Course Description: This course will look at classic and popular American horror films in an historical context in which we will examine the how horror films represent our culture's "collective fears." This course will also provide an analysis of the horror film genre. We will attempt to identify the defining features of the genre and account for the enduring appeal of horror films. We will also consider the contexts in which films are made and consider the reception of horror, studying the marketing of classic horror, the critical reception of the genre and tracing horror's relationship to both 'low-culture' and avant-garde cinema.

Attendance, Participation and Late Work: Class attendance is required (including screenings). You must be present for the entire class to be counted present. Every class is important. If you are consistently absent, you jeopardize your success in the course. If you miss more than three (3) classes, for any reason, your final grade will drop by one grade point (A to A-; A- to B+, B+ to B, etc.). Being on time to class is expected and consistent lateness is considered disruptive to the class. Three late arrivals equal one absence. Late work will be docked one grade (A to A-; A- to B+ etc.) for each day it is late.

Electronic Devices: The classroom is a learning environment and should be free from computer and cell phone interruption. (*Laptops may only be used for taking notes.*)

Short Essays: Choose **ONE question** from the discussion questions and write a **2-page** answer that includes at least one reference to the assigned reading. Thoughtful engagement with the reading and the films is just as important as the 'right' answer. All short essays will be turned in on D2L.

QUIZZES: Each quiz will consist of **FIVE** short answer questions on the reading and the films. (Each answer is worth 5 points; partial credit may be awarded.)

GROUP PRESENTATION: (3-4 people) Your presentation will give you the opportunity to choose either a film on the syllabus or one of your own choice and present your ideas to the class. Each group will choose a 3-5 minute clip from a feature-length film to present to the class. (You may choose a film being screened in class or a film of the group's choice. All films must be approved.) After analyzing and discussing the film, together create an academic lesson plan for the film—that is, choose ONE reading assignments for the film, write **FIVE** discussion questions for the film that integrates the reading. Create exam "keys" or answers to your discussion questions. (Presentations will around mid-semester.)

In order to create context for your presentation, you will show brief clips or still shots from the trilogy and explain in the plot/theme in broad terms. In your discussion, please be sure to have one discussion question on each of the following—

- 1. relevance to the representation of horror film genre
- 2. relevance to the ideas or concepts discussed in the readings and class discussion
- 3. historical context (how the film represents the historical context of either the time period of the film or the year the film was produced)
- 4. style(s) (analysis of the film's cinematic style in context to its time and place in cinematic history or in comparison to traditional Hollywood formulas)
- 5. major possible meanings (explicit and implicit)

Finally, as a group, you will lead a class discussion based on your discussion questions and written answer key. You will turn in your discussion questions and answer key to me on the day of your group's presentation. Presentations should not last longer than 30 minutes.

Term Essay: The goal of your assignment is to analyze one historical time period's films; i.e., choose between Early Horror, 1970s Horror, or 1990s Horror or ONE Horror Film screened in class. Choose one or more films and write an **8-page** essay that analyzes the significance of the set of films to the film industry, the horror genre, the historical period and/or popular culture. Your essay must have a thesis with supporting evidence from the films and readings to support your claim. Your essay should develop further or go beyond the ideas discussed in the readings and during class discussions. Your essay should use specific examples from the film(s) and the assigned reading. If you use other sources, these must also be documented using MLA style. For all essays, pages must be numbered, double-spaced, in typeface about the same size as this. Film titles must be *italicized*. Essays must include brief quotations, summaries, and paraphrases of ideas from the required readings. To check for correct spellings of the names of actors, characters, directors, cinematographers, etc., go to Imdb.com. All Term Essays will be turned in on D2L.

FINAL COLLABORATIVE FILM:

Final project options offer you the opportunity to work with other students. The goal is to share knowledge and learn from each other. Together, create a short film (under 10 min.) in the style of one of the filmmakers studied this semester. The video can be a parody, or it can be done straight, but successful videos will be ones that other members of this class can easily recognize as having been created in the style, for example, of Alfred Hitchcock. This project can involve several students. We will screen the films in class on Mon. Dec. 7th and Wed. Dec. 9th and vote on them. The top 2 films will be screened during LRAP's Celebration of the Arts on the evening of Wed., Dec. 9th.

GRADING: All assignments will be graded on a points system based on their adherence to the assignment and on thoroughness, accuracy, clarity, and effective articulation of the course material. The more fully you apply the concepts from the course, the more effective your project will be (and the higher your grade).

Letter grades have the following value:

A (90%-100%)= Excellent in all respects, including content, organization, language, and style. Interesting, original, and persuasive work that develops a strong argument in support of a well-defined thesis or central idea. Shows a thorough knowledge of all relevant course materials to date.

B (80%-89%) = Good in all the respects noted above. Solid work.

C = **(70%-79%)** = **Average**. May have potentially excellent ideas, but has problems in focus, style, mechanics, clarity, or precision and therefore fails to do justice to those ideas. Or may be clearly and correctly written but is generally uninformed or uninspired.

D (60%-69%)= Below Average. May have some good ideas, but does not develop and support a strong thesis that reflects a solid knowledge of course materials; or may be riddled with mechanical errors.

F (59% or below)= Time to seek advice.
