

Welcome Back from our Director, Professor David Shneer...

Welcome Back Students, Staff, and Faculty...

CU is the only university in the Rocky Mountain Region with a degree-granting undergraduate program in Jewish Studies and a burgeoning graduate program working across the disciplines. In addition, we teach between 1500 and 2000 students every year from all kinds of backgrounds and experiences, as our faculty and students together create transformative classrooms. The Program in Jewish Studies gives its students both a world-class education in the classroom and professional and life skills through experiential learning, co-curricular activities, and community partnerships. The Service Learning Internship in Jewish Studies (JWST3930) offers professional development opportunities for students in areas of non-profit management, community service, business, politics and more, including the opportunity to intern with Congressperson Jared Polis.



For students and their parents, our graduates were nearly all employed shortly after graduation in education, public service, the for- and not-for-profit sectors, or going on to law and medical school, because their senior-year <u>capstone projects</u> demonstrated their depth of knowledge and impressive range of skills. These skills include knowledge of a second language such as Hebrew and German, both of which have been languages of our graduates, and we look forward to working with students in Arabic, Spanish, Russian, French, Italian, Yiddish, Judeo-Spanish, or other languages.

Globally, our students travel the world to learn about other cultures and places, and bring that experience back to their CU classrooms. Our professors travel the world teaching others about their

specialties and conducting cutting edge research to advance knowledge about the past and present of the Jewish experience. This past May, under my guidance and that of Jamie Polliard, our former Assistant Director, 11 CU Boulder students spent five weeks based in Jerusalem in our global seminar, Justice, Human Rights and Democracy in Israel and the West Bank. Stay tuned to our website and newsletter for details about opportunities for the coming academic year, which may include a global seminar to Turkey!

Istanbul serves as the culmination of a year dedicated to the study of Mediterranean, Middle Eastern, and Spanish Jewry, known as Sephardim. The year-long project opens with a visit from renowned prize-winning poet Peter Cole, author of the book Sacred Trash (about the Cairo Geniza), translator extraordinaire of medieval Spanish Hebrew poetry, and poet himself, from whose new collection The Invention of Influence he will be reading. Over the course of the year, we will co-host the University of Chicago's David Nirenberg, a specialist in medieval Mediterranean Jewry, whose new book Anti-Judaism: The Western Tradition is as controversial as it is brilliant. Our annual Holocaust memorial lecture in January will focus on Salonika, Greece, formerly a port city of the Ottoman Empire, with Devin Naar from the University of Washington. The year rounds out with our 2015 Sondra Bender Visiting Scholar, Dr. Sarah Stein, Amado Professor of Sephardic History at UCLA and winner of the Sami Rohr Prize in Jewish Literature for her book Plumes: Ostrich Feathers, Jews, Dondra Global Commerce. With that kind of inspiration, our global seminar to Istanbul is bound to be oversubscribed.

We hope the fall semester is exciting, engaging and thought-provoking and we look forward to seeing you in our classrooms or at some of our events scheduled throughout the semester. Our doors are always open to everyone, so please never hesitate to bring your questions to me, Dr. Steve Glickman, or Meghan Zibby, whose offices are located in the University Club, Suite A-3.
