Food for Thought

The Importance of Eating Last

"The answer became clear during a conversation with a Marine Corps general. "Officers eat last," he said. Simon watched as the most junior Marines ate first while the most senior Marines took their place at the back of the line. What's symbolic in the chow hall is deadly serious on the battlefield: Great leaders sacrifice their own comfort—even their own survival—for the good of those in their care."

This excerpt in Simon Sinek's book, **Leaders Eat Last** is one of my favorites. It tugs at true servant leadership. I run an organization called Finemind where we offer peer counseling services for mental health in post-conflict, Northern Uganda. The heartbeat to our success is our 18 community mental health workers – they are the true warriors of Finemind. I am indefatigable to make sure they are supported, respected, and listened to. What little extra can I do? Where can I "eat last"? The trickle-down effect then benefits children, young women, families, and caregivers and lifts the community. Our sweet sauce lies not when the individual is lifted, but the real transformation happens when the community is lifted, too.

I'm grateful to PLC for helping me realize the importance of putting community first. Leadership isn't self-interest. It is other-oriented. My time with PLC was instrumental in underscoring this very key insight. In closing, how can you be of service? Where in your life can you "eat last"?


Class Reunions!

What has inspired your passion for the work of this organization?

I have the honor of serving as the Western Regional Vice President for the National Urban League Young Professionals. This organization has a rich history of being a catalyst and advocate for African Americans for well over a century. Racism and bigotry result in many pains but the most lethal but often ignored impact is ECONOMIC disparity. The National Urban League is an organization that has focused on fighting these battles for African Americans; battles related to economic access, equality, and rights for African Americans in the private sector. For years prior to the Jim Crow era, during the Jim Crow era, and post the Jim Crow era African Americans were systematically disenfranchised from having access to jobs and therefore economic mobility because of race; the effects of this are too many to name but poverty, education inequity, and a myriad of other issues are perpetuated. The National Urban League has and still takes on this fight through and the inequities therein to ensure that African Americans have economic mobility and therefore can actualize the American Dream and have true equality and hope.

What can PLC Alumni be doing to actively work towards equity in their communities?

The PLC Alumni can be instrumental in making impact towards economic equity initiatives by starting within your own respective places of work; whether you're an entrepreneur, executive, or an engaged employee you can leverage your voice to advocate to have a diverse and accessible workforce. Become aware of the access issues that exist for diverse communities; partner with your talent teams to ensure your job descriptions/requirements aren't unconsciously biased.
