What a great Fall 2023 Semester for our unit! Thank you to all the Midshipmen, OCs, MECEPs, and staff members for a truly memorable semester as we welcomed our largest freshman (4/C) class in many years. Despite the large influx of new members, it was very apparent to me that our upperclassmen and our Top 5 leaders made a terrific effort on-boarding our newest members before our most important events of the semester.

Speaking of these events, the meticulous planning and execution of our Fall events by all of our Midshipmen OICs were exceptionally well done. Our New Student Orientation (NSO) laid the groundwork for quickly integrating our 4<sup>th</sup> class midshipmen and setting the tone for training. After many futile years of competing against the Army and Air Force ROTC in the annual Tri-Mil Field Meet, we finally took home the trophy with a near complete sweep of all events in dominant fashion. Just a few days later, 17 members of the unit participated in the Boulderthon races with many high placers. Seven of our runners ran the full marathon with MIDN Church placing 2<sup>nd</sup> with a 3:11 time, MIDN Coslick in 3<sup>rd</sup> place (3:16), and MIDN Skinner in 6<sup>th</sup> place (3:43).

Going into early October, MIDN Josh Taylor was recognized at the University Tri-Mil Advisory Meeting. Throughout the fall, our Midshipmen organized several tailgating events that attracted numerous NROTC alumni and helped strengthen bonds between our NROTC generations. Towards the end of October, we turned our attention to the Leaders Reaction Course for our Navy option members and the Fall Field Exercise for our Marine options members at the US Air Force Academy. All of our unit members received excellent training in these events. At the end of the month, we celebrated our Sea Service Ball at Coors Field (home of MLB's Colorado Rockies). Rear Admiral Scott Robinson was our Guest of Honor and his speech on leadership was truly memorable.

Going into November, we celebrated with our upperclass Midshipmen as they found out their service assignments and ship selections. In all cases, all of our Midshipmen received their first choices compared to a 66% nation-wide rate indicating how competitive our Midshipmen are compared to their peers. Additionally, all of our midshipmen competing for Change of Option and Sideloads were awarded scholarships, an impressive accomplishment indeed! Of note, our Color Guard set the standard with the sharpness of their performance in numerous on and off campus community events. Our MECEPs and OCs represented our unit by participating in several community volunteer events. We close out our semester with the annual Army-Navy flag football game to be played on Folsom Field and the commissioning of four of our students in December. We're excited for Midshipmen Aycock, Elder, Kurzenhauser, and Minimo on their upcoming commissioning as Ensigns in the Navy and look forward to their leadership in the fleet.

Going into the holiday break, I want to encourage all of you to stay sharp, fit, and focused on your chosen path. Enjoy your family time but always be ready! As exciting as our Fall Semester was, we're in for an even more exciting Spring. Colorado Meet 2024 is just around the corner and we are expecting over 20 ROTC units to compete before we tackle Sea Trials and Spring FEX.

### **Executive Officer**

#### Buff Team,

This was another amazing semester and one filled with a few firsts.

We continued our trend back towards becoming the dominating NROTC Unit most of our Alumni remember. It looks like we are finally on the upslope after several tough years of small incoming classes. After all was said and done, we ended up with the largest Freshman class in recent history consisting of 36 Midshipmen, 1 Navy OC, and 9 MECEPs. This brings the size of our unit up to 105. While still small by historic CU standards, we remain one of the largest NROTC units in the country. We also boast very unique numbers when it comes to NROTC programs. We have an almost even split with 52 Navy and 53 Marine Options. Of those 53 Marines, 25 are MECEPS, making up almost 25% of our entire battalion. With more MECEPs than any other school, our program offers a distinct advantage when it comes to leadership training as these Marine Corps Sergeants and Staff Sergeants bring with them 6 to 10 years of active duty experience each. Additionally, our new OC was already an accomplished sailor before his selection to the STA-21 program. CS1 Calucag is a Navy Culinary Arts Team award winner who came to us from the INDOPACOM staff in Hawaii.

This semester we assisted San Diego NROTC by taking over responsibilities for one of their newly commissioned officers. This Ensign was involved in a horrific accident the day of his commissioning last spring and has a long recovery ahead. He spent the past several months in Colorado making remarkable progress at a specialist rehab facility. In a wild turn of events, during one of our visits to the hospital, Col Bodisch and I discovered his grandfather is a CU NROTC Alumni from 1969.

We were also honored to host several career enhancing events including visits from: MajGen(ret.) Mullen, Explosive Ordnance Disposal (EOD) Marines from Camp Lejeune's 2nd EOD Company, LCDR Foster and LCDR Zinger from NIOC Colorado discussed the Information Warfare Community, Maj Dittmer provided our Midshipmen with an overview of the Reserve forces, and LCDR(ret) Smith spoke about leadership and responsibility as a Junior Officer.

In other unit news, we expanded our Midshipmen Leadership team from a "Top 4" to a "Top 5" by transforming the traditional PAO role into our Battalion "COMSTRAT Officer." This Midshipman or MECEP will run a team charged with ensuring CU NROTC dominates the information space. To support these efforts, we procured a unit drone for the team to document our activities and support our expanded Social Media Presence. Expect to see some great footage in the coming semester!

Also, a huge shoutout to our civilian staff for their continued amazing support. Two of them were recently recognized for their stellar work: Mr. Gary Lovato received an award in recognition of 30 years of outstanding Government Service. Our Supply Tech, Mr. Jerry Weymiller, received his award in recognition of 20 years of Government service, and also received a shout-out from NAVSUP as the only NROTC supply tech in the last 5 years to pass their rigorous inspection with zero discrepancies in ESA functions.

Finally, in another indication of our growth, the University granted us a small expansion into an additional space here in the Stadium. This seemingly minor upgrade allowed us to solve two problems at once. Not only can we handle the additional supplies required to support our influx of new students but, when the new semester starts, we will officially have separate dedicated changing rooms for



our male and female Midshipmen. For those who have seen the spaces recently, (or anytime in the past decade) you know how difficult it could be to find a clean place to change after Training. This has been on our list of problems to solve since last Fall, and it was great to have the University support our proposed solution.

Expect a busy and exciting Spring Semester! This upcoming Colorado Meet is poised to be biggest and best yet!

Midshipman 1/C Daugherty, Battalion Commanding Officer






#### Ensign Josh Minimo










### LRC

The upperclassmen were selected to lead their platoon on a 4-mile land navigation challenge that put their leadership skills to the test. They were expected to map a safe area of travel while behind simulated enemy lines and maintain accountability of their platoon. Several simulated casualties were staged, requiring the platoon leadership to conduct medical

evacuations and practice their first aid skills on serious simulated injuries. The fall LRC (leadership reaction course) provided the Midshipmen with leadership experience and tested their ability to react to unexpected circumstances.
