This job requires someone dedicated enough AND whose schedule permits, to come back later in the day, on one or both of his/her watering days to see what s/he missed. This process continues until you are skilled enough to know how to water properly. Are you this kind of person? (Be careful what you answer here. If hired, this will be REQUIRED.)
