

CU-Boulder Undergraduate Student Social Climate Survey, fall 2014 Method, population and response rates

Background

24,898 undergraduate students invited 4,445 responded 18% response rate

CU-Boulder's Office of Planning, Budget and Analysis has conducted a Student Social Climate Survey about every four years since 1994. The survey's findings are used primarily to evaluate, revise and develop programs and policies that promote student success by helping all students feel like valued members of the university community.

In this report we describe the fall 2014 undergraduate survey questionnaire, data collection, and survey population and respondents, and we provide data on overall response rate and response rates by college/school/program, by Arts & Sciences (A&S) division and by department.

Survey Questionnaire

The web-based questionnaire was developed by staff in the Office of Planning, Budget & Analysis in collaboration with an advisory board of university administrators, faculty, staff and students. Members of the advisory board are listed in Appendix A.

The 2014 survey was substantially different from those carried out at CU-Boulder in previous years. In addition to a general assessment of the campus social climate, the 2014 survey questionnaire included particular assessment of students' experiences in and perceptions of the classroom and residence hall contexts. Unlike previous surveys, the 2014 survey included questions about role models and mentors and questions about uncomfortable experiences attributable to others' assumptions based on stereotyping.

Data Collection

We invited all enrolled, degree-seeking undergraduate students who had an email address and who had not requested that their personal directory information be kept private (N = 24,898) to take part in the survey. On November 7, 2014, students were sent an e-mail from the chancellor explaining the purpose of the Student Social Climate Survey and inviting them to participate by accessing the web-based questionnaire. We sent reminder emails on November 19 and December 2 to those who had not yet responded to the survey. We also sent an email reminder on December 7 to students who had started but not yet completed the survey questionnaire. Data collection ended December 8, 2014.

We offered a financial incentive to encourage students to submit a survey. Students who completed a questionnaire were eligible to win one of four \$500 awards.

Population and Response Rates

Of the 24,898 undergraduate students invited to participate in the survey, 4,445 (18%) responded, completing all or part of the questionnaire. Undergraduate response rates in earlier Student Social Climate Surveys were 25% in 2010, 26% in 2006, and 48% in 2001. Response rates by gender, class level (freshman, sophomore, etc.), race/ethnicity, and college/school/program are available in Appendix B.

Although the response rate was low, respondents were generally similar to the overall student body with respect to race/ethnicity, class level, and college/school/program.

Asian Americans students were slightly overrepresented among the respondents. As is typical in many of our other surveys, women were more likely to submit a survey than were men (55% F and 45% M respondents; 43% F and 57% M in the pop). Response rates by class level (freshman, sophomore, etc.) were comparable to proportions in the pop.
