



CU BOULDER OUTREACH AWARDS

These awards fund faculty-led outreach and engagement projects that connect research, teaching and creative work with public needs. Staff as well as graduate and undergraduate students play key roles in the projects. In some cases, the awards have led to external funding.

The CU Boulder Outreach Committee, which is composed of faculty and staff from many disciplines, selects projects that receive awards based on the following criteria:

- Aligns with campus definition of outreach and engagement
- Responds to a direct request made by a school or community group
- Establishes a long-term relationship with a group or community
- Serves a community with limited access to CU Boulder programs
- Makes the work of CU Boulder's faculty accessible to the public

The Office for Outreach and Engagement, a unit within Continuing Education, administers the awards, helping to ensure that projects are of the highest quality by consulting with potential awardees and managing the application process.

COLLEGE OF ARTS AND SCIENCES

Attention, Behavior, and Learning Clinic: Affordable Childhood EvaluationsResearch Associate Nomita Chhabildas and Professor Erik Willcutt

Department of Psychology and Neuroscience

The clinic provides comprehensive evaluations for children who are experiencing academic, behavioral and emotional difficulties while offering participating graduate students valuable educational experience. The clinic operates on a sliding scale that allows many low-income families to access these services at low to no cost.

Brain Behavior Clinic and Boulder County Homelessness

Associate Clinical Professor Emily Richardson

Department of Psychology and Neuroscience

More than half of chronically homeless people may have undiagnosed cognitive deficits. This partnership with the Boulder County Shelter for the Homeless, the People's Clinic and other local mental health centers helps to identify and support those who might have cognitive deficits. Through the clinic, Richardson and her graduate students provide homeless people with neuropsychological evaluations, which can be used to access disability benefits.

Colorado Classics Day 2019

This program is for middle and high school students from across the state with an interest in ancient Greece and Rome. In September, the classics department hosts Colorado Classics Day, which is designed to broaden students' understanding of classical language and culture, and their relevance to today.

Co-Designing an Early Education Program for Children Birth to Three

By the time they are three years old, middle-income children have twice the vocabulary of low-income children. This project works with Boulder Housing Partners to close this gap by empowering parents to build on their knowledge through a culturally sensitive, parent-based early education program.

Critical Conversations Project: Playback Theatre in Rural Colorado

The economy of Colorado's North Fork Valley is shifting, which has created tension in the community. To help bridge the divide, the North Fork Valley Creative Coalition has asked the CU Boulder theatre department to facilitate a program where residents share their stories and see them "played back" by an ensemble of actors in ways that encourage understanding. The goal is to create a collective conversation around the economic transition.

CU Contemporary Dance Works Residency Tour

During a weeklong residency each spring, this graduate student touring company brings dance to Colorado communities that are underserved by the arts. In May, the students will head to Paonia to offer classes, workshops and performances in partnership with schools, a senior citizens group, local nonprofits and community arts organizations.

Empowering Economically Disadvantaged Adolescents with Complex Communication Needs


Clinic Faculty Member Sherri Tennant and Assistant Professor Christine Brennan Department of Speech, Language, and Hearing Sciences

Through this project, CU Boulder faculty and graduate students provide training for speech pathologists, educators and other staff at the Denver School of Science and Technology (DSST). This training helps DSST professionals more effectively support middle and high school students with complex communication needs due to autism, cerebral palsy and other medical conditions.

Intervention for Culturally and Linguistically Diverse Children with Developmental Disorders

Associate Professor Pui Fong Kan and Clinical Assistant Professor Amy Thrasher Department of Speech, Language, and Hearing Sciences

This partnership with Boulder Community Health, Imagine!/Dayspring and Boulder Valley School District provides training for speech-language pathologists who work with culturally and linguistically diverse children with communication disorders, focusing in particular on immigrant children who are starting to learn English in school. This early intervention program works closely with families who are traditionally reluctant to seek professional services.

Literacy Practicum

This program partners with Boulder community literacy programs to provide a service-learning component for an undergraduate course. CU Boulder students work with at-risk children and adults to improve reading and writing skills by applying targeted teaching strategies and information taught during the campus course.

RDS Center: Reaching Out to People with Bipolar Research

The Robert D. Sutherland (RDS) Center for the Evaluation and Treatment of Bipolar Disorder provides comprehensive treatment to people with bipolar disorder, many of whom can't afford treatment. This community-based clinic also trains graduate students in clinical psychology and offers public seminars, talks and workshops.

Demystifying Entrepreneurship Rural Colorado Workshop Series

Colorado's rural economies are experiencing slower job growth and lower wages than urban areas. To help spur economic growth and job creation, Leeds faculty are sharing effective business practices and serving as mentors for local entrepreneurs. This series offers workshops in nearly every region of the state for five years, hoping to raise the standard of living in those communities.

SCHOOL OF EDUCATION

Improving Educational Outcomes for Low-Income, Latino English Learners Professor Mileidis Gort, Research Associate Vanessa Santiago Schwarz

and Research Associate Laura Hamman-Ortiz

This project provides teachers from Denver area elementary schools with professional development focused on how to more effectively teach writing to low-income, Latino English learners. A CU Boulder biliteracy research team is partnering with Denver Public Schools to provide educators with targeted writing instruction and strategies to improve academic outcomes for this group of students.

Rethinking Family Engagement at Adams 14 School District

Professor Kathy Escamilla and Doctoral Candidate María de los Ángeles Osorio Cooper

Through a partnership with Cultivando, a community-based nonprofit in Commerce City, this project seeks to identify ways to create dialogue between personnel at the Adams 14 school district and Latino parents. The goal is to develop more culturally inclusive policies and practices within the district, which was identified in a 2014 federal report as a hostile environment for Latinos.

Teaching and Learning to Queer the Curriculum

Research Associate Sara Staley and Research Associate Bethy Leonardi

As part of an ongoing partnership between the School of Education's A Queer Endeavor and Boulder Valley School District, this project will work with teachers at Centaurus High School in Lafayette to design lesson plans focused on gender and sexual diversity. The goal is to create inclusive practices and document how teachers develop methods for instructing diverse students.

Oil and Gas Contamination of Jackson County Waters

New oil and gas development has recently started in Jackson County, Colorado. The Western Colorado Alliance for Community Action has asked for support from CU Boulder's engineering researchers to monitor the Grizzly Creek watershed for possible water contamination from this new development, and to inform the community about potential public health and environmental effects from oil and gas production.

Program in Environmental Design

Through a five-week summer course, environmental design students study and work in an unplanned settlement near Medellin, Colombia, which was formed when people fled the city because of violence. The residents have created infrastructure, businesses and community centers from the ground up. Students work closely with residents on community projects



COLORADO LAW

The Acequia Project: Helping San Luis Valley Farmers

Professor Sarah Krakoff

This project provides free legal support to low-income and predominately Hispanic farmers in the San Luis Valley whose water rights are at risk. CU Boulder law students, attorneys and community partners work closely with farmers or irrigators to draft bylaws for their irrigation ditches (acequias) that capture runoff from mountain snowmelt, so they can access Colorado laws and protect the traditional ways acequias operate.

Constitutional Literacy in Colorado High Schools

Professor Suzette Malveaux, Adjunct Professor Matthew Cushing, Clinical Law Professor Colene Robinson and Senior Assistant Dean Jennifer Sullivan

This project through the Byron R. White Center in Colorado Law is designed to give Colorado high school students deeper knowledge of the Constitution so they can better advocate for constitutional rights in their communities. Law students work with schools statewide through a Constitution Day program in September and a yearlong program that prepares students for a moot court competition on campus and in Washington, D.C.

COLLEGE OF MUSIC

As One: Authenticity, Compassion and a Transgender Story

The opera *As One* garnered national acclaim for its portrayal of a transgender person's journey, a topic rarely portrayed in media forms. This production aims to bring awareness to the lives and realities of trans people in collaboration with the Dairy Arts Center, Out Boulder, and the CU Boulder Center for Inclusion and Social Change.

Middle School Ensembles Program

Associate Professor David Rickels, Associate Professor Leila Heil and Professor Margaret Berg

This program provides local middle school students with an additional musical ensemble experience through a partnership with band and orchestra teachers in Boulder Valley School District and the Boulder Children's Chorale. Undergraduates are able to hone their teaching skills, and high school interns learn about teaching music as a career. Another goal this year is to commission a new work for middle school band.

Piano for Dreamers

Professor Alejandro Cremaschi

Through this partnership with the "I Have a Dream" Foundation of Boulder County, graduate and undergraduate students provide free introductory piano classes to third- and fifth-graders who cannot afford lessons. The elementary school students learn to read and interpret music notation and symbols, perform simple songs and compose pieces.

Fire Adapted Bailey: Launching an Evidence-Based Approach

As the U.S. grapples with devastating wildfires, national wildfire officials are recognizing that gathering information from local communities will help create better wildfire public policy. In partnership with Fire Adapted Bailey, a nonprofit serving 68 fire-prone communities in Park and Jefferson counties, this project will gather key data about homeowner attitudes toward wildfire risk, risk mitigation behaviors and responses to incentives to mitigate risk.

Girls at the Museum Exploring Science (GAMES)

GAMES encourages fourth- through eighth-grade girls who are low-income and/or Latina to pursue their interest in science. Weekly after-school visits to the CU museum allow the students to explore archaeology, botany, entomology, paleontology and zoology through hands-on activities and direct interaction with scientists and museum professionals.

Boulder Affordable Housing Research Initiative

Boulder County and Denver area residents who are looking for affordable housing find few options, an issue that local nonprofits and municipal groups are trying to address. Through this initiative, CU Boulder researchers are partnering with many Boulder and Denver organizations to collect and share data about affordable housing that can be used to design more effective public policies in response to this housing crisis.

Bringing Colorado's Latino History and Culture to Light

The Latino History Project is a collaborative, grassroots initiative that is documenting and preserving Latino history. CU Boulder researchers are partnering with community groups in Boulder County, Pueblo, Alamosa and Trinidad to collect historical information about Latinos in these communities, creating extensive online K–12 resources for teachers and the public, and providing workshops on how to use them.

Communities Code: Engaging Underrepresented Youth in Creative Computing

Through this program, faculty, staff and students join with the Boulder Valley School District, Boulder Housing Partners, Partners Bridging the Digital Divide, rural schools and public libraries to offer technology-focused classes to K–8 students and training for teachers. Classes are designed for girls, students of color and other underrepresented students to increase interest and confidence in computer science, partnering with families to enhance learning.

Co-production of Embodied Climate Curriculum Gains STEAM

An ongoing CU Boulder outreach program brings free kits containing real and cast fossils as well as lesson plans to schools statewide, and this new project is piloting additional ways to teach the curriculum. Working closely with teachers at Stober Elementary School in Jefferson County School District, the CU Boulder researchers are designing curricula that will help fourth- and fifth-graders learn about natural history through theatre, dance and movement.

CU Japanese and Japanese American Community History Project

This year marks the 75th anniversary of the end of Japanese American internment in the United States. As part of this commemoration, the University Libraries is partnering with Japanese organizations in Colorado to document the history of Japanese and Japanese American students, faculty and staff at CU Boulder during World War II and after. Photographs, letters, films, recordings and more will be accessible online and in the CU Boulder Archives.

Engineering and Science Inquiry Projects in Rural Schools



This program provides students from high schools in Delta, Weld, Washington, Yuma, Mesa and Arapahoe counties with the opportunity to conduct engineering research. The high schoolers work closely with their teachers and CU Boulder researchers to design projects that investigate local air quality issues, collecting samples using air quality monitors designed by Hannigan's research group. Researchers are also piloting biological engineering projects.
