

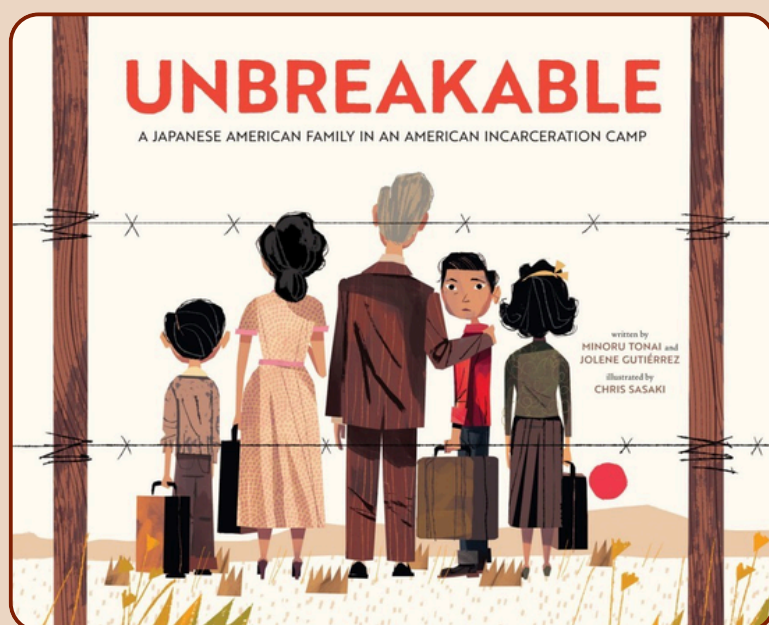
Unbreakable: A Japanese American Family in an American Incarceration Camp with Co-author Jolene Gutiérrez

For author, teacher-librarian, and NCTA alumna Jolene Gutiérrez, her first awareness of US-Japan relations was learning about Amache, the incarceration camp in Granada, Colorado, down the road from her grandparents' home. Focused on the story of young Min Tonai and his family, readers of *Unbreakable* learn with empathy about the forced relocation and incarceration of Japanese and Japanese Americans.
