and far beyond Israel. Many members of the CU and wider Boulder communities have family members, friends, and other loved ones in the region. Some of whom have been hurt, others murdered. The ongoing war in Israel, Gaza and, to an extent, the West Bank has cost many more lives. The fall-out, also on university campuses in the US, has been profound. There has been a noticeable rise in microaggressions, and verbal and even physical violence—some of which is steeped in antisemitism and some in other forms of racism. Students have felt increasingly unsafe and for the first time in a quarter century of college teaching in the US, some of my students expressed a visceral fear of being attacked (by outsiders) in my Jewish studies classroom and asked to go on Zoom for safety.

All of us in Jewish studies have had, and continue to have, many conversations and exchanges with each other, with students, faculty, and administrators across campus, and with parents and community members. This is not a time to be silent or alone. As a university program, the Program in Jewish Studies has done its share to address the many challenges that resulted from the October attack, especially by focusing on education and providing safe spaces. From issuing statements to reaching out to partners across campus, town, the state, and abroad, from organizing a panel discussion to a public community exchange with CU faculty experts, we have been trying to invite constructive dialogue even, and particularly, between those who have different positions on the ongoing conflict. It is not easy. But none of us will stop and we hope to bring even more members of the campus and broader community into dialogue in the coming year. I am grateful to everyone who contributed and joined us, and I invite those who have not done so already to join us in programs in 2024. This is too important to be left to those who bring about distrust and fan the flames on social media and elsewhere.

At the same time, I was privileged enough to help with the ongoing building and realignment of the Program in Jewish Studies. Everyone in the Program is enthusiastic about the hiring of our new, well-versed and experienced business manager, Felicia Naranjo Martinez. The Program has reviewed the stunning work done of our teaching professors, Rebecca Wartell and Eyal Rivlin, who were both unanimously recommended for promotion. In fact, as you will see on the following pages, the Program in Jewish Studies faculty and affiliates have accomplished a lot. I also want to mention the prestigious Outstanding Book Award from the History of Education Society garnered by Hilary Falb Kalisman for her study *Teachers as Statebuilders: Education of the Modern Middle East.* But first and foremost, I am personally grateful for all the supporters of the Program in the state and beyond, who play a special role in making our work possible. I am confident that with their help, we can continue to strengthen the Program even more by the time Professor Samira Mehta returns to Boulder next summer from her well-deserved fellowship at Harvard University. Thank you and all the very best during these difficult times at the end of yet another year.





DISCUSSIONS ON THE CRISIS IN ISRAEL, GAZA, & THE WEST BANK



Within days after the Hamas terrorist attacks on Israel on October 7, the Program in Jewish Studies began its programming and started to provide safe spaces to discuss the war and conflict in Israel, Gaza, and the West Bank. A first panel discussion on October 11 brought together CU faculty members with extensive expertise in the region. Political Scientist Prof. Zach Levey (International Affairs/ Jewish Studies), a visiting faculty member from the University of Haifa, Middle East scholar Prof. John Willis (History Department), and Middle East literature Prof. Karim Mattar (English Department) offered reflections on the conflict's context and history. The program aimed at providing

campus and Boulder area community members in search of information with solid insights that also revealed disinformation. It also sought to offer a space to come together for everyone in shock and pain to listen, ask questions, and offer thoughts of their own. After all, so many are directly impacted, have friends and family in the conflict zones, or even lost loved ones. Everyone was grateful for the composed and reflective exchanges that avoided shouting matches endured by other universities. In late November, the Program in Jewish Studies organized a community discussion event that brought more faculty members with expertise in various areas—from antisemitism to Palestinian history—to talk at length with students, faculty, staff, and community members. After more positive feedback from many participants, the Program will continue organizing this kind of programming in the new year.

WELCOME TO FELICIA NARANJO MARTINEZ

Felicia Naranjo Martinez has joined the Program of Jewish Studies staff to provide high level budgetary, financial, policy, and administrative support to the unit. She manages the day-to-day operations of the program including finances, human resources, public programs, curriculum and student outreach, and faculty affairs.

In her tenure at the University of Colorado Boulder, she has served as Executive Director of the Colorado European Union Center of Excellence, worked with Advancement and the Industry and Foundations Relations team, and in Environmental Studies as the Director of Special Projects. Holocaust Child Survivor Osi Sladek at CU

Tuesday, October 17, 2023 | Testimony by Holocaust Survivor Osi Sladek, hosted by the Louis P. Singer Chair in Jewish History and the Program in Jewish Studies Boulder

Oscar ("Osi") Staub (Sladek) was born in 1935 to an orthodox Jewish family in the town of Prešov (present-day Slovakia). Although he was younger than ten years of age when he was liberated, he remembers the persecutions that intensified at the beginning of the war and gradually being stripped of virtually everything. As in the rest of the country, deportations from Prešov took place in two waves in mid-1942 and late 1944-45. They were coordinated by the Germans, but largely carried out by their Slovakian allies. When the round-ups started, the Staubs (Sladeks) went into hiding, sometimes together, but often separately. They were liberated by the Red Army in late 1944. After the war, the family settled in Israel, where Osi began a musical career before, finally, immigrating to the U.S. Osi's testimony was followed by a Q-and-A and a book signing. FACULTY & STAFF UPDATES

Samuel Boyd published his latest book, *Babel: Political Rhetoric of a Confused Legacy*, this summer. He delivered a paper for the Society of Biblical Literature, which will be published in the journal *Metatron*. This fall, he submitted articles to the *Journal of Hebrew Scriptures* and *The Scandinavian Journal for the Old Testament*, and he has a forthcoming article in *Hebrew Bible/Ancient Israel* and a forthcoming article in an edited volume on the concept of the literary motif in biblical literature. He is also currently a fellow in the Office of Faculty Affairs. **Hilary Falb Kalisman's** book, *Teachers as State-Builders: Education and the Making of the Modern Middle East* won the annual History of Education Society Outstanding Book Award. She gave talks on her book, and her second book project at the University of Haifa, the Israel Academy of Sciences and Humanities, the University of Memphis, and Ole Miss. She also published an

article, "The Historiography of education in the Modern Middle East." Yonatan Malin presented a paper on Timing in Klezmer Performance at an international Symposium on Analytical Approaches to World Music. He was also pleased to host the renowned klezmer violinist Alicia Svigals and acclaimed silent film pianist Donald Sosin for a residency at CU Boulder and "cine-concert" (silent film with live music) at the Dairy Arts Center. The residency is a collaboration with the Boulder JCC, the Boulder Jewish Film Festival, Congregation Har HaShem, the College of Music, and the Program in Jewish Studies. Felicia Naranjo Martinez entered into her fifth year and second years serving on the board of directors for the Santa Fe World Affairs Forum, and for Growing Up Boulder and POCACITO, respectivley. Samira Mehta published a book titled The Racism of People Who Love You, which Oprah Daily called "the epitome of a book meeting a moment." She also received a fellowship to spend a year at Harvard University, as a Research Associate in the Women's Studies in Religion Program, where she is completing her book God Bless the Pill: Contraception and Sexuality in Tri-Faith America. In 2023, she also became a board member of Feminist Studies in Religion and the co-chair of the North American Religions Program Unit at the American Academy of Religion. Thomas Pegelow Kaplan published a co-edited volume entitled Holocaust and Police: One Generation After Christopher Browning's Ordinary Men (in German, with Brill/Schoeningh). The first (revised) paperback edition of his co-edited volume Resisting Persecution: Jews and Their Petitions during the Holocaust (with Berghahn Books) also appeared in the fall as did his latest single-authored book entitled The German-Jewish Press and Journalism Beyond Borders, 1933-1943 (in Hebrew, with Yad Vashem Publications). Pegelow Kaplan also received a grant from RIO's new Arts & Humanities Grant Program for a Russian-language edition of his book The Language of Nazi Genocide. Eval Rivlin continued to provide musical leadership and facilitation for Front Range Jewish communities including Yom Hazikaron and Yom Haatzmaut at the Boulder JCC, Yom Kippur at Congregation Nevei Kodesh, and Simchat Torah at Congregation Bonai Shalom, Following the October 7 events, he helped organize and produce the music at Congregation Har Hashem for the community vigil and brought together the local Israeli community for a vigil at the JCC. Rebecca Wartell contributed an entry on Rabbi David Nieto to the Encyclopedia of the Bible and its Reception and an article to the Journal of the Mediterranean Studies Association. She also presented papers on her research on early modern conversa women at conferences including the Association for Spanish & Portuguese Historical Studies and the Society for Crypto-Jewish Studies this year.

EMBODIED JUDAISM EXHIBIT

The Embodied Judaism series explores embodied Jewish life and experience through public gatherings and multimedia exhibits aimed at academic and non-academic audiences, drawing on materials in the Innovations in Jewish Life Collections held at CU Boulder. The 2022-2024 symposium and exhibit explores the significance of food for Jewish religious, cultural, national, and political identities, focusing on the United States and Israel/Palestine. It is a partnership between the Program in Jewish Studies and CU's Rare and Distinctive Collections. The symposium and exhibit are organized and curated by Gregg Drinkwater, Hilary Falb Kalisman, and Samira Mehta.



Join us for the exhibit opening on January 24 in room N345. The exhibit will be on display on the second floor landing of Norlin Library, CU Boulder campus from January to March 2024.

2023 UNDERGRADUATE RESEARCH ASSISTANTS
