9:30 AM MDT / 8:30 PDT August 10 Regular Session	National Geologic Map Database (NGMD) – Dave Soller, Geologist, U.S. Geological Survey The USGS and the Association of American State Geologists are mandated by Congress to provide a National Geologic Map Database (NGMDB, http://ngmdb.usgs.gov/) of standardized, spatial geoscience information. In this partnership, collaboration occurs with the libraries, universities, the private sector, and geological survey agencies in other countries. At the NGMDB website, users can browse and query the U.S. Geologic Names Lexicon (GEOLEX) and the Geoscience Map Catalog (containing citations and links to >89,000 publications by >630 publishers, many containing GIS data and map images), and obtain access to the source information wherever it resides. The NGMDB project is now redesigning the underlying database and the Web interface in order to improve access to a wider array of geoscience information. A significant part of this effort is focused on creating, managing, and delivering (via a modern map interface) many thousand scanned and georeferenced images of geologic maps; some of this material is from the 19th century, and represents a fascinating and informative resource for future scientific studies.
