

Engaged Arts and Humanities Scholars

Engaged Arts and Humanities Scholars (EAH) was developed in 2018 by the Office for Public and Community-Engaged Scholarship (PACES). Since then, **EAH has supported more than 40 graduate students from 12 departments and reached hundreds of Colorado residents.**



Students have:

- Developed collectively built memorials for Los Seis de Boulder and the Calwood Fire; worked with teachers and youth on moral reasoning, Spanish literacy, math and music, art and science and ethnomusicology programs; and developed collaborative art installations and activities in rural and urban Colorado communities.
- Gained experience partnering with organizations such as Lighthouse Writers, Corazón de Trinidad Creative District and the Boulder Museum of Contemporary Art.
- Performed or shared their work at local, regional, international and national events.

In addition to students holding their own project-based events, we have supported students with presenting in diverse contexts:



- 7 students presented at national higher education conferences
- 20 students have presented at Research & Innovation Week and other campus events
- 14 students have presented at or attended the Colorado Creative Industries Annual Summit
- 7 students have been featured in events by local arts organizations, Boulder County Arts Alliance and the Boulder Museum of Contemporary Art
