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Explore East Asian Belief Systems via Asia for Educators' Online Course. September 17, 2014 – January 6, 2015. Asia for Educators at Columbia University is sponsoring this course exploring Shamans, Shinto, Daoism, Confucianism, Buddhism, Islam, Christianity, and other belief systems. Each belief system will be examined in a two-week session. Study will begin with a lecture, PowerPoint presentation, and readings in the first week; the second week will engage participants in exploring online museum exhibitions and curriculum materials and discussing classroom applications. The course is free, but participants will be required to obtain a copy of a world religions text for reference. Featured Resources

After the Darkness is a 24-minute film about the 3/11/2011 earthquake, tsunami, and subsequent nuclear disaster that struck Japan's Tohoku region. The documentary focuses particularly on how the disasters affected two survivors who have rebuilt their lives since the disasters, using these case studies as windows to understanding the nation's experience. An accompanying teacher's guide provides activities, discussion questions, note-taking handouts, a PowerPoint presentation, and readings that draw on the work of Stanford scholars to help students understand the nuclear disaster. The film and guide are available free at the SPICE (Stanford Program on International and Cross-Cultural Education) website.

Australia's Asia Education Foundation provides units for use in implementing an *Asia-focused Geography Curriculum*. Among the units are several focusing on China, all aimed at secondary students, as well as a unit titled "South Korea—Creating a Sustainable Giant." To access the units, click here.

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
