The Morris K. Udall and Stewart L. Udall Foundation's Native American Congressional Internship program offers Native American and Alaska Native graduate and law students a unique opportunity to gain professional leadership experience in Washington, DC. I request your assistance in identifying students who would be excellent candidates for our program and encouraging them to apply. Enclosed are recruitment materials for you to share with students and colleagues.

Our fully-funded, ten-week summer internship in Washington, DC, offers distinctive opportunities for Native American and Alaska Native graduate and law students who are interested in learning more about the federal legislative process while gaining an insider's view of the government's unique trust relationship with tribes. Interns work in congressional and agency offices where they have opportunities to research legislative issues important to tribal communities, hone their legal research and writing skills, and network with public officials and tribal advocacy groups.

The Foundation seeks potential candidates who demonstrate academic excellence, leadership qualities, and an interest in working with Native American issues and policy. Interns are provided round-trip airfare, lodging, per diem, and an educational stipend. The applications deadline is January 31, 2013.

The Udall Foundation was founded to honor Morris K. Udall's thirty years of service in the U.S. House of Representatives. In 2009, Congress enacted legislation to add Stewart L. Udall, Morris Udall's older brother, to the Foundation. The two worked together on many environmental and Native American initiatives while Stewart Udall was Secretary of the Interior and Morris Udall a member of Congress. Since 1996, 99 tribes have been represented in the Congressional Internship program.



Native American Congressional Internship Program

Our ten-week, fully funded summer internship in Washington, D.C., is for Native American and Alaska Native students who wish to learn more about the federal government and issues affecting Indian Country. We arrange placement in a congressional or agency office where you'll have opportunities to research legislative issues important to tribal communities, network with public officials and tribal advocacy groups, and experience an insider's view of the federal government.

BENEFITS:

- Roundtrip airfare to and from Washington, D.C. and a daily allowance for meals, transportation and incidentals
- Paid apartment-style housing provided with an on-site coordinator
- Meetings with distinguished members of Congress, and directors and staff of federal agencies
- A \$1,200 educational stipend upon completion of the internship
