93% of graduates report full-time employment 10 months after graduation


88% of graduates report full-time, long-term jobs that require bar passage — higher than any Colorado Law class since 2011, and nearly four percentage points higher than the next best class (2023)

77 graduates are working in law firms, and 47 report employment at a National Law Journal 500 law firm, while five additional grads will join an NLJ 500 firm after clerkship — a third of all employed 2024 graduates (up from 22% of employed 2023 grads)

31 graduates are clerking for judges

Graduates reporting full-time, long-term jobs that either require bar passage or for which a JD degree was an advantage, including post-JD degrees.













Highlight: Leaders in Law and Community Public Service Fellowship

This fellowship is Colorado Law's only full-ride, 3-year scholarship supporting high-achieving students from underrepresented or financially disadvantaged backgrounds, with many choosing Colorado Law over Ivy League options, thus strengthening the school's national reputation.

Loan Repayment Assistance Program

In the 2024–25 academic year, Colorado Law's Loan Repayment Assistance Program (LRAP) made 25 awards — a total of \$162,500 — to alumni, easing their burden of educational debt. Through forgivable loans of \$6,500, LRAP provides partial loan repayment support to graduates who pursue qualifying public interest legal work. Awards are renewed annually and forgiven after a year of eligible employment, ensuring that dedicated alumni can focus on serving the public good without being deterred by financial constraints.

Dan Vigil (Law'82) has seen Colorado Law from almost every angle — as a student, alum, staff member and instructor. Above all, this multifaceted perspective has given him gratitude for his own experiences and the desire to pay it forward.

"Education is one of the most important things that a young person can participate in. It can make dreams come true."

Dan's connection to CU started in 1979, when he enrolled as a student at the law school. After graduating and going into private practice, he returned only a couple years later to serve as assistant dean — and later associate dean — for student affairs until 2003. He was also an instructor for several courses during that time, from criminal law to legal writing, touching the lives of countless students along the way.

In 2021 he received the William Lee Knous Award, Colorado Law's highest alumni honor recognizing outstanding achievement and sustained service to the school.

To honor his time at Colorado Law and give back to a place that has meant so much to his life, Dan has made a generous estate gift to the Dean's Fund for Excellence. He hopes his gift will give the school flexibility to invest in students and initiatives as needs and opportunities arise.

"The law school opened doors for me," he said, describing his experience practicing and teaching law as well as serving in impactful appointments on Supreme Court committees and the Colorado Lottery Commission. "All of these things wouldn't have happened had I not attended CU's law school. It had a tremendous impact on my life."

Now, Dan says he's excited about the legacy his estate gift will create, as well as its potential to inspire others.

"It's important to return the favor and show appreciation and gratitude — and that's why I want to give money back."
