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Originally from Lodi, CA, **Rachel** graduated from the University of Colorado Boulder in 2012 with a BA in Jewish Studies and International Affairs with a concentration in the Middle East. **We would like to congratulate Rachel for her recent acceptance to the Masters program at Rothberg International School at the Hebrew University in Jerusalem**, "a program designed to create a cadre of leaders in the non-profit world with cutting-edge skills and theoretical and practical knowledge in management, entrepreneurship, and leadership". Rachel will be studying Non-Profit Management and Leadership in order to pursue her passion of working in the Jewish community. Prior to starting grad school, she will be volunteering at a

kibbutz in the south of Israel.

Since graduation, Rachel has traveled extensively and worked with a Denver-based non-profit called <u>The Jewish Experience</u>. While a student at CU, Rachel participated in the <u>Internship in Jewish Studies</u>, serving as an intern for the <u>Rose Community</u> <u>Foundation</u>. She states, "My internship experience with the Program in Jewish Studies was really instrumental in obtaining a job in the Jewish nonprofit world after college. In fact, my boss directly told me that this experience was a main reason he was confident in hiring me!"

Rachel's senior <u>Capstone Project in Jewish Studies</u> focused on Jewish Youth Philanthropy. Rachel researched youth foundations across the nation, comparing how programs were structured, program leadership, and evaluations. Her project sought to find similarities and differences between programs, explore their challenges, and "see what really works" in order to determine where the field is going in the future. Rachel says, "It was really interesting and a great follow up to my internship with the Rose Foundation."

Rachel advises students interested in <u>Major or Minoring in Jewish Studies</u> to "get to know the professors and individuals who have worked so hard to make the program as successful as it is. They are great contacts to add to your professional network and can also become friends and mentors. 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Lectures on Medieval Judaism with Professor Thomas F. Glick...



Thomas F. Glick is Professor of History and Gastronomy at Boston University where he teaches courses on the history of science and technology and food history. He is author of <u>Islamic</u> and Christian Spain in the Early Middle Ages (2nd ed., 2005), From Muslim Fortress to Christian Castle: Social and Cultural Change in Medieval Spain (1995); Irrigation and Hydraulic Technology: Medieval Spain and its Legacy (1996), Einstein in Spain (1988), and co-author of <u>Negotiating Darwin: The Vatican Confronts</u> <u>Evolution, 1877-1902</u> (2006). Professor Glick was awarded an honorary doctorate by the University of Valencia in 2010. He has

also held Guggenheim, National Endowment for the Humanities, National Science Foundation, and Fulbright fellowships. He is currently a fellow of the Reial.


well as provide Russia with a national identity it has lacked for 25 years.

On February 21, 2012, five young women of the Russian punk band Pussy Riot, clad in neon-colored dresses and tights, performed a "punk prayer" begging the Mother of God to "get rid



of Putin" in the Cathedral of Christ the Savior in Moscow. They were quickly arrested, tried and sentenced to prison but the incident captured international attention and footage of their performance went viral. People across the globe recognized this as not only a fierce act of political confrontation but also an inspired work of art that, in a time and place saturated with lies and deception, found a new way to speak the truth. Gessen's riveting account tells how such a phenomenon came about. Drawing on her exclusive access to the members of Pussy Riot and their families, including her interviews with them during the time they were imprisoned in Russian penal colonies, she reconstructs the personal journeys that transformed a group of young women into artists with a shared vision, gave them the courage and imagination to express it and endowed them with the strength to endure the devastating loneliness and isolation that has been the price of their triumph.

About Masha Gessen:

Masha Gessen is a bilingual Russian-American journalist. Born in the Soviet Union, she immigrated with her parents to the United States as a teenager at a time when many other Soviet Jewish families were leaving the USSR. She returned to live and work in Russia in the 1990s, where she reported on Russia's political and cultural situation from the early 1990s to the present. Following a slew of homophobic legislation adopted by Russia's government in 2013, she re-immigrated to the US with her family later that year. Gessen is the author of The Man Without A Face (2012), an acclaimed and controversial biography of Vladimir Putin as well as Dead Again: The Russian Intelligentsia after Communism (1997), Esther and Ruzya: How My Grandmothers Survived Hitler's War and Stalin's Peace (2004), Blood Matters: From Inherited Illness to Designer Babies, How the World and I Found Ourselves in the Future of the Gene (2008), and Perfect Rigor: A Genius and the Mathematical Breakthrough of the Century (2009). She has written for The New Republic, Granta, Slate, Vanity Fair, US News and World Report, The New York Review of Books and The New York Times. She recently edited, together with Josh Huff-Hannon, Gay Propaganda: Russian Love Stories (2014), a collection of narratives by Russian gay and lesbian community in response to Russia's anti-gay legislation. She is currently at work on a book about the Tsarvnaev brothers - the two suspects in the Boston Marathon bombing in April 2013.

Masha Gessen's visit is part of the annual **Russian Culture Week**, presented by the <u>Russian Studies Program</u>. This year's series runs from April 21-25. <u>RLST/JWST4260/5260 | Topics in Judaism: Is God Dead?</u> <u>Elias Sacks</u>, Assistant Professor of Religious Studies and Jewish Studies, and Director of Graduate Studies for the Program in Jewish Studies

Does it make sense to believe in God, and should believing or not believing in God make a difference for how individuals lead their lives? This course will explore diverse answers to these questions, examining debates surrounding the existence and nature of a higher power in ancient, medieval, and modern sources. We will devote special attention to topics such as the problem of evil, the nature of revelation, and the ethical and political significance of religious belief, considering issues including the status of belief in God in the wake of events such as the Holocaust, the relationship between religious commitments and scientific knowledge, and the implications of belief in God for



debates surrounding topics such as violence and sexuality. We will focus primarily on Jewish, Christian, and philosophical sources, while also placing this material in conversation with works drawn from other traditions.

This course will look at a broad spectrum of texts, which show the various ways Jewish authors across space have understood the world in the 20th and 21st centuries. Taught in English.
