

# Faculty Updates...



Dr. Lucy Chester, Associate Professor of History, has been invited to present at a conference at Stanford University entitled "Partitions: Towards Transnational History of **20th Century Territorial Separatism** from April 18-19. The conference's objective is to bring together scholars studying partitions in Ireland, India/Pakistan, Israel/Palestine to initiate interdisciplinary academic dialogue and explore a more synthetic and transnational study of partition. Dr. Chester's presentation will be entitled ""Close Parallels?" Interrelated Discussions of Partition in South Asia and the Palestinian Mandate (1936-1948)."



Dr. Nan Goodman, Professor of English, was recently awarded the prestigious **Huntington Library Fellowship.** This summer, she will be utilizing her fellowship to conduct research on her new book project, The Puritan Cosmopolis, which examines how the Puritans based the foundation for their Massachusetts society on the structure of the ancient Hebrew Republic and on the constant need to renew the covenant made at Mt. Sinai.

Dr. Paul Levitt, Professor of English, recently published a book entitled Stalin's Barber, a historical novel which tells the tale of Avraham Bahar, who "leaves debt-ridden and depressed Albania to seek a better life in Stalinist Russia. A professional barber, he curries favor with the Communist regime, ultimately being invited to become Stalin's personal barber at the Kremlin...Avraham, now known as Razan, not only barber's Stalin (or so he thinks), but also the many Stalin look-alikes that the paranoid dictator circulates to thwart possible assassination attempts - including a possible attempt from Razan himself." Nick's paper will be entitled "Selling Secular Ritual: Bain et Douches and the Communist Mikveh in Interwar Paris."

GLOBAL SEMINAR TO ISRAEL MAY 2013 "Justice, Human Rights, and Democracy in Israel" with Professor Caryn Aviv

\*This seminar is open to ALL students of ALL backgrounds and majors\*

Credits can be applied to major and minors in Jewish Studies.

For International Affairs majors, credits can be applied to Africa/Middle East geographic concentration (3 credits) and Functional Area IV, Institutions, Rights and Norms (3 credits). Credits can be applied to the Certificate in Middle Eastern and Islamic Studies offered through Asian Languages and Civilizations.

Up to \$4,000.00 in scholarships are available to help alleviate the costs of this program!

This newly approved global seminar will be offered as a Maymester 2013 course in Israel from May 21-June 20, 2013.

In this 6-credit Contemporary Societies core course, students will explore the complexities of democracy, human rights, and social justice in Israel and the West Bank. This course introduces students to people, ideas, places, and organizations that articulate diverse, multiple and competing perspectives about justice,

democracy, and human rights. We will explore how individuals and groups make sense of these concepts, and how diverse political commitments drive individual and collective choices and actions.



Beginning the second week in Jerusalem, students will participate in team-based service learning projects with non-profit organizations working in the region. Students will have the opportunity to learn from and network with experts working in social justice, human rights and democracy in Israel and the Middle East.

The seminar will take students to various locations in Israel and the West Bank but will be based out of Jerusalem in the historic neighborhood of Talpiot in apartment-like suites. Founded in 1922, Talpiot has access to major shopping centers and public transportation. It has become a cultural hub in Jerusalem, especially for the growing music scene.

The course will be led by <u>Professor Caryn Aviv</u>, Senior Instructor in Secular Jewish Society and Civilization. She earned her PhD in sociology and anthropology at Loyola University in Chicago. Dr. Aviv conducts research on and teaches in the areas of gender, sexuality, Zionism, Israel, and contemporary Jewish cultures.
