For the Program in Jewish Studies, 2016-2017 was a wonderful year! We instructed over 500 students of all backgrounds in the complexities of the Jewish experience; hosted 15 events and speakers; received three grants to support student and community programming; and awarded 14 fellowships to our students in turn. We moved forward with our innovative planning, established two concentration options for our Major, added five new collections to our growing Post-Holocaust American Judaism collections, and created a Community Advisory Board. We are pleased to announce that as of May 2017, students pursuing a Major in Jewish Studies may now choose from one of two Major concentrations: The **Culture Intensive Concentration** allows students to pursue an in-depth study of Jewish culture, while the **Foreign Language Intensive Concentration** allows students to obtain advanced language skills in addition to considerable knowledge of Jewish culture.

The Program in Jewish Studies also offers two minors, a **Minor** in Jewish Studies, which provides students with an in-depth understanding and appreciation of the world through the lens of Jewish Studies, and a **Minor** in **Hebrew** and **Israel Studies**, which develops students' Hebrew language skills while focusing on issues related to Israel and the Middle East.


