



"Post-Holocaust American Judaism" with David Shneer...

Post World War II America is often characterized negatively by suburbanization and the rise of a bland consumer culture obsessed with accumulation rather than reflection. But it is also the period when the



United States became the fertile petry dish for new kinds of Judaism. From Brooklyn-based Chabad Lubavitch Hasidism to 1960s Do-It-Yourself Judaism and American Zionism, this minicourse will examine American Judaism from World War II to the present. We will pay particular attention to materials now housed at the University of Colorado Libraries Archives and Special Collections Post Holocaust American Judaism Archive which contains materials documenting this movement, from Arthur Waskow's Freedom Seders to Rabbi Zalman Schachter Shalomi's early ideas about deep ecumenicism. Participants will also be invited to an intimate gathering with the university's annual Sondra Bender Visiting Scholar, Dr. Shaul Magid, who will be in residence one week later. The afternoon will include a guided tour of the "Rabbi Zalman Schachter-Shalomi and the Origins of Post-Holocaust American Judaism" exhibit and archive currently on display in Norlin Library with Stephanie Yuhas, Ph.D., Archives Project Director.



David Shneer has been called a "pathbreaking" scholar by the Frankfurter Allgemeine Zeitung. Shneer is professor of History and Religious Studies, Louis P. Singer Endowed Chair in Jewish History, and Director of the Program in Jewish Studies. His research focuses on 20th century European, Russian, and Jewish history and culture. Shneer lectures nationally and internationally and has authored numerous books and articles about contemporary Jewish identity. In his broader work, Shneer serves as consultant to numerous Jewish agencies, and he co-founded Jewish Mosaic, the first national Jewish LGBT organization, which merged with Keshet in 2010. He consults with non-profit organizations around issues of

integrating post-Soviet Jews into Jewish communal life, serving as co-chair of Limmud Colorado and vice-chair of Keshet, and working with Facing History and Ourselves, a global non-profit dedicated to fostering a democratic, human-rights oriented education in high schools.


"After Multiculturalism: Postethnicity and Judaism in America"

Following Rabbi Schachter-Shalomi's opening remarks on "Paradigm Shift Judaism," Magid's lecture, based on his recent book, <u>American Post-Judaism: Identity and Renewal in a Postethnic Society</u>, will explore contemporary American Jewish life and Jewish Renewal. His lecture will be followed by a roundtable discussion featuring <u>Elias Sacks</u>, Assistant Professor of Religious Studies at CU, <u>David Shneer</u>, Louis P. Singer Chair in Jewish History at CU, <u>Deborah Whitehead</u>, Assistant Professor of Religious Studies at CU and <u>Rabbi Zvi Ish-Shalom</u>, Assistant Professor of Religious Studies at Naropa University.

Shaul Magid is Professor in the Department of Religious Studies and the Jay and Jeannie Schottenstein Chair in Modern Judaism at Indiana University Bloomington. He is the editor of God's Voice from the Void: Old and New Essays on Rabbi Nahman of Bratslav, co-editor of Beginning Again: Toward a Hermeneutic of Jewish Texts and author of Hasidism on the Margin: Reconciliation, Antinomianism, and Messianism in Izbica and Radzin Hasidism. His book From Metaphysics to Midrash: Myth, History and the Interpretation of Scripture in Lurianic Kabbala was awarded the 2008 American Academy of Religion Award for best textual studies book in religion. Magid is also a regular contributor to Tikkun Magazine, Zeek Magazine, Religion Dispatches, and Occasional Religion.

Magid's recent book, *American Post-Judaism: Identity and Renewal in a Postethnic Society* will be available for purchase and signing after the event.

Magid's research highlights the recent work and development of the <u>Post-Holocaust</u> <u>American Judaism Archive</u> at the University of Colorado Boulder. The focus of this archive is on materials examining Judaism and the Jewish experience through the lens of religious, cultural and social movements in America, as well as the various philosophies of Judaism and Jewish organizations, originating from the late 1940s to the present.

<u>Fund</u> to honor the life of a woman who cherished Jewish culture, celebrated education, and lived life to the fullest.


