### **Wisdom Amouzou, PLC 2009**

Co-Founder and Executive Director at Empower Community High School



# What about your PLC experience, if anything, led you to found Empower Community High School?

I started studying engineering at CU so PLC was my outlet to explore my other passions at different levels. My biggest passion was probably the injustices in education. I distinctly remember my first presentation in PLC where I walked people through the average experience of a low-income family trying to navigate the public school system. Three things come to mind right away. PLC helped me learn how to process injustice and pushed me to start thinking of solutions. My peers and I all had different values and interests, but they were the community that I could come to and be serious with about these issues. The other major thing I took away from PLC was my experience teaching. I was a first and second-year CA. I also worked with the Recruitment and Selection team. You could call me a PLC superfan. PLC has allowed me to be able to look at my specific problems at Empower and examine it even deeper every week.


### Would you say that Empower models PLC at all?

Definitely. There are two main things that are modeled in light of PLC. The first is experiential learning. Experiential learning is a very major part of what we do at Empower. We have a model called FLOW that are student-led projects that are meant to directly impact their community. It is a 2-hour block that allows for students to work through the design and implementation of a solution to a social justice issue in their community. It is completely student-driven which makes it special. The second thing that we do that is very similar to PLC is the presence of guest speakers. I can still remember our Tuesday night guest speakers and how influential those were for me. I think giving students access to speakers is invaluable.

COVID-19 Outreach Lead at Aunt Bertha & Initiative Lead at Monday.vc



#### **What is Aunt Bertha?**

Aunt Bertha connects anyone in need, anywhere in the United States, to free and reduced-cost programs that can help them - think of it as a Yelp for Social Services. Aunt Bertha now lists 366,000 program locations across the country. That makes it the largest, most comprehensive, most actively used network of social services in the United States. When COVID-19 hit, it was particularly well-positioned to help. The team at Aunt Bertha spun up <a href="FindHelp.org">FindHelp.org</a>, which includes all of Aunt Bertha's program listings as well as 2,000 additional pandemic-specific programs (like mutual aid groups, drive-up testing sites) and 37,000 updated programs (whose offerings have been supplemented or changed in response to COVID-19).

### How did you get involved with this organization?

In early March of this year, I had moved out of my place in Oakland and given away most of my things to go live in a monastery in upstate New York for 3 months (and possibly longer) on a meditation retreat. I arrived in New York, prepared to go, but because of COVID-19, the monastery closed down and wouldn't admit new visitors. So, I headed for my parents' place in Santa Fe, New Mexico, which is where I am now (hunkered down for the pandemic). After I got here, I became curious about how I could be of service in this time when so many people were wrestling with the fallout of COVID-19. So I reached out to my friend Tyler to ask if Aunt Bertha needed help. I intended to help out as a volunteer, but the team was kind enough to give me a job! So now I am leading up outreach for Aunt Bertha to make sure everyone in need right now knows that FindHelp.org (Aunt Bertha's COVID-specific site) is here to help.
