Message from the Director



Thanks to our wonderful students, faculty, staff, community members, and generous donors, the Program in Jewish Studies at the University of Colorado Boulder flourished this year. We hit several high notes with our programming, including my personal favorite – the standing room only third biannual Embodied Judaism Symposium: SHE and exhibition on the Shekhinah. This program rounded out our year-long Community Talks series on mysticism, before we switched to a semester-long focus on Sephardic Jews, with a popular talk by author Ariel Sabar on the Jews of Iraq and a sleeper hit by Professor Aviva Ben-Ur on the Jews of Surinam. (Who knew?)

We awarded three new scholarships, including one for undergraduate research in our ever-growing Post-Holocaust American Judaism Collections, to which we added two new collections. We continued to teach and expand our curriculum, hired two

new faculty, one in Israel/Palestine Studies and one instructor, supported faculty research in new areas, and collaborated with several other academic units, including History, English, and Film Studies, among others. We hosted our annual Hebrew Schmooze-a-Palooza, which gets

bigger every year and features the musical talents of our faculty and Hebrew students. Watch this space for our *leibedik* (lively) Yiddish-themed programming for 2018-2019, including some fabulous Klezmer-style music and talks about

Yiddish poetry, the books smuggled out of Vilna during WW II, and more.

Embodied Judaism Symposium: SHE.

NEW FACULTY IN JEWISH STUDIES

HILARY KALISMAN

Hilary Falb Kalisman will join the CU Boulder faculty this academic year as an Associate Professor of History and Jewish Studies and the Jewish Studies Endowed Professor of Israel/Palestine Studies. Professor Kalisman graduated from Brown University with a BA in Middle Eastern Studies and received her MA and PhD from the University of California, Berkeley. Her research investigates education, political culture, state and nation-building in Israel/Palestine as well as in the Modern Middle East, and her teaching interests combine Jewish and Middle Eastern history. At CU Boulder, she will teach "Modern Childhood in Israel and Palestine," "Introduction to Jewish History: Since 1492," and the "Arab/Israeli Conflict," among other courses.

REBECCA WARTELL

Rebecca Wartell joins us Fall 2018 as an Instructor in Jewish Studies. Professor Wartell's research area is Sephardi Jews in the early modern period, with a focus on the rabbinic texts of Mediterranean Jewish communities. She explores Jewish/Christian and Jewish/ Muslim historical interactions, with a particular interest in the Roman Inquisition of the sixteenth century. An experienced educator, Professor Wartell enjoys teaching courses in Jewish culture and history to students of all ages and backgrounds. She has a Master's degree in Theological Studies from Harvard University and will receive her PhD in History in 2018 from Monash University in Melbourne, Australia. She is thrilled to be returning to her home state of Colorado, where she is a fourth-generation native.





Faculty Updates

The Program in Jewish Studies boasts award-winning, interdisciplinary faculty, who are leaders in scholarship, teaching, and student mentorship. This year, our faculty accomplished a considerable amount both in and out of the classroom.

Samuel Boyd received a CHA Faculty Fellowship for Spring 2019. He will be finishing his first book, The Borrowed Bible, and begin work on his second, tentatively titled Babylon without Babble. Brian Catlos received the prestigious 2018 Haskins Medal, awarded by the Medieval Academy of America, for his monograph Muslims of Medieval Latin

Christendom. Nan Goodman published a new book, The Puritan Cosmopolis (Oxford UP 2018), that provides an unexpected link between the Puritans, Jews, and Ottomans in the early modern world. Yonatan Malin participated in the inaugural Archive Transformed residency this past spring, together with renowned klezmer fiddler Alicia Svigals and pianist Uli Geissendoerfer. Eval Rivlin performed music for diverse audiences at multiple festivals and Shavuot events in Denver and Boulder. He also served as the musical director for the Israeli American Council for Yom Hazikaron (Israel Memorial Day). Elias Sacks recently published essays in volumes on immortality and Judaism and on gender, Judaism, and aesthetics in the Enlightenment, and spoke at conferences in Portland and Princeton; he will also be speaking this summer at Jagiellonian University in Krakow, Poland. David Shneer gave a talk on Soviet photography in at the Wiener Library in London, taught at the Helix program in Los Angeles during, and is currently finishing his book manuscript, under contract with Oxford University Press, called Grief: The Biography of a Holocaust Photograph. Davide Stimilli received a CHA Faculty Fellowship for this Fall 2018 and will travel to Vienna, Austria in Spring 2019 on a Fulbright/IFK Senior Fellowship.



MEET PROFESSOR BEVERLY WEBER

Beverly Weber is an Associate Professor of German Studies and Jewish Studies at CU Boulder and is currently serving as the Director of Graduate Studies for Jewish Studies. Her primary research and teaching interests include the intersections of race, gender, and migration in Germany and Europe, comparative studies of racialization, contemporary German literature and culture, and Islam in Europe.

Professor Weber is currently working on two book projects. The first is an examination of racism and "welcome" culture in relationship to contemporary refugee migration to Germany and Europe. She is interested in how movements for welcome/hospitality generate possibilities for ethical cohabitation. Her second book, co-authored with Maria Stehle, considers how Western European films in the last few decades depict intimate relationships in the face of precarious conditions.

As the Director of Graduate Studies this past year, Professor Weber spearheaded the new Jewish Studies Graduate Certificate. In addition to leading the Jewish Studies interdisciplinary graduate



student colloquium, in which graduate students workshop current projects and papers, Professor Weber mentors graduate students as they pursue the certificate and produce original research and creative works.

Professor Weber will be giving a talk on refugees October 4, 2018 at the Carbondale Branch Library as part of the CU Boulder Peak to Peak Series. She is teaching "Representing the Holocaust" Fall 2018.
