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Chinese Language Instruction in the Digital Age: A STARTALK Program on Incorporating Learner-Centered Technology Tools in the Chinese Language Curriculum, July 20-30, 2014. **Deadline Approaching for NCTA 2014 Summer Institutes at TEA.** The Program for Teaching East Asia is offering two NCTA-sponsored summer institutes, one for elementary and one for secondary teachers. This four-day residential program for secondary teachers will examine the rapidly changing social and political dynamics of contemporary China, with special attention to the emerging roles of citizens, including ways in which individuals and groups respond to and enable social and political change through protests, political participation, and self-organization.
