Women in East Asia October 7-December 1, 2021

A Professional Development Course for Secondary Teachers



Join NCTA at the Program for Teaching East Asia for this three-module course that explores key topics regarding women in East Asia through the lenses of history and geography. Questions the course will consider include: What was the influence of Confucius thought on the status and roles of women in China, Japan and Korea? Did either capitalist liberalism or socialism liberate women in East Asia? How have changing social, economic, and political trends affected East Asian women's parity, opportunity, and rights? The course aligns with the World History Content Standards and AP World History and World Geography Course Guidelines.

Course format. Each module is two weeks long, divided as follows: 1) a one-week reading period providing time to read a short selection of articles, 2) a live hour-long webinar with a specialist on the topic, and 3) a second week for asynchronous online discussion with an NCTA instructor, focusing on classroom integration. Participants must be able to attend the live webinars:

October 21, November 4, and November 18, all 7 pm ET. Participants also must be able to take part in the week-long asynchronous discussion period following each live meeting. The webinars will be hosted on Zoom and the asynchronous discussions on TEA's Moodle course platform.

Eligibility, Selection, and Participation. Open nationwide to social studies teachers of grades 6-12, with priority to contract teachers whose course(s) includes East Asia. Participation, as outlined above, is required, along with submission of a short Classroom Implementation Plan and a final evaluation.

Course Dates: The course begins with an Intro Week, October 7. The three two-week modules run October 14-27, October 28-November 10, and November 11-December 1 (extended for Thanksgiving break). The Curriculum Implementation Plan (CIP) and evaluation are due Dec. 13.

Participation is free and offers a Certificate of Completion (18 contact hours) and \$75 completion stipend.
