This course examines selected aspects of the evolution of the US Constitution through interpretation by the Supreme Court. The Supreme Court as a social and political institution will be briefly reviewed in the first part of the course. Then we look at the major cases decided by the Court in many key areas of civil rights and civil liberties. Through analysis of these cases we will discuss the changing doctrines used by the Justices to allocate and limit individual freedoms and government powers. With Democrats now in control of the White House and US Senate, we will track the policies within the Justice Department and the politics of judicial appointments closely. NOTE: There will be several supplements to this syllabus. One will provide guidelines on how to brief cases. C-SPAN and other electronic media will be used to supplement written and lecture material. Students are responsible for arranging to access any and all material resulting from absence from class.

Case Briefings and Oral Presentations: (15%) "Briefing groups" of two or three students will be formed to provide in class overviews, oral and written case briefs of the cases from the syllabus including updates on recent appellate and Supreme Court decisions. Each student will prepare and submit **written briefs in her own words** on specific cases from the syllabus, which will be distributed to the class via email, 24 hours in advance of the class discussion. Each person will also give **oral briefs** to the class on several cases with their briefing group. Details will be given later in class.

Extra-Credit: Optional Oral Reports (4-12 Proposal Deadline!)

Case briefings/presentations by individuals or coops on current constitutional cases NOT analyzed in the course will be arranged. Bonus points worth **up to 10 points (added to the in-class exams score)** will be earned by participants. DEADLINE for proposing extra-credit presentations is Monday April 12th.
