

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Faculty Updates...



Nan Goodman, Professor of English, CU's Fall 2013 College Scholar, was also recently awarded a prestigious Fulbright Fellowship for the Spring 2014

semester, which she will take up at Bogazici University in Istanbul, Turkey.

Bruce Montgomery, Professor and Director of Archives and Special Collections Faculty Fellow, published an article entitled "Rescue or Return: The Fate of the Iraqi Jewish Archive," which appeared in the most recent issue of the International Journal of Cultural Property (2013 20: 175-200, Cambridge University Press). The article analyzes the internationally contested archive that was discovered in the basement of the Iraqi secret police in Baghdad during the 2003 US invasion. Upon its discovery, the Coalition Provisional Authority rescued the archive and sent it to the U.S. for conservation. It has become contested cultural property between the Iragi government, which demands its immediate



David Shneer, Director of the Program in Jewish Studies, Louis P. Singer Chair of Jewish History, and Professor of History, served as the keynote speaker at Manchester Metropolitan University's international conference, Jews and Modern

Visual Culture. His talk "Her Cry Became the World's Cry: Dmitrii Baltermants' Grief and the Universalization of the Holocaust Through Soviet Photography," examined the relationship between photographic aesthetics and the politics of photography's circulation in understanding how key images of the Holocaust became universalized during the Cold War. He has also recently been named editor-in-chief of East European Jewish Affairs, an interdisciplinary journal which is essential for an understanding of the position and prospects of Jews in the former Soviet Union and the countries of East-Central Europe. He takes over editorship January 1, 2014. Professor Shneer also presented this past Friday, October 4 at the German Studies Association in Denver. He will be serving as the annual Kristallnacht

The inaugural Embodied Judaism project, which includes a symposium and exhibit, highlights the life and work of Rabbi Zalman Schachter-Shalomi and his role in shaping

Jewish Renewal, the newest movement in Judaism, examining it as a religion, social movement and philosophy of spiritual transformation in American from the late 1940s to the present. "The Sound of Ecstasy," the first in the Embodied Judaism series, will focus on the importance of music to awaken the spiritual.

The Program in Jewish Studies list of <u>spring 2014 courses</u> have now been posted online. We are offering many new and exciting classes this coming semester!

<u>Sharon Weiss-Greenberg</u>, who earned her Ph.D. from New York University, will be a visiting instructor in Religious Studies and Jewish Studies. She will be teaching RLST/JWST4260 Topics in Judaism: Taboos in Orthodox Judaism. This course will



begin with the birth and development of Orthodox Judaism and then will focus on the various "camps" within the Orthodox community and the ways they collaborate and compete. We will look at hot button, and often politicized, issues in many religious communities around the world including the place of the bible in contemporary life, the role of women, and the always contentious question of who's "in" and who's "out" of the community.

Professor of History and Jewish Studies, will be offering HIST/JWST4348 Topics in Jewish History: Tel Aviv: Urban History and Culture. This seminar offers a multifaceted exploration of the city of Tel Aviv, founded in 1909 as a new Jewish garden suburb of the city of Jaffa, which it eventually annexed. Tel Aviv, planned from the ground up as a model Zionist city, was the site of Zionist political and cultural activity, a symbol for the movement's development, and a space in which the

Through inquiries into urban studies, city planning, architecture, identity, space, politics, language, culture, and conflict we will use the prism of one metropolitan area to explore themes in urban



studies, the history of Palestine and Israel, and tensions of Zionist and Israeli state building, and Israeli-Palestinian relations in the 20th and early 21st centuries.



Sasha Senderovich, Assistant Professor of Germanic and Slavic Languages and Literatures and Jewish Studies, HEBR/RUSS/JWST4401 The Russian Jewish Experience. This class will examine the experience of Russian Jews from the late 19th century to the present through fiction and films dealing with challenges of co-existence between Jews and their neighbors. The course will look at the Bolshevik Revolution, Stalinism, the Holocaust, and the post-Stalin period, as well as analyze the place of Jews as

individuals and a minority within Russian and Soviet society. It will also look at the phenomenon of the emigration of Russian Jews to America and elsewhere at the turn of the 21st century.

This course meets core requirements for literature and the arts.
