Dissertation: *Vagueness and Ethics*

My dissertation is a series of essays on vagueness, ethics, and their intersection. Central topics include the viability of standard indeterminacy and epistemic accounts of vagueness, whether or not moral vagueness exists, and the possibility of posthumous harm. Given the destructive power of arguments from vagueness, I propose a methodological stance I call “Vagueness Last”. On a Vagueness Last approach we test all reasonable non-vagueness explanations of a case of purported vagueness before at last settling on it being a case of genuine vagueness.
