# Low turnout dooms referenda

## **USSA, SOLAR MEASURES FAIL**

The turnout for University of Colorado Student Union (UCSU) elections wasn't high enough to pass two referenda on the ballot, a common CU student voting problem.

Two weeks ago students had the chance to vote on increasing solar power and solar panels on campus in exchange for a \$2.80 per student per semester fee and membership in the United States Students Association (USSA) for \$.85 per student per semester.

Both measures had more votes in favor than opposed according to preliminary results, but failed because they did not garner the required 10 percent of affirmative votes from CU's nearly 30,000 students to officially pass.

For solar power 1,938 voted yes, and for USSA 1,619 voted yes. Each measure needed 2,925 yes votes to pass.

According to UCSU Public Relations Director Jessica Bralish, the phenomenon isn't uncommon for fall elections.

"In the fall we usually have lower voter turnout, ... maybe because the executives are not running in the fall, there's less attention," she said Tuesday. "This year was actually higher than most (fall elections)."

She said either referendum can return in the spring, but added that UCSU is not considering changing the studentbody voting requirement anytime soon.

"There's not any talk of it right now, but if Legislative Council wanted to, they could change the election code," she said.

UCSU Legislative Council can also take bills into its own hands. Council passed a \$15 per student per semester increase in fees on Oct. 28 for recreation, down from its original \$21 per student per semester proposal earlier in the semester. The fee will start in fall 2006 or whenever the project is 50 percent completed and will renovate fields such as Farrand and Kitteredge, among others.

The measure also failed in campus-wide vote last spring despite more votes in favor because not enough people voted.
