National Opportunities

Summer Institute: China: Environmental Issues and Challenges, Week of June 25, 2012. The Program for Teaching East Asia will hold this institute at the University of Colorado. In a week-long residential institute, teachers will work with specialists in the field to explore critical environmental issues facing China today and to consider the social, economic, and policy ramifications of these issues, both domestically and globally. Among the topics to be explored are water issues, urban growth, energy sources and consumption, and pollution. Up to 20 teachers nationwide will be selected to participate in each program through an application process. Selected teachers will receive a travel stipend, room and board, and materials. Deadline. Monday, January 9, 2012. New Perspectives: Japan. Offered by the Laurasian Institute, this study program brings teacher-led school groups to Japan in June and July for two weeks of study days in Kyoto and Tokyo and home stays that include school visits. This program is a great way for teachers to extend the experience of the classroom and give students an authentic introduction to Japan. Since the program began, approximately 300 Chinese teachers have taught in American elementary, middle, and high schools and over 100 American teachers have taught in Chinese secondary schools. ANPO: Art x War

On November 28, 2011, TEA and Center for Asian Studies (CAS) hosted and film showing and discussion with director Linda Hoaglund. The 90-minute documentary *ANPO: Art x War* was well received by over 50 people in attendance. The film addressed the U.S.-Japan post-war treaty which supports U.S. military bases in Japan. Hoaglund focused on artists and their work, including painting, photography, *anime*, film, and music. The artistic expression of the film was followed by an informal and personal discussion with Hoaglund and her experiences with the filming and screening of the production.
