HONG KONG: RESISTANCE AND ACTIVISM

ONLINE PROFESSIONAL DEVELOPMENT SEMINAR



In this seminar, we will explore Hong Kong's history, focusing on its people's resistance and activism through Louisa Lim's 2022 book Indelible City. This illuminating work amplifies Hong Kongers' voices, challenging narratives centered on British colonialism and the 1997 handover. Richly researched and featuring firsthand accounts, the book reveals the city's long struggle for sovereignty. Geared toward middle and secondary teachers, participants will gain insights into Hong Kong's past, the 2019 protests, their aftermath, and its future. discussions seminar includes on The Lim's text. supplemental materials, educator dialogues, and a meeting with the author.

Featuring a webinar (TBD) with author and award-winning journalist, Louisa Lim. Lim reported from China for a decade with NPR and the BBC and co-hosts <u>The Little Red Podcast</u> on China. She is an Associate Professor at the University of Melbourne, teaching audio journalism and podcasting and holds a PhD in journalism studies.



Course Format:

The seminar includes five asynchronous online modules with readings and discussions. Online introductions begin on Jan 27, 2025, and modules run from Feb 3 to Mar 9, 2025. A Curriculum Implementation Plan (CIP) is due March 24, 2025.
