SCHOLARSHIP IN FOCUS

Each spring PLC has the distinct honor to administer the application and selection process for the Alvin G. Flanagan and Walker Family Scholarships. These scholarships are open to students in PLC, Leeds School of Business, and the College of Media, Communication and Information who have strong academic records, extensive campus and program involvement, and demonstrated leadership. Financial need is also considered though the awards are primarily merit-based. Scholarships range from \$500 - \$3,500, and are allocated in the following academic school year. 2017, which marks the 35th year for the Flanagan and 22nd for the Walker, saw nearly \$50,000 awarded across 35 students between the two scholarships. Alvin G. Flanagan Scholarship

Alvin G. Flanagan, a co-founder of the Presidents Leadership Class, Marine Corps veteran, and onetime President of Gannett Broadcasting, was deeply committed to creating leadership education opportunities for bright students. Mr. Flanagan's friends and colleagues created the Alvin G. Flanagan Scholarship Endowment in 1982 to honor him for his 45-year career in broadcasting by supporting "worthy and promising students." Cecil Walker academically is the custodian of this endowment and awards scholarships on behalf of his long-time colleague.

Walker Family Scholarship

Cecil Walker, retired Chairman and CEO of Gannett Broadcasting, instrumental establishing the scholarship fund to honor Alvin G. Flanagan, his predecessor at Gannett. A long-time friend of the University of Colorado, Mr. Walker was an officer of KUSA-Channel 9 in Denver, a Gannett station, until 1984. Mr. Walker also served as a trustee for the Presidents Leadership Class. His two sons, Robert Walker and Richard Walker (current PLC Board of Advocates member), and daughter-in-law, Karen Harty Walker, are graduates of the University of Colorado. In 1995, the Walker family established a scholarship fund as a personal commitment to expand educational opportunities for promising CU students.

Cecil continues to be very involved with the selection interviews, and is regularly joined by Rich and Karen. Reflecting on well over three decades of stewarding these two scholarships, Cecil recently commented that "The heartwarming student letters sent to Mr. Flanagan in

his lifetime and to our Walker family during the thirty five years say it best... the scholarship awards strongly encourage them to achieve even more now and to help others in the future."

Chris Deardorff: CEO and Founder, Magic Flight Studios, PLC Alumnus (2001)



 $M_{ ext{y}}$ name is Chris Deardorff and I'm CEO and Founder of Magic Flight Studios, a storytelling marketing company for small and medium businesses. We help companies accelerate their growth by taking storytelling best practices from film, books, and other creative mediums, and integrating them with modern marketing strategy and execution services. specifically, we work with companies in defining and developing their business and product stories as well infusing their marketing strategies and tactics with a storytelling approach. We have worked with over 20 companies in the last 2 1/2 years, including some of the top emerging businesses in the country.

My path to where I am now hasn't been linear, but it has been consistent. I remember taking a marketing class my junior year that emphasized how marketing at its core is really storytelling – telling stories about businesses, products, and services. That idea really resonated with me and has stuck with me throughout my career. Since college, I have mainly worked for big companies including Fortune 100 businesses such as Target, GE, Medtronic, and Seagate Technologies doing marketing and new product development. The experience I received was phenomenal and I certainly learned a ton along the way, but deep down I always knew I was an

entrepreneur at heart. So after a 10+ year career in the corporate world, I decided to forge my own path and start a marketing company called Market Compass, which eventually became Magic Flight Studios.

I decided I wanted my company to be a storytelling marketing company because research has shown that more and more people are growing weary of being sold to. At the same time, people love stories and stories are found to be highly influential and strong contributors to decision making. Furthermore, more companies today are actually media companies, but they don't know it. They have a blog, a social media page, and maybe a video or two. They need to start thinking like media companies and tell great stories about their businesses.

Looking back, I'm extremely grateful for the experience that PLC afforded me. I think what I'm most thankful for is it taught me how to effectively communicate both verbally and in writing, which as you can imagine is extremely important in marketing. Beyond that, it helped me learn critical thinking skills and how to always consider my audience in trying to convey ideas and messages. This is invaluable when it comes to marketing as well as just trying to influence others. PLC was a fantastic experience and one I will always cherish as a professional.

I have found a place where I can be passionate about their mission, vision and values. Sweet Cow values its employees and works hard to uphold a culture of fun-filled passion for the best ice cream there possibly is. I currently oversee our six locations, managing a team of over 200 employees and a direct team of twelve reportees. I get to work closely with the owners helping with the growth and direction of Sweet Cow. I have created recipes, new flavors, processes, systems and helped develop everything from training manuals to employee reviews. Every day brings a new adventure and a variety of challenges.

Sweet Cow carries a work culture that fosters growth and learning as well. friendships that wouldn't have formed otherwise.

Looking forward, Kate hopes to see PLC^2 continue to expand in the years to come. Next year, she envisions the program catering to all PLC cohorts, with rising juniors mentoring the incoming freshmen, and rising seniors mentoring their soon-to-be sophomores for a second straight year. Kate believes that this initiative not only has the ability to recruit and retain current PLC'ers, but it also provides an opportunity for recent graduates to stay connected to the program through younger students.

After graduation, Kate hopes to pursue a career in youth empowerment or international development. She hopes to use her experiences in PLC to help encourage others to become passionate, empathetic leaders with a vision. Experiential Weekends are a hallmark of the Presidents Leadership Class' Experiential Learning curriculum. They are designed to encourage learning outside of the classroom and introduce PLC scholars to leadership challenges facing the top industries in Colorado. So far, have successfully coordinated the Health we Transportation, and Medicine, Education, and Sustainable Agriculture themed weekends this semester. We have been overwhelmed by the positive feedback we have received from students. Freshman, Brian Phan, says: "The pre-medicine experiential weekend was very insightful. We are incredibly thankful for the support from our gracious alumni and faculty. This year, PLC alumni have been active in reaching out to us with offers to speak or help plan the Experiential Weekends. It is humbling and heart-warming to have such a strong and active

network of alumni supporting our program. PLC scholars have met with PLC alumni, Sydney Bay (PLC '08), Director of Recruitment at Teach for America and Ryan Friedman (PLC '13), student at CU School of Medicine. We are always thrilled to meet with PLC alumni and discuss how the program has impacted their career path.
