The University of Colorado

The University of Colorado opened its doors on September 5, 1877, with 44 students, a president, and one instructor. Today the University system includes four campuses: the main campus at Boulder and campuses at Colorado Springs, Denver, and the Health Sciences Center in Denver. The campuses have a combined enrollment of almost 35,000 students.

The Boulder Campus

As a comprehensive university, CU-Boulder is committed to the liberal education of students and to a broad curriculum ranging from the baccalaureate through the postdoctoral levels. The educational experience of the Boulder Campus, therefore, is distinguished by the scope of its programs and course offerings, the notable reputation of its research facilities, the diversity of its student body, and the professionalism and dedication of its faculty.

The following Boulder Campus colleges and professional schools offer more than 3,000 courses in over 140 fields of study:

The Board of Regents at the University of Colorado reserves the right to establish enrollment levels for all academic areas.

The teaching and research programs of the Boulder Campus are closely integrated with other facilities in the Boulder area, including the National Bureau of Standards (NBS), the National Center for Atmospheric Research (NCAR), and the National Oceanic and Atmospheric Administration (NOAA), among others.

The Campus Setting

The University of Colorado, Boulder is located at the base of the Rocky Mountains, at an altitude of over 5,000 feet.

The climate is temperate, with pleasant days and cool evenings. On the average, the area enjoys 300 days of sunshine each year. The campus covers 600 acres and includes 160 buildings constructed of roughcut sandstone with red tile roofs.

Boulder County encompasses five ecological zones, from 5,000 feet above sea level (plains grassland) to 14,000 feet (alpine tundra). The city of Boulder, only 20 miles from the Continental Divide and some of the most spectacular scenery in the United States, is an attractive community of 80,000 people and is dedicated to preserving its beautiful natural environment.

Metropolitan Denver, with a population of 1.6 million, is 30 miles from Boulder. Denver offers the opportunities and resources of a large city and is easily accessible from the Boulder area by traveling U.S. 36, also known as the Denver-Boulder Turnpike. Denver's Stapleton International Airport is served by most major carriers and is located northeast of Denver, about 45 minutes from Boulder. Denver and Boulder are connected by a public transportation system.

Campus Tours

Guided walking tours of the Boulder Campus leave from Regent Administrative Center 125 each weekday at 11:00 a.m. and 2:30 p.m. and provide a personal introduction to the campus environment. No advance reservation is necessary.

Summer Session

The summer instructional program is an integral part of the year-round program at the University of Colorado, Boulder. The University operates on a semester system with fall and spring semesters of 15 weeks each and a 10-week summer session that includes shorter terms (1 to 4, 5, or 8 weeks) scheduled within the 10-week session.

Undergraduate and graduate students can choose from many curricular offerings during summer session and may make progress toward a degree in almost any area of study.

The academic program combines the skills of the resident faculty and distinguished visiting scholars who come to teach, lecture, and participate in seminars and forums.

The Colorado Shakespeare Festival, Gilbert and Sullivan productions, other dramatic and musical events, and superb recreational opportunities are among the many activities that entice summer students during hours not spent in lecture halls, laboratories, and libraries.

Students should consult the University of Colorado at Boulder Catalog for further information about Boulder Campus degree programs, related policies and requirements, regulations of each college and school, course offerings, and campus services and facilities. Distinguished Visiting Professors

Two well-known scholars will be in residence at CU-Boulder during the first five weeks of Summer Session 1985 as part of the distinguished visiting professor program. Dr. Gilbert Gottlieb, an internationally renowned developmental psychobiologist and behavioral embryologist, will offer a 400/500-level course entitled Historical Conceptions of Development and Evolution in Psychology and Biology. Dr. Russell Kirk, America's most prominent authority on the political and social ideas of Edmund Burke, will lecture on Anglo-American conservative thought in the nineteenth and twentieth centuries. Each professor will also give a public lecture in the field of his expertise. Division of Continuing Education

Registration

As noted in the Schedule of Courses, Registration for some classes offered during Summer Session is handled by the Division of Continuing Education. Students must enroll for these courses and pay tuition before the first session of class. These courses carry a tuition fee separate from the Boulder Campus charges. Economics Institute

The Economics Institute provides specialized transitional and professional training and orientation for international graduate students and professionals in economics and related fields (including business, agricultural economics, and public administration). Its training activities include year-round intensive English course work designed for students in economics, business, and administration, as well as a comprehensive curriculum in economic theory,



mathematics, statistics, information systems, management, and accounting and finance. The business courses are the equivalent of courses offered by the College of Business and Administration. Most of its participants are preparing to enter master's and doctoral degree programs throughout the United States, but some attend the program for its specialized diploma. The Institute also offers a full range of foundation courses that are designed to provide graduate students without a major in economics or business with training equivalent to the undergraduate sequences in the subject area. Programs are individualized in terms of both length and composition of course work. Programs are normally designed to terminate in August or December. The Institute operates a University Placement Service and publishes a Guide to Graduate Study in Economics and Agricultural Economics in the United States and Canada (available from the address below). While most of its participants are foreign students and professionals, some of its courses are open to domestic students on a Special Student enrollment basis. For specific courses offered by the Economics Institute, see the Schedule of Courses under Economics.

Education

In addition to the regular course offerings for Summer Session 1985, the faculty of the School of Education is offering a group of three-week intensive courses. Some afternoon and evening classes will be scheduled, particularly in the area of administration. Check the Schedule of Courses for details.

A student may enroll in only one 3-semester-hour intensive course in a single three-week period. It is possible, however, to take 6 semester hours of work during the second five-week term from July 15 through August 16. By combining the first three-week term (June 24-July 12) with the second five-week term (July 15-August 16), a student may complete 9 semester hours of work in eight weeks.

For some of the special conferences and workshops, there is a fee in addition to the regular tuition and fees for the University. To reserve a place in these programs, students should send a check, made payable to the University of Colorado to the instructor in charge of that program, at the address below. Checks should be sent at least two weeks before the beginning of the course.

Farrand/Sewall Summer Program, June 19-August 2

Farrand and Sewall Halls, which offer Residential Academic Programs during the school year, jointly sponsor a Summer Program designed to give freshmen an early start at CU-Boulder. In recognition that a student's first experiences in college are among the most important and that a strong beginning can make a positive difference later on with respect to grades, involvement in the University community, and even good health, the Farrand/Sewall Summer Program provides precisely such an opportunity.

The Program is small, with classes limited to no more that 25 students. Participants get to know one another well through the experience of taking classes together and sharing a number of social activities planned especially for them. The



Farrand/Sewall Summer Program is constructed in a way that the academic component must necessarily come first in the student's priorities. What is special about the Program is that it affords the student the opportunity to become fully involved in one subject area and, in doing so, to fulfill half the College of Arts and Sciences graduation requirement in Social Science and to begin as a member of a small community in which everyone is a beginner. In 1985, the Program will offer two course sequences, one in Political Science and one in Anthropology. Participating students will be required to register for one or the other, a total of 6 semester hours. Faculty members are selected on the basis of their reputations for excellence in teaching.

The Farrand/Sewall Summer Program offers an extraordinary opportunity for beginning students, but, as in the case of all such opportunities, there are also exceptional expectations for the participants. Classes meet every day, and much of the time between classes must be set aside for assignments. Students should expect to be busy, to be challenged, and to participate fully in their own educational experience.

The Program fee for the Farrand/Sewall Summer Program is \$150; this amount, payable at Registration, is in addition to regular tuition, fees, and room and board.

Any freshman admitted to CU-Boulder is eligible to apply for admission to the Farrand/Sewall Summer Program, though preference is given to freshmen admitted to the Farrand or Sewall Residential Academic Year Programs.

Students interested in applying for the Farrand/Sewall Summer Program should indicate their interest on the University of Colorado Residence Halls Application included in this brochure. Additional information will be sent to those expressing such interest. Applications for the Farrand/Sewall Summer Program must be complete by May 15, 1985, to be considered.





Film Studies

The Film Studies Program is honored to welcome one of the world's foremost documentary filmmakers to the CU-Boulder campus for Summer Session 1985. Richard Leacock, cofounder of Leacock-Pennebacker and developer of the cinema vérité technique, will offer instruction in the fundamentals of Super 8mm camera operation and film editing techniques.

Geography

Nicholas Helburn and A. David Hill, two of the most experienced geographers in the United States, will present a graduate-level workshop entitled *Geographic Education* from June 10 to June 21. Emphasis will be on concepts central to the field of geography and innovative ways to involve students in the learning process. International English Center

For non-English-speaking students planning to study at United States colleges or universities, the University's International English Center (IEC) provides year-round intensive English language instruction, cultural orientation, and academic placement counseling. The eight-week summer program is also appropriate for tourist visitors seeking a general English course combined with intercultural enrichment. All classes—at beginning, intermediate, and advanced levels of English proficiency—meet for five hours each day, five days each week. Tuition for Summer Session, June 12 to August 9, 1985, is \$1,155. For special study groups from abroad, the IEC also offers a variety of short-term summer programs. These include classes in practical English for international managers and a twoweek language and culture course for high school students. Lecture Series

The American Heritage/Summer Lecture Series presents programs that are free and open to the public throughout the academic year. Mountain Research Station

The Mountain Research Station offers students the opportunity to spend an exciting summer studying environmental



science in the mountains of Colorado and Wyoming. Undergraduate and graduate credit is available through intensive field courses in botany, climatology, ecology, environmental field techniques, forest geography, and wilderness management. Rewarding research opportunities also exist through many of the special courses listed in the *Schedule of Courses* under EPO Biology and Geography.

The Station is located just 25 miles west of Boulder at an altitude of 9,500 feet



and only a short distance from the Continental Divide. It is a University field facility operated by the Institute of Arctic and Alpine Research. The Station offers unique opportunities for study and research in mountain environments. Classrooms, laboratories, computers, and a library are located in the John Marr Alpine Laboratory. The Laboratory is surrounded by cabins for students, visiting scientists, and the Station staff. Students may arrange for a cabin, if they apply early enough, or may commute with the opportunity to stay overnight between class days. A dining hall is available for the convenience of both residents and commuters. To make commuting easy. plans are being made to run a shuttle service between the Station and Boulder from Monday through Friday.

Students can look forward to long days out-of-doors at altitudes from 8,000 to 12,500 feet. Prospective students are encouraged, but not required, to enroll in more than one course where schedules permit.

College of Music

The College of Music offers special courses taught by its own faculty and visiting professors. Many of these courses are intensives and vary from one to three weeks in length. Check the *Schedule of Courses* for details. Students

Music Theatre Festival

The annual Music Theatre Festival (June 7-July 31) will feature full-scale productions of two Gilbert and Sullivan operas, *Mikado* and *Utopia Unlimited*. These shows will be directed by John Reed, O.B.E., who was for 28 years the chief comedian of the D'Oyly Carte Opera Company of London. Robert Olson, Music Director of the University of Colorado Opera Program, will be the Music Director.

The Music Theatre Program offers courses that survey the problems, skills, and theatrical elements of producing, directing, and performing in music theatre as well as a variable-credit-hour practicum in rehearsal and performance of Gilbert and Sullivan. Students may select up to 6 semester hours of credit from these courses for the Music Theatre Festival. Scholarships are available to qualified performers and theatre technical personnel. Institute for Music in General Studies

This one-week program (June 23-28) is sponsored by the College Music Society and is attended by college music teachers from all over the country who teach courses for the nonmusic major. Past institutes have focused on such topics as technology, world musics, teaching techniques for appreciation classes, and contemporary music. Sessions are held in the College of Music and are open to the public.

Kodàly: Methods and Principles of Music Education Certification Program

The Kodàly Method, widely accepted as a means of music education in America, provides teachers with a means of nurturing the aesthetic potential of students. Levels I and II will be offered June 17-28. These courses may be applied toward either Kodàly certification or a Master of Music Education degree with Kodàly emphasis.

Reserve Officers Training Corps Program

The Army ROTC will offer a five-week summer course for continuing freshman and sophomore students. Completion of this course may qualify students for placement in the ROTC commissioning program. Interested students should call (303) 492-6497 or 492-6495.

The Air Force and Naval ROTC units will not conduct classes on the Boulder Campus during the Summer Session.

Shakespeare in Production

A series of courses is available that relates formal study to observation and participation opportunities with the Colorado Shakespeare Festival. The faculty includes the directors of *Antony and*



Cleopatra, Merry Wives of Windsor, and Romeo and Juliet and the producing director of the Festival, with guest appearances by a wide variety of production personnel. Students may earn 1-9 semester hours of credit at different levels of academic study-both undergraduate and graduate. Inquiries about the program are encouraged and should be addressed to the Producing Director of the Colorado Shakespeare Festival, University of Colorado at Boulder, Campus Box 261, Boulder, Colorado 80309. Interested persons may consider the value of combining participation in this program with a Shakespeare course in the Department of English.

Young Scholars Summer Session, July 5-August 3

The Farrand Hall Residential Academic Program and the President's Leadership Class are sponsoring the Young Scholars Summer Session, a program for collegebound high school honors students who will be between their junior and senior years during the summer of 1985. The program offers students an intenso and challenging educational experience and provides them with information useful in planning their future education.

The Young Scholars Summer Sossion consists of five components:

1. Writing Workshop. The purpose of the Writing Workshop is to help students improve their ability to write. Daily exercises are evaluated by an experienced instructor.



2. The Experience of Scholarship in Everyday Life. This course is offered by the College of Arts and Sciences Honors Program. Students will rotate through classes especially prepared for the Young Scholars Summer Session and taught by three outstanding teachers representing diverse subject matter specialties. Students will learn selected aspects of the subject matter from each subject area and experience something of what it feels like to be involved as a professional in each area.

3. Encounters with the Performing Arts. This experiential course is aimed at studying the arts through lectures, discussions, and attendance at concerts, theatre and dance performances, and art exhibitions. The course examines the in terrolatedness of the arts and the relationships between classical and modern forms.

4. Speakers Series. Selected individuals of significant professional achievement will be invited to spend some time with the Young Scholars and to give a public lecture. 5. Seminar in College Life. Students will be provided information on financial aid, admissions policies, the implications of a liberal arts versus a professional college education, and other topics that may help them in planning for their future in higher education. Attention is also given to building a foundation for ethical decision making and to the development of leadership skills.

Students accepted for participation should expect to be challenged and busy. All participants are required to take all of the program.

The program fee for the Young Scholars Summer Session is \$1,000. Students completing the program successfully earn 6 semester hours of college-level credit. The program fee is in addition to room and board expenses, which are expected to be about \$450. Included in the latter will be the cost of mountain retreats, cookouts, weekend tournaments, and opportunities to explore the Rocky Mountain Region.

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Admission

New summer students are admitted under three broad classifications:

1. As undergraduate students working toward baccalaureate degrees at the University of Colorado, Boulder.

2. As graduate students working toward graduate degrees at the University of Colorado, Boulder.

3. As Special Students who are not currently enrolled in degree programs at the University of Colorado. High school students who wish to take college courses should apply as Special Students.

All credentials presented for admission to the University of Colorado become the property of the University and cannot be released to an applicant. The University reserves the right to deny admission to applicants, including Special Students, whose credentials reflect an inability of the applicant to assume those obligations of performance and behavior deemed essential by the University and relevant to any of its lawful missions, processes, and functions as an educational institution.

The University of Colorado Board of Regents reserves the right to establish enrollment levels on all categories of students accepted. Admission to a college or school of the University of Colorado does not guarantee eligibility for future transfer into other programs, colleges, or schools within the University.

An undergraduate Application for Admission and Application for Special Student Admission are provided in this brochure. Questions regarding admission procedures and application status may be directed to:

Confirmation Procedures

Degree applicants selected for admission are sent the appropriate forms to confirm their intent to enroll and are encouraged to return them *as soon as they have decided to enroll.* Admission becomes complete when the Office of Admissions receives *and* processes the signed Student Confirmation Form. No confirmation deposit is required for Summer Session 1985.

Undergraduate Students New Undergraduate Degree Students

Applicants seeking an undergraduate degree at the University must submit a *nonrefundable* \$20 application fee as part of their admission credentials. This fee, in the form of a check or money order *(not cash)*, must accompany the Application for Admission included in this brochure. Degree-seeking applicants should *not* use the Application for Special Student Admission.

Early application is encouraged. Since applications received after May 17, 1985, cannot be processed before Registration, students applying after this date should bring their applications to Registration for processing and should anticipate a delay at Registration.

Applicants who are admitted by April 19, 1985, will receive Registration materials by mail. New College of Arts and Sciences, College of Engineering and Applied Science, College of Music, and School of Education students will be required to attend an orientation session before Registration. The following admission credentials are required in addition to the Application for Admission.

Freshman Applicants. For freshman admission criteria, applicants should refer to *A Guide to Undergraduate Programs and Application Materials 1985-86* or the *University of Colorado at Boulder Catalog.* Freshman applicants must submit:

1. the nonrefundable \$20 application fee

2. an official transcript of high school work completed, including rank in class, courses in progress for the entire senior year, and expected date of high school graduation

3. scores on the Scholastic Aptitude Test (SAT) of the College Board *or* the American College Test (ACT)

4. if applicable, a copy of the Certificate of High School Equivalency, a copy of the GED test scores, and an official transcript of all high school work completed (grades 9 through 12)

Transfer Applicants. Applicants are considered transfer students if they have enrolled for any college-level work; full time or part time, since graduation from high school. College-level course work





taken while still in high school does not qualify an applicant as a transfer student. To be considered for admission, transfer applicants must report all previous college work and have a high school diploma or its equivalent. Detailed transfer student admission criteria are indicated in *A Guide to Undergraduate Programs and Application Materials* 1985-86 or the University of Colorado at Boulder Catalog. Transfer applicants must submit:

1. the nonrefundable \$20 application fee.

2. two official transcripts from each college or university attended. Transcripts must be sent directly to the Office of Admissions, University of Colorado, Boulder. Courses in progress must be included on the application. *The applicant may not disregard any part of a previous collegiate record.* Violation of this regulation may result in the student's dismissal from the University.

All transfer students who have completed fewer than 24 semester hours (or 36 quarter hours) of college work must submit an official high school transcript. Those students who have completed fewer than 12 semester hours (or 18 quarter hours) of college work must submit SAT or ACT scores *in addition* to a high school transcript. Students who are not high school graduates must submit copies of a certificate of high school equivalency and GED scores in addition to the above documents.

(Important: College of Business and Administration, College of Design and Planning, and College of Engineering and Applied Science applicants must submit an official high school transcript and SAT or ACT test scores regardless of the number of hours of college course work completed.)

Students who meet the College of Arts and Sciences foreign language requirement (satisfactory completion of Level III [third year] of a single foreign language in high school) must submit an official high school transcript directly to the College of Arts and Sciences Dean's Office, University of Colorado at Boulder, Campus Box 275, Boulder, Colorado 80309, within the first year of residency in the college.

Note: The School of Pharmacy accepts transfer students only for fall semester.

Former CU-Boulder Undergraduate Degree Students

Former students of the University of Colorado, Boulder who were not in attendance during Spring Semester 1985 must reapply for admission by submitting an Application for Admission.

Former degree applicants must submit:

1. the nonrefundable \$20 application fee.

2. two official transcripts from each college attended since their last attendance at the University of Colorado, if applicable. (This includes students attending Semester at Sea Spring Semester 1981 or thereafter. Foreign students who have previously enrolled in a degree program at CU-Boulder should use the Application for Admission in this brochure.)

Former students can apply for Summer Session 1985 beginning February 1, 1985. Early application is encouraged. Since applications received after May 17, 1985, cannot be processed before Registration, students applying after this date should bring their applications to Registration for processing. Applicants who are admitted by April 19, 1985, will receive Registration materials by mail. New College of Arts and Sciences and new and former College of Music students will be required to attend an orientation session before Registration.

Degree-seeking students in attendance at the Denver Campus, Colorado Springs Campus, or Health Sciences Center of the University of Colorado during Spring Semester 1985 who wish to apply for admission to the Boulder Campus must follow former student application procedures. No application fee is required for these students.

Intrauniversity Transfer (IUT)

A Boulder Campus undergraduate student who is enrolled for Spring Semester 1985 and who wishes to transfer to a different college or school on the Boulder Campus for Summer Session 1985 must submit a completed Intrauniversity Transfer Application Form to the new college or school before enrollment levels are met or before IUT deadlines are passed for the desired semester and field of study. Students should obtain the application from the college or school to which they desire to transfer. An undergraduate student who is not enrolled for Spring Semester 1985 on the Boulder Campus and who wishes to transfer to a different college or school on the Boulder Campus for Summer Session 1985 must submit an Application for Admission to the Office of Admissions as described under the Former CU-Boulder Undergraduate Degree Students section of this brochure.

For further information on recommended course work in preparation for Intrauniversity Transfer and other criteria. students should consult college and school sections of the University of Colorado at Boulder Catalog or talk with an academic advisor in the program to which they plan to transfer. It is important to emphasize that admission to a college or school through the IUT process is competitive, and not all students who apply are admitted. Decisions are based on course preparation, hours completed, grade point average, and other criteria the specific college or school deems appropriate.

Graduate Students

Continuing graduate degree students who are enrolled during Spring Semester 1985 are eligible to register for Summer Session 1985 without submitting an Application for Admission, provided they are in good standing and did not complete a degree at the end of Spring Semester 1985.



Former graduate degree students who did not attend Spring Semester 1985 must submit the Application for Admission found in this brochure and submit the *nonrefundable* \$20 application fee. Students are encouraged to submit their applications before May 17, 1985. Applications received after May 17 cannot be processed before Registration. Students applying after this date should bring their applications to Registration for processing.

All other graduate students, including those who received a degree in May, must submit a new Graduate Admission Application and be accepted in order to pursue another degree or attend Summer Session as Special Students.

Students wishing to enroll as Special Students should see the Special Student section of this brochure.



New students seeking a graduate degree should obtain application materials and further information from the specific academic department in which they wish to undertake graduate work.

Additional Information. Graduate applicants are urged to consult the University of Colorado at Boulder Catalog for detailed departmental offerings and requirements.

All requests for financial assistance should be made to the department at the time the application is submitted.

Special Students

The Special Student classification meets the needs of those students who wish to take University courses but who do not currently intend to work toward a degree at the University of Colorado. With the exception of high school students who have the approval of the Office of Admissions, Special Students must be 18 years of age or older and have a high school diploma or its equivalent in order to qualify for admission. Except for Summer Session, students who have attended a college or university must be in good standing at all collegiate institutions attended. Students may register for Summer Session to raise grade point averages to work toward a release of academic suspension.

Permission to register for regularly scheduled Boulder Campus courses is contingent upon availability of space. Special Students are not permitted to enroll in Business courses during the regular academic year. However, summer Special Students are allowed to take Business courses subject to completion of appropriate prerequisites. Special Students may take course work through the Colorado Consortium for Independent Study. Students register for this option through the Division of Continuing Education.

Special Students may register for courses on a pass/fail basis. However, such courses will be counted in the hours of pass/fail permitted according to the rules of the college or school to which the student is admitted if the student changes to degree status.

Special Students who have completed 6 semester hours of credit must have and must maintain a 2.00 cumulative grade point average. Failure to maintain the required average will result in suspension.

Prospective Special Students for Summer Session may obtain further information from Summer Admission and Registration Information, University of Colorado at Boulder, Campus Box 7, Boulder, Colorado 80309, phone (303) 492-7424. High school juniors who are interested in attending CU-Boulder the summer before their senior year are encouraged to apply for Summer Session as Special Students. High school records will be reviewed to determine the student's readiness to enroll in college-level courses.

Foreign students who want to apply to the University as Special Students should read the Foreign Students section of this brochure. Students interested in teacher certification should refer to the School of Education section of the University of Colorado at Boulder Catalog.

Application Procedure for Special

Student Applicants. All Special Student applicants for Summer Session 1985 (except foreign students) must submit the Application for Special Student Admission to the Office of Admissions. Applicants who are admitted by April 19, 1985, will receive Registration materials by mail. Since applications received after May 17



cannot be processed before Registration, students applying after May 17 should bring their applications to Registration for processing and should anticipate admission on a space-available basis and a delay at Registration.

Special Students Transferring to a Degree Program

A student who is currently enrolled or has been enrolled at any CU campus as a Special Student may apply for admission to an undergraduate degree program as a Special-to-Degree student by submitting an Application for Admission to the Office of Admissions with complete credentials and the *nonrefundable* \$20 application fee. Admission as a degree student is subject to enrollment levels.



Applicants must have earned a high school diploma or its equivalent, and all previous college-level work must be reported on the application. Two official transcripts from all colleges and schools attended (outside the University of Colorado system) must be sent directly from any previously attended institutions to the Office of Admissions. Special Students planning to transfer to a degree program should also refer to the Transfer Applicants section of this brochure.

A degree-seeking applicant may transfer a maximum of 12 semester hours taken as a Special Student with the approval of the appropriate dean's office. It is extremely important that Special Students who wish to transfer credits to a Boulder Campus degree program actively seek academic advising from the appropriate dean's office. Acceptance of credit toward degrees at the University changed in 1970. Special Students enrolled before that date may transfer credit in accordance with provisions in effect between January 1969 and August 1970.



Transfer of credit to another college or university is within the discretion of the degree-granting institution.

Students wishing to transfer to a graduate degree program should refer to the Graduate School section of the *University of Colorado at Boulder Catalog.*

High School Students

High school students who wish to take a University class the summer before their senior year must submit a high school transcript to the Office of Admissions and a completed Application for Special Student Admission signed by both a high school counselor or principal *and* a parent or legal guardian. High school records will be reviewed regarding readiness to take college-level courses. See the Special Offerings section of this brochure for information on programs of special interest to high school students.

Teacher Certification Renewal

Certified teachers with a baccalaureate degree who seek only a *renewal* of the certificate currently held and who do not require institutional endorsement or recommendation should apply for admission as Special Students. Persons holding a baccalaureate degree who seek *initial* teacher certification are



directed to apply to the School of Education for the Teacher Education Program. For information on the deadlines for admission to the Teacher Education Program, applicants should consult the Office of Teacher Education, University of Colorado at Boulder, Campus Box 249, Boulder, Colorado 80309, phone (303) 492-6555.

Foreign Students

Foreign students may apply to enroll as Special Students for Summer Session provided they are in the United States in appropriate nonimmigrant status that extends their lawful stays through the summer. (Students who have established permanent resident status in the United States and have alien registration numbers are *not* considered foreign students.) The University of Colorado, Boulder does not issue Forms I-20 or assume any immigration responsibility for Special Students.

Students holding temporary visas may not gain admission as Special Students for fall or spring semesters without special permission from the Division of Continuing Education, University of Colorado at Boulder, 1221 University Avenue, Campus Box 178, Boulder, Colorado 80309, phone (303) 492-5148.

Foreign students who wish to apply for admission as Special Students for only the summer should complete the Application for Special Student Admission included in this brochure and send it to the Foreign Student and Scholar Office, University of Colorado at Boulder, Campus Box 124, Boulder, Colorado 80309.

Foreign student applicants must send the following with their applications:

1. A letter from the foreign student advisor, dean, or other appropriate official at the school they currently attend certifying that they are in good standing and that they are eligible to and intend to return to that school in the fall term, or evidence that they are eligible to and intend to enroll in another school in the fall term

2. A photocopy of both sides of their immigration Forms I-20 ID copy I-94, or other documentary information regarding their immigration status

3. Documentary evidence of their financial support for the summer

The Foreign Student and Scholar Office will determine eligibility for Special Stu-

dent status for all foreign students. Admission as a Special Student is for the summer only and does not constitute admission to a degree program or permission to continue enrollment beyond the summer.

Persons who are not already in the United States are not encouraged to



come to the United States for the purpose of attending Summer Session as Special Students at the University of Colorado, Boulder. The University cannot issue Forms I-20 or other immigration documents for this purpose.

Students who wish to seek undergraduate or graduate degrees at the University of Colorado, Boulder should not apply for admission as Special Students. Rather, they should call or write the Office of Admissions to obtain instructions and application materials with which to apply for degree status.

Upon arrival in Boulder, all foreign students should check in, with passports and immigration documents, at the Foreign Student and Scholar Office in the Environmental Design Building. The staff will provide instructions for Registration and other information necessary for new foreign students.

Sponsored students whose tuition and fees are paid to the University by a sponsoring agency must provide—before Registration—documentary evidence of that sponsorship and a billing authorization to the Bursar's Office, University of Colorado at Boulder, Regent Administrative Center 102, Campus Box 48, Boulder, Colorado 80309, with a copy to the Foreign Student and Scholar Office. All other students must be prepared to pay Summer Session tuition and fees at the time of Registration.

Continuing Student Registration— Summer 1985

Students who are currently enrolled on the CU-Boulder campus for Spring 1985 may register for Summer Session 1985 in the foyer of Regent Administrative Center the week of April 15-19. Students may register between 9:00 a.m. and 4:30 p.m., and until 6:30 p.m. on Thursday, April 18.

Mail Registration

The following students may register by mail during the last two weeks of April if they have been admitted to CU-Boulder through April 19: Former CU-Boulder undergraduate students in Arts and Sciences and Engineering; all undergraduate students in Business, Design and Planning, Journalism, and Pharmacy; all undergraduate *and* graduate Special Students; and all undergraduate and graduate students in Education. Those students admitted after April 19, 1985, must register on June 7, 1985.

College of Arts and Sciences new freshmen, new transfer students, and conditional students (including Special-to-Degree and Campus Change) should follow instructions in the Registration— Arts and Sciences section of this brochure.

All other students should follow instructions in the Registration—June 7 section of this brochure.

Deposits, Schedules, and Bills

Early Registrants. Early registrants (oncampus and mail) will be required to pay a tuition deposit (\$75 in-state, \$200 outof-state) at the time of Registration. This deposit will be refunded only if a student notifies the Office of Registrations of withdrawal from the University for Summer Session by May 10, 1985. Class Schedules and Tuition and Fee Bill's must be picked up by early registrants June 7-14 for Terms A, C, D, and E. Schedule and Bill Pickup for Terms B and F is July 15-22. See Academic Calendar for locations

Registration-June 7

All students who have not yet registered for Summer Session 1985 may register on Friday, June 7, from 8:00 a.m. to 3:00 p.m. in the UMC Ballroom. Students who have not yet applied but would like to register for Summer Session may bring a completed application to Registration on June 7.

Students are encouraged to register on June 7 for classes for all terms of Summer Session. A tuition deposit (\$75 instate, \$200 out-of-state) will be required on this date.



Registration—July 15

Students who are not already registered for Summer Session may register on July 15 for Terms B and F. The process begins in the foyer of Regent Administrative Center, continues to the academic department offices for class add forms, goes on to the cashiers at Regent 150, and is completed in the foyer of Regent Administrative Center. Students registering on July 15 will be required to pay a tuition deposit (\$75 in-state, \$200 out-ofstate) on this date. Registration will be held from 8:30 a.m. to 4:00 p.m.

Students who are already registered for any term of Summer Session need not register on July 15. Thase students only need to obtain class add forms for Terms B or F classes from the academic department offices and submit the forms to the Office of Registrations, Regent 125. See Academic Calendar and Add Procedure.

Arts and Sciences Students

College of Arts and Sciences new freshmen, conditional students, and new transfer students with 24 semester hours or less of transfer credit must attend a



two-day orientation and registration program on June 6-7 or July 14-15. During the two-day program, students will register for summer classes. For further information, call the Orientation Office at Counseling Services, (303) 492-6766.

Registration—Intensives and Special Sessions

Students interested in intensive or special session classes are encouraged to register on the dates listed above. Registration may also be completed on the first day of the class by obtaining add forms from the department and proceeding to Regent Administrative Center 4, from 8:30 a.m. to noon, or 1:00 p.m. to 4:00 p.m. Total tuition and fees must be paid at the time of Registration. Late fees will be charged for Registration after the first day of class.



Late Registration

Students may register late, but a Late Registration fee will be assessed at the rate of \$20 the first day, \$25 the second day, and \$30 the third day and thereafter. If an exception to the late fee is requested, substantial evidence for the delay must be presented. This policy applies to graduate students as well as undergraduates and Special Students. Late Registration will be held in the foyer of Regent Administrative Center from 8:30 a.m. to 4:00 p.m. on Monday, June 10, and thereafter, in Regent Administrative Center 4 from 8:30 a.m. to noon, and 1:00 p.m. to 4:00 p.m.

Registration—Division of Continuing Education

Registration for some departmentally sponsored special courses is conducted at the Division of Continuing Education. Deadlines differ from the Boulder Campus Office of Registrations deadlines. Tuition assessments vary and must be paid in full before the first class session. More specific information about these programs may be obtained from the appropriate departments or by writing or calling the Division of Continuing Education, University of Colorado at Boulder, 1221 University Avenue, Campus Box 178, Boulder, Colorado 80309, phone (303) 492-5148. Office hours are 8:30 a.m. to 5:00 p.m., Monday through Thursday, and 8:30 a.m. to 4:30 p.m., Friday.

Faculty/Staff Registration

Application Procedures. Faculty and staff who are Special Students, or those students not enrolled in a degree program, have to reapply for each semester they wish to attend CU-Boulder. Degree students who are former or Campus-Change students (not enrolled on the Boulder Campus during Spring Semester 1985) must also apply for admission for Summer Session. Applications are provided in this brochure. Summer Session Registration materials will be automatically prepared for students who were enrolled in a degree program for Spring Semester 1985. **Registration Procedures.** All faculty and staff who wish to enroll for Summer Session 1985 must take a copy of their PAF and a consent card, signed by their supervisor, to the Accounts Receivable section of the Bursar's Office by May 20. These cards are available at the Bursar's Office, Regent 150. Special Students, new students, and former students may turn in the appropriate Application for Admission to the Bursar's Office with their PAF and consent card.

To take advantage of the free semester hours (6 per academic year for full-time faculty and staff), students must register on June 10 for Terms A, C, D, and E, and on June 15 for Terms B and F. Registration may be completed from 8:30 a.m. to 4:00 p.m. in Regent 125.

Add forms from the departments must be completed and turned in with Registration materials to Accounts Receivable by the published add deadline for each term.

Supervision of Students

All summer degree students enrolled at the University of Colorado, Boulder are under the jurisdiction of their respective academic deans.

All Special Students are under the jurisdiction of the Director of Registrations.



Add Procedure

No change of program to add a course is valid until an add form, obtained in department offices, has been properly signed and filed in the Office of Registrations, Regent Administrative Center 125. Students should retain the validated receipt given when the add form is submitted.

During the first 5 days of the 5-week terms and the first 10 days of the 8- and 10-week terms, no signatures are required. Some courses, such as skillsbuilding courses, may have add deadlines that are shorter than these. Students should check with their instructors for any variations to this policy. *Intensives* that last 2 weeks or less have an add deadline of 2 days. *Intensives* with a duration between 2 and 5 weeks have an add deadline of 5 days. After this time, students are not allowed to add classes.

Drop Procedure

No change of program to drop a course is valid until a drop form, properly signed, has been filed in the Office of Registrations, Regent Administrative Center 125. A student who discontinues attendance in a course without officially dropping the course will receive a grade of *F*.

Students should obtain a receipt when turning in a drop form and save the receipt. Drop forms can be obtained in departmental offices.

Students who wish to drop their last or only course should refer to the section entitled *Withdrawal Procedure*.

During the first 5 days of a 5-week term and during the first 10 days of an 8- or 10-week term, students may drop



courses without the signature of an instructor. Tuition and fees will be adjusted accordingly.

After this time, the student must obtain the instructor's signature, and the courses dropped will appear on the final grade list, the student grade report, and the permanent record page with a *W* in the grade column. Students must be passing the course at the time it is dropped. No tuition and fee adjustment will be made.

Students in courses that last 5 weeks or longer but **do not start on June 10 or July 16** will have a drop deadline based on approximately 68 percent of the class days. For example: for 5-week classes, the last day to drop is the seventeenth class day; for 6-week classes, the last day to drop is the twentieth class day; for 7-week classes, the last day to drop is the twenty-third class day.

Courses shorter than 5 weeks may be dropped up to the last 2 days of classes.

Tuition and fees will be adjusted for drops during the first 5 days in a 5-week term or the first 10 days in an 8- or 10-week term.

Credit/No Credit

Students who wish to register for course work for no credit must inform the Office of Registrations by the add deadline of each term. *No* changes in Registration for credit will be permitted after this date. Tuition is the same whether or not credit is received in a course.

Pass/Fail (P/F)

1. Any student who wishes to register for a course on a pass/fail basis should do so during the regular add period.

2. Academic deans and faculty will not be informed of pass/fail Registration. All students who register on a pass/fail basis appear on the class roster, and a letter grade is assigned by the instructor. When grades are received in the Office of Registrations, those registrations that require a P/F designation are automatically converted. Grades of Dand above convert to grades of P. Grades of F would convert to a letter grade of F.

3. Only 6 semester hours of course work may normally be taken P/F in any given semester.

4. Exceptions to the P/F regulations are permitted for certain courses that are offered only on a P/F basis.

5. Students should refer to college and school sections of the *Catalog* for special requirements or procedures.

Final Examinations

Final examinations are expected to be given in most University courses. There are certain courses, such as graduate seminars, excepted from this general expectation. Final examinations, when required, are given during the last two class periods in the term. *Early examinations* are not permitted.

Withdrawal Procedure

Students who have registered for any summer term and find it necessary to withdraw for the entire Summer Session



must follow withdrawal procedures established by the Office of Registrations. Students who fail to withdraw will be liable for the full amount of tuition and fees assessed for Summer Session 1985 (in compliance with the Board of Regents ruling on August 18, 1971).

Students must withdraw in the Office of Registrations, Regent 125. Before their classes start, a letter may be sent to the Withdrawal Coordinator, Office of Registrations, University of Colorado at Boulder, Regent Administrative Center 125, Campus Box 7, Boulder, Colorado 80309. After their classes have started, students must pick up drop forms for all classes for which they are registered and turn them in to the Office of Registrations, Regent 125, from 8:30 a.m. to 4:00 p.m., Monday through Friday. Special withdrawal interviews are conducted for those students who have attended CU-Boulder in Fall 1984 or Spring 1985 and have chosen to withdraw from the University during their summer enrollment. These students are asked to stop by the Information Window at Regent 125 to begin the withdrawal interview.

Time Out Program (TOP)

The University's Time Out Program is a planned leave program for currently enrolled CU-Boulder students who are in good standing in their college or school and whose dean approves their leave for a minimum of one semester or a maximum of one year. (Example: after completing a fall semester in December, the student returns the following September or a year later in January.) A \$20 program fee is required at the time of application.

TOP will guarantee students a place in their current college or school and in



their current major. Also, Intrauniversity Transfer is available to students in TOP. Additional information and applications can be obtained from the Office of Registrations, Regent Administrative Center 125, phone (303) 492-7205.





Full-time Course Load Definitions

The following are the definitions of a fulltime summer course load. For further information and guidelines regarding other course load regulations, students should see specific college and school sections of the University of Colorado at Boulder Catalog. Students receiving financial aid, rećeiving veterans' benefits, or living in University housing should check with the appropriate office regarding course load requirements for eligibility purposes.

Undergraduate

A full-time undergraduate student in the summer is one who is enrolled for at least 5 semester hours.

Graduate

A full-time graduate student in the summer is one who is enrolled for at (cast 3 semester hours in course work numbered 500 or above or 4 semester hours in a



combination of undergraduate, graduate, or professional course work used for graduate credit, or any number of thesis hours.

Uniform Grading System

The following grading system is standardized for all colleges and schools of the Boulder Campus. The addition of plus/ minus grades was approved for the colleges and schools to implement at their discretion in Spring Semester 1984. Each instructor is responsible for determining the requirements for a course and for assigning grades on the basis of those requirements.

Explanation of IF and IW

An *IF* or *IW* is an incomplete grade. Policies with respect to *IF/IW* grades are available in the individual college and school dean's offices. Use of the *IF* or *IW* is at the option of the academic dean's office.

The student must ask for the incomplete grade. An incomplete grade is given only when students, for reasons beyond their control, have been unable to complete the course requirements. It is understood that a substant al amount of work must have been satisfactorily completed before approval for such a grade is given.

If an instructor decides to grant a request for *IF* or *IW*, the instructor sets the conditions whereby the course work will be completed. The instructor may set less time than one year for completion. The student is expected to complete the requirements within the established deadline and not retake the entire course.

However, the instructor, with approval of the department, determines if the course should be retaken. If a course is retaken, the student must reregister for the course and pay the appropriate tuition. The final grade (earned by completing the course requirements or by retaking the course) does not result in deletion of the IF or IW grade symbol from the transcript. A second entry is posted on the transcript to show the final grade for the course.

At the end of one year, IF and IW grades for courses that are not completed or repeated will be regarded as F or W, respectively. Requests for an extension of time to complete the course beyond the one-year deadline will normally not be approved by the academic dean's office.

Grade Point Average

The grade point average is computed by multiplying the credit points per semester hours for each course, totaling the hours and the credit points for all courses and dividing the total credit points by tota: semester hours. Grades of *P. NC. Y. W. IP. IW.* and *IF* are not included in the grade point average. *IFs* that are not completed within one year are calculated as *F* in the GPA at the end of the one year grace period.

It is University of Colorado policy that the undergraduate GPA is calculated separately from the graduate GPA.

If a course is repeated, all grades earned

are used in determining the University GPA.

Students should refer to their academic dean's office for individual grade point average calculations as they relate to academic progress and graduation from their college or school.

Academic Standing

Good academic standing in most colleges and schools requires a 2.00 grade point average (GPA). Students should consult the appropriate dean's office regarding college or school minimum GPA requirements and probationary policies.

Grade Reports

Grade reports for any of the summer terms (Term A through Term F) will be available for students to pick up from their dean's office on approximately August 30. Grade reports are not automatically mailed; however, a selfaddressed, stamped envelope may be supplied to the dean's office by individual students.



Official Transcripts

The official transcript includes the complete academic records of courses, undergraduate and graduate, taken at all campus locations or divisions of the University of Colorado. It contains the signature of the Director of Records and the official embossed seal of the University. Primary usage of the official transcript is for application for transfer to other academic institutions and for employment purposes.

Transcripts of academic records at the University of Colorado (all campuses) may be ordered in person or by mail from the Office of Records, University of Colorado at Boulder, Regent Administrative Center 125, Transcript Section, Campus Box 68, Boulder, Colorado 80309. Official transcripts that include summer term grades will be available beginning the first week of September. A transcript that is to have the degree recorded will be available the first week of October. Requests should include the following:

1. Student's full name (include maiden or other name if applicable).

2. Student number.

3. Birthdate.

4. The last term and campus where the student was in attendance.

5. Whether the current semester grades are to be included when a transcript is ordered near the end of a term.

6. Full names of the recipients of the transcripts, whether they are agencies, colleges, or individuals. Complete mailing addresses should be included. Transcripts sent to students are labeled "issued to student."

7. Student's signature. (This is the student's authorization to release the records to the designee.)

There is no charge for official transcripts. Transcripts are prepared only at the student's request. A student having financial obligations to the University that are due and unpaid will not be granted a transcript. Copies of transcripts from other institutions cannot be furnished.

Unofficial Transcripts

The unofficial transcript is the complete academic record at the University of Colorado that is primarily used for advising and counseling within the offices on campus and within the offices at other University of Colorado campus locations. The unofficial copy does not carry the embossed seal of the University.

Whenever an unofficial transcript is needed, the student may pick up a copy at the appropriate academic dean's office with the following exceptions:

1. Graduate students pick up their copy at their major department office.

2. Arts and Sciences, Business, and Special Students pick up copies at Regent Administrative Center 125.

A charge of \$.50 is made for immediate service. There is no charge for copies delivered to other University of Colorado offices at the student's request.



Family Educational Rights and Privacy Act

Periodically, but not less than annually, the University informs students of the Family Educational Rights and Privacy Act of 1974. This Act, with which the institution intends to comply fully, was designed to protect the privacy of education records, to establish the right of students to inspect and review their education records in all offices, and to provide guidelines for the correction of inaccurate or misleading data through informal and formal hearings. Students also have the right to file complaints with the Family Educational Rights and Privacy Act (FERPA) Office concerning alleged failures by the institution to comply with the act.



Local policy explains in detail the procedures to be used by the institution for compliance with the provisions of the act. Copies of the policy can be found in the Government Publications Office in Norlin Library, the Law Library, or the Office of Records on the Boulder Campus. Copies of the policy are also located in the libraries or offices of Admissions and Records on the other campuses.

The Director of Records on the Boulder Campus and the registrars on the other University campuses have been designated by the institution to coordinate the inspection and review of student education records located in various University offices. Students wishing to review their education records must complete a request form in the office of the Director of Records or registrar for the appropriate campus. Requests should list the item or items of interest. Records covered by the Act will be made available within 45 days of a request.

Students *may not* inspect the following as outlined by the Act: (1) financial information submitted by their parents, (2) confidential letters that they have waived their rights to review, or (3) education records containing information about more than one student, in which case the institution will permit access *only* to that part of the record that pertains to the inquiring student. Records that may be inspected include *admissions, academic, and financial files and cooperative education and placement records.*

The following items of student information have been designated by the University of Colorado as public or directory information: name, address, telephone number, dates of attendance, registration status, class, major field of study, awards, honors, degree(s) conferred, past and present participation in officially recognized sports and activities, physical factors (height, weight) of athletes, date and place of birth. Such information may be disclosed by the institution for any purpose, at its discretion.



No other information regarding students' education records may be disclosed to anyone without the written consent of students, *except* (1) to personnel within the institution, (2) to officials of other institutions in which students seek to enroll, (3) to persons or organizations providing students financial aid (this includes the parents upon whom students are financially dependent), (4) to accrediting agencies carrying out their accreditation functions, or (5) to persons in an emergency to protect the health or safety of students or other persons.

The University requests that parents who would like a copy of their child's transcript have the student obtain one for them. Currently enrolled students may withhold disclosure of directory information under the Family Educational Rights and Privacy Act of 1974. To withhold disclosure, students should inquire at the appropriate campus office before the eleventh day of classes each term. The University of Colorado assumes that failure on the part of any student to specifically request the withholding of directory information indicates individual approval for disclosure.

Boulder Campus students should request the form that describes the Family Educational Rights and Privacy Act from the Office of Records, University of Colorado at Boulder, Regent Administrative Center 125. Students on other campuses should inquire at their respective office of admissions and records.

Tuition and Fees¹

Tuition rates and medical coverage fees have not been set for Summer Session 1985. The following table shows Summer 1984 rates. Tuition for Summer 1985 will differ from the rates shown. Final rates depend upon the level of support provided by state appropriations as determined in late Spring of 1985. Summer Session students are required to pay health and activity fees. The fees pay for some of the services available at Wardenburg Student Health Service, as well as services at the libraries and the Recreation Center. The amount of the fees is based on the number of weeks a student is enrolled. These fees have not been set for Summer 1985, but it is estimated they will not exceed \$8 per week.

2. Continuing students who have student health insurance for Spring Semester are covered for Summer Session. New students or students who wish to purchase insurance should check with Wardenburg Student Health Service personnel.

3. There is no concurrent Registration during Summer Session. Students registering separately on more than one campus of the University for a single term pay tuition and fees to each campus at the rate appropriate to the number of semester hours for which they are registered on that campus.

4. Any permanent full-time employee may enroll for 6 semester hours of credit and any permanent part-time employee for a proportionate number of semester hours of credit in any academic year, without payment, on a *space available basis*. Course work must be taken outside scheduled working hours or with an adjusted work schedule of equiva-

lent hours acceptable to the employing department.

5. Out-of-state students enrolled as master's "Candidates for Degree" in order to take a comprehensive examination for a master's degree will pay for 3 semester hours at the rate prescribed for graduate in-state students.

6. Zero or a fractional semester hour of credit is regarded as 1 semester hour in assessing tuition and fees.

7. Tuition for courses taken for no credit (NC) is the same as for courses taken for credit.

8. Special Students with degrees will be assessed tuition at graduate student rates. Special Students without degrees will be assessed tuition at undergraduate rates.



Matriculation Fee

There is a one-time *nonrefundable* matriculation fee of \$15 for new degree students. This fee will be assessed at the time of initial Registration. By paying this fee, students are able to drop courses and request official transcripts free of charge. A Special Student who is admitted to degree status will be assessed a \$15 matriculation fee at the time of the student's first Registration as a degree student.

Tuition and Fee Regulations

1. Payment of Tuition and Fees. Tuition and Fee Bills must be paid in full by 4:00 p.m. on June 24 for Term A, C, and D classes and by 4:00 p.m. on July 29 for Term B, E, and F classes. Students are encouraged to pay all tuition and fees at the time of Registration; however, the minimum amount due at that time is the Registration deposit (\$75 in-state, \$200 out-of-state). Deferred payments are not available during the summer. All students who register and attend classes are liable for payment of tuition and fees even if they withdraw from school. Students having unpaid financial obligations of any nature due the University will not be allowed to receive their diplomas or any transcript of credits; the only exceptions to the foregoing are loans maturing after graduation. Students with such financial obligations may not be allowed to enroll for a subsequent term.

2. Personal Checks. Any student who pays a Tuition and Fee Bill with a check that is returned from the bank will be subject to disenrollment from the University. In addition, payment will be required for the amount due plus a \$15 returned check charge and late payment charges if the due date for payment of Tuition and Fee Bills is past. Any check presented to any department of the University that is returned from the bank unpaid will require payment of the amount due plus a \$15 returned check charge. The student may also be liable for collection costs and prosecution under one of the following Colorado Criminal Statutes: 18-4-401, Theft by deception; 18-5-205, Fraud by check; 18-5-512, Issuance of a bad check. The University of Colorado at Boulder is a member of the Boulder Credit Bureau. Specific inquiries concerning reporting should be directed to the Collections Department of the Bursar's Office, phone (303) 492-5571.

3. Late Registration Fee. A late Registration fee will be charged *all* students (including those registering for

doctor's thesis) who fail to complete Registration according to the instructions and to pay fees during the specified period. The late Registration fee is \$20 for the first day, \$25 for the second day, and \$30 thereafter.

4. Withdrawals. Students wishing to withdraw from the University of Colorado should go to the Office of Admissions, Regent Administrative Center 125.

Students registered for the 10-week session or 8-week term will be assessed charges upon withdrawal from the University according to the following schedule:

First 10 days of classes ... 0% charge Beginning on the eleventh day of classes and thereafter 100% charge

Students registered for a 5-week term will be assessed charges according to the following schedule:

First 5 days of classes 0% charge Beginning on the sixth day of classes and thereafter 100% charge

Students registered for any intensive of 2 weeks or less will be assessed charges according to the following schedule:

First 2 days of class0% charge Beginning on the third day of class and thereafter100% charge

Students registered for any intensive with a duration between 2 and 5 weeks will be assessed charges according to the following schedule:

First 5 days of class0% charge Beginning on the sixth day of class and thereafter100% charge

Any questions regarding withdrawal policies and procedures should be referred to the Tuition and Fees section of the Bursar's Office (303) 492-5381 or the Office of Registrations at (303) 492-6970.

5. Drop/Add. It is the responsibility of the student to be aware of the deadlines. Adjustment of tuition and fees will be made on changes of academic schedules through the fifth day of a 5-week term, or tenth day of an 8- or 10-week term. Intensives that last 2



weeks or less have a deadline of 2 days. Intensives with a duration between 2 and 5 weeks have a deadline of 5 days. No refunds of any charges will be made for dropping courses after the fifth day of a 5-week term or intensive course, or the tenth day of an 8- or 10-week term. Charges will be assessed for the addition of hours at any time.

Disenrollment Policies and Procedures

When students default on payments, official notifications will be mailed by the Office of Registrations to the student's address of record. The letter will inform students that their accounts are overdue and that they have been disenrolled from the University. Students will also be informed of the appeal and reinstatement procedures.

Disenrollment. Students who fail to meet their tuition and fee obligations by published due dates will be subject to immediate disenrollment. A student who is disenrolled will:

1. not receive grades for courses in progress

2. not be issued transcripts, diplomas, certification, or Registration materials

3. still owe full tuition and fees, including late payment charges

Reinstatement. Students who are disenrolled may petition for reinstatement. Petitions should be received during the term that the disenrollment occurred. Only extraordinary circumstances beyond the student's control will be considered as a basis for petitioning. Lack of financial planning is not a basis for petitioning.

In-State and Out-of-State Classification for Tuition Purposes

New students are classified as in-state or out-of-state for tuition purposes on the basis of information provided on the Application for Admission and other relevant information. Applicants may be required to submit evidence substantiating their claim of in-state eligibility. Applicants who feel their initial classification is incorrect may address inquiries to the Tuition Classification Coordinator.

To be eligible for in-state classification. applicants, or their parents (if the applicant is an unemancipated minor), must maintain legal residence in Colorado for the 12 months preceding the term for which in-state status is claimed. Students who will not be 22 years of age by the first day of class are assumed to be unemancipated minors and to have the same legal residence as their parents. Such students whose parents do not live in Colorado must petition to prove emancipated status for the preceding year. Students normally lose in-state eligibility if they, or their parents (if the student is an unemancipated minor), maintain domicile outside Colorado for one year or more. Such students are responsible for notifying the Tuition Classification Coordinator of the loss of their in-state eligibility.



Petitioning for In-State Classification

Applicants and students who feel their classification is incorrect or who have become eligible for a change to in-state status must submit a petition with documentation in order to have their status changed. Detailed instructions as to the procedure to follow, the necessary petition forms, and an explanation of the Colorado tuition classification statute are available from the Tuition Classification Coordinator, University of Colorado at Boulder, Regent Administrative Center 125, Campus Box 68, Boulder, Colorado 80309, phone (303) 492-6868. Students at other campuses should address their inquiries to the appropriate Office of Admissions and Records.

Classification Notes

1. Summer petitions must be submitted by Friday of the first week of classes for the term for which the applicant seeks reclassification. Requests for review of an out-of-state classification made on the basis of an application must also be made by Friday of the first week of classes.

2. In-state classifications become effective as of the first term that begins one year after legal residence in Colorado has been established. Changes of classification never take effect mid-term.

3. Students who willfully give false information to evade payment of out-of-state tuition or who fail to provide timely notice of their loss of in-state eligibility are subject to retroactive assessment of out-ofstate tuition, as well as disciplinary and legal action.

4. Tuition classification is governed by Colorado statutes and by judicial decisions that apply to all state-funded institutions in Colorado and is subject to change without notice.

Financial Aid

Degree-seeking students who plan to enroll in the University of Colorado, Boulder Summer Session for 6 or more semester hours (3 for graduate students) are eligible to apply for need-based financial aid. These students must complete an aid application, either the Family Financial Statement (FFS), which is processed by the American College Testing (ACT) Need Analysis Service, or the Financial Aid Form (FAF), which is processed by the College Scholarship Service (CSS). CU-Boulder's filing deadline is March 1, 1985, which means that the aid application must be received by the need analysis service by this date for the applicant to meet the filing deadline. In order for students to be considered for summer assistance, they must also have provided complete answers to any Office of Financial Aid requests for information by the deadline date printed on the Additional Information Request (AIR) form. Students are only sent the AIR if the Office of Financial Aid needs additional information to complete their file: It is expected that need-based funds will be extremely limited for Summer Session 1985, if available at all.

Aid applications are available through the Office of Financial Aid, located in the basement of the Environmental Design Building, or from local high schools or colleges.

Students interested in applying for a Guaranteed Student Loan (GSL) should obtain an application from their local lender. Applications for the GSL must be completed and submitted to the Office of Financial Aid no later than March 4, 1985, for the GSL check to be available by tuition payment deadlines for Summer Session 1985. Families with combined incomes greater than \$30,000 must demonstrate financial need to be eligible.

Student Employment

Two types of employment opportunities are available to summer students: College Work-Study and regular or hourly employment. Students interested in the College Work-Study Program must apply using the aid application and meet the filing deadline as explained above. Students interested in Full-Time Summer Work-Study (FTSWS) employment opportunities are urged to write or call the Office of Financial Aid before March 1, 1985, for instructions on the application procedure. The FTSWS program is designed for students who are not attending Summer Session, but who wish to work 40 hours per week to save money for the academic year. Students are not allowed to take more than one course during the summer when participating in this program. These students may work as few as 35 hours per week with their supervisor's approval. This program is not to be confused with regular Work-Study, which is limited to full-time students.

Hourly employment opportunities that do not require an aid application are also posted in the student employment area of the Office of Financial Aid. The Job Locator Development (JLD) coordinator is available to assist students in locating suitable off-campus hourly employment. Interviews are scheduled on an appointment basis, and interested students are advised to come to the Office of Financial Aid or to call (303) 492-5091 to arrange an appointment.



Housing is available through both University facilities and private listings. The University provides many types of housing for single and married students. These facilities are available through the offices designated below.

University Housing Residence Halls

Students should send the application in this brochure to the Residence Halls Reservation Center, University of Colorado at Boulder, Hallett 80, Boulder, Colorado 80310. An advance payment of \$60 is required to complete a University of Colorado Residence Halls Application —Summer 1985. Students should note that all Residence Hall facilities are reserved on a first-come first-served basis, without regard to race, creed, or color.

The information in this brochure refers to reservations for the Summer Session only. The University cannot assure residence beyond Summer Session on the basis of a summer application; a separate application and advance payment must be submitted for Fall Semester 1985.

University Housing reservations and University admission/confirmation procedures (and deposits) are totally separate transactions, one of which does



not guarantee the other. For information regarding admission/confirmation, call the Office of Admissions at (303) 492-6301.

Only regularly enrolled students or other persons authorized by the Director of Housing will be permitted the use of University of Colorado Residence Hall facilities. Students should not request reservations for summer housing until they have received notification of admission to the University.

Subject to the availability of space, freshman students are required to live in a University Residence Hall for Summer Session, as well as the following academic year (both fall and spring semesters), unless they are married or live with parents or relatives in the Boulder area and have permission to commute. Requests from freshmen for permission to reside off campus for other reasons will be considered on their merit, taking into account the individual circumstances of the petitioner.

For information regarding freshman permission to reside off campus, write to the Assistant Director of Housing, University their rooms no later than the first day of classes for the term in which they are enrolled or the rooms will be released to other students. All residents must vacate their rooms before 10:00 a.m. on the day after the close of the term. If changes in the University academic calendar require changes in Residence Hall occupancy and meal service dates, notice will be sent with room assignments.

Students taking a short-term course (less than 5 weeks) may arrange to live in a Residence Hall. For further information, write to the Residence Halls Reservation Center.

Residence Hall Accommodations.

Residence Halls that will be in use for Summer Session 1985 were not designated when this brochure went to press. Halls to be designated will offer a

of Colorado at Boulder, Hallett 64, Boulder, Colorado 80310. Questions regarding the possibility of such permission should be resolved before prospective students confirm their intent to enroll at the University.

All rooms are rented on a room and board basis, with no refunds for meals missed. No meals will be served on Sundays. *Residents must be prepared to pay room and board for the entire period reserved at the time they check into the Residence Hall.* Rates for Summer Session 1985 were not yet determined when this brochure went to press; however, an increase over 1984 is anticipated.¹ Persons making reservations will be informed of any rate increase.

Rooms may be occupied after 8:00 a.m. on the day preceding Registration for the term to be attended. Registration dates are June 7 for the first 5-week term and the 10-week term and July 15 for the second 5-week term. Unless advance notice is given, students must occupy variety of attractive and comfortable accommodations, including single and double rooms and dining room within the building or nearby.

It is expected that freshmen and sophomores will be assigned together in a designated hall. A few single rooms will be available on a first-come first-served basis for freshmen and sophomores who request them. Other areas will be set aside for upper-division students. It is anticipated that single rooms will be available in these areas for most students who request them. However, single rooms cannot be guaranteed.

A limited number of furnished buffet apartments will be available without board in Reed Hall for senior and graduate students only. Except in the case of mutually requested roommates, all assignments in Reed are singles. Private bath, two closets, and kitchenette with stove and refrigerator are included. Rates per apartment were \$700.89 for

Summer Session 1984, based on calendar occupancy from June 7 to August 18. Summer 1985 rates are expected to increase.

Except for late applicants, students will be informed by mail of their specific Residence Hall assignments before the beginning of the term to be attended.

Family Housing

There is a variety of University-owned and -operated buffet, one-, two-, and three-bedroom furnished and unfurnished apartments for student families. Write to the Family Housing Office, University of Colorado at Boulder, 1350 Twentieth Street, Boulder, Colorado 80302.

Off-Campus Housing

The UCSU Off-Campus Housing Office maintains listings of rooms, houses, and apartments for rent in the Boulder community and of students looking for roommates. Students are invited to come to the office, located in UMC 336, to look at these listings or obtain their own set of computerized rental listings (10¢/page), to use the free telephones, and to talk with counselors about the Boulder housing market.

In addition, counselors are available to advise students about leases, security deposits, effective roommating techniques, and ways to avoid landlord/tenant problems. The office provides Boulder maps (75¢) and free copies of the Boulder Tenants' Guide (an easy-tounderstand summary of tenants' rights and responsibilities), the Boulder Model Lease, the Roommate Survival Guide (a pamphlet describing communication techniques and other tips for successful roommating), and hand-outs on furniture rental, moving tips, grocery stores, local banking services, and other off-campus housing related matters.

Visit the Off-Campus Housing office Monday through Friday from 9:00 a.m. to 4:00 p.m. or call (303) 492-7053. During July and August, the office is also open on Saturdays from 10:00 a.m. to 2:00 p.m.

Freshman students are reminded that they must obtain written permission from the University Housing Department before obtaining off-campus accommodations.





Services and Facilities

Automobile Regulations

Students who wish to park a vehicle in a parking lot on campus must purchase a permit. These are available at Registration or from the Parking Management Office, 1511 University Avenue. Boulder Campus motor vehicle regulations are in effect in the summer. For further information, call the Parking Management Office, (303) 492-7384.

Career Services

Career Services offers career planning assistance, cooperative education opportunities, and placement services to CU-Boulder students.

Career Planning. Career planning services include career counseling, workshops on career topics, an extensive Career Resource Library, and referrals through the Alumni Career Network.

Cooperative Education/Internships. Cooperative Education/Internships works with students and employers to arrange supervised work experience relating to a student's major field of study.

Placement Services. Placement services include the annual hosting of over 350 employers on campus to interview graduating students, the weekly *Job Vacancy Bulletin*, referrals to employers through the computerized job match service, and credential file assistance to those applying to graduate/professional school or for teaching positions.

Career planning services are available to all University of Colorado, Boulder students. Clients of Cooperative Education and most placement services must be degree-seeking students or alumni. Fees are assessed for Cooperative Education and Placement services. Additional information may be obtained from Career Services, Willard Administrative Center, ground floor, or by calling (303) 492-6541.

Children's Center

The University Family Housing Children's Center at 2202 Arapahoe Avenue provides day care for the children of University Family Housing residents, University staff, University students, and others in the community, though Family Housing residents have first priority. The facility is state-licensed and has a full-time professional staff serving 60 children on a fullday, half-day, and hourly (by request) basis. A summer day camp is available for children from 6 to 10 years of age. Children two and one-half through six years of age (toilet trained only please) are eligible for day-care service. The Center is open five days a week, from 7:30 a.m. to 5:30 p.m. For information on services, schedules, and rates, call 492-6185.

Computing Facilities

Academic Computing Services (ACS) provides support for instructional and research programs through a Universitywide network of computing facilities. ACS resources include a Control Data Corporation Cyber 170/720, three Digital Equipment Corporation VAX computers (one 11/780 and two 11/750s), and computing sites across the campus that allow general access to batch, timesharing, and personal computer equipment, as well as access to computational facilities at other institutions. Interactive network access is also available through more than 50 dial-up ports. The software available includes programming languages such as FORTRAN, PASCAL, COBOL, and BASIC, as well as a library of mathematical and statistical packages and other applications programs. Academic Computing Services offers computing assistance through student and staff advisors, seminars and workshops, on-line documentation, and the ACS newsletter, *Digit.* In addition to the resources of ACS, a number of departments support extensive computing facilities for specialized research and instruction.

Counseling Services

Counseling Services has the responsibility for assisting students in the areas described below. These services are free to CU-Boulder students, except as noted.

Individual Counseling. Individual counseling services are offered to students who have concerns with their personal, social, or academic lives. These concerns may be discussed frankly and confidentially with the professional psychologists or counselors on staff.

Group Counseling. Group counseling is often one of the most effective approaches for working on personal problems. Throughout the year, free workshops are offered to help students gain skills in areas such as assertiveness training, test anxiety, career decision making, and social skills development.



Center for Educational and Career Transition (Women's Center).

The Center offers individual counseling, academic and job information, and testing services to University students, faculty, staff, or any individual who wishes to resume an interrupted academic program or to change or enrich a career.

Peer Counseling. Peer counselors (undergraduate paraprofessionals) are trained to provide academic assistance to students in the College of Arts and Sciences and to assist in various workshops.

Testing and Assessment. Achievement, interest, and personality tests are utilized as aids to the counseling available for students. All test batteries are interpreted for students by one of the Counseling Services staff.

Academic Skills Center. The Center helps students increase reading speed, improve comprehension, and learn effective study habits. A variety of courses and workshops is offered each term, and a reading specialist is available for individual assistance. The service is located in Willard Administrative Center 201, and the reading laboratory is on the lower level of Norlin Library. A nominal fee is charged for some workshops.

University Counseling Services Summer Group Program. Every summer University Counseling Services offers a number of free, noncredit group programs to students, faculty, and staff. The groups vary in orientation. addressing academic. career, social. or personal growth issues.

CU Opportunity Program at Boulder (CUOP)

The CU Opportunity Program (formerly EOP) provides minority and educationally or financially disadvantaged students with financial aid information; a comprehensive academic support program including intensive freshman courses. workshops, learning laboratories, and tutorial services; academic, personal, and career counseling; and recreational and cultural activities. Students from ethnic minority backgrounds (e.g., Asian American, Black, Chicano, American Indian), migrant backgrounds, and disadvantaged backgrounds are encouraged to apply for admission through CUOP.

In addition to its college student support activities, CUOP offers several precollegiate summer programs for the academic development of disadvantaged students. These include the Colorado Precollegiate Program, the Science and Self-Determination Upward Bound National Demonstration Project, and the American Indian Science Fairs Project.

Fiske Planetarium

Fiske Planetarium is one of the finest planatarium facilities in the world, equipped with a Zeiss VI star projector in a 65-foot diameter dome with 213 seats. It is used as a teaching tool in astronomy classes and by several University depart ments. The planetarium provides regular educational and public service programs on astronomy and space studies. It is also one site for part of the University's active program in space research.

Foreign Student and Scholar Office

The Foreign Student and Scholar Office located in the Environmental Design Building, is available to provide orientation and registration assistance to foreign students, to help them become acquainted with the campus and the comrnunity, and to offer information and guidance in all matters that are special to foreign students. Foreign students are encouraged to check in at the Foreign Student and Scholar Office before Registration and to utilize the services of the staff there as needed. During the summer, the office is open Monday through Friday from 9:00 a.m. to noon and 1:00 p.m. to 4:30 p.m.

Libraries

The University of Colorado Libraries consist of a central library (Norlin Library) and five branch libraries—Business, Music, Engineering, Math-Physics, and Earth Sciences. The School of Law also operates a library. The combined collections total over 1,900,000 volumes and more than 2,000,000 microforms, recordings, audiovisual materials, and maps. Approximately 19,000 periodical and serial titles are currently received. Norlin Library is a full regional depository for government publications. The libraries are fully staffed and open on a regular schedule during Summer Session.

Norlin Library hours during Summer Session are 7:00 a.m. to 10:00 p.m., Monday through Thursday; 7:00 a.m. to 5:00 p.m., Friday; 8:00 a.m. to 5:00 p.m., Saturday; and 1:00 p.m. to 10:00 p.m., Sunday.

Museum

The University of Colorado Museum is a primary resource for teaching and research through its collections in anthropology, botany, zoology, and geology. Because of its extensive program of exchanges of specimens and information, the Museum has an international reputation.

The exhibit halls, open daily to the student body and the general public, show informative and entertaining exhibits for study, recreation, and general education at all levels. The art gallery exhibits a changing view of ethnographic art.

The Museum may be visited free of charge from 9:00 a.m. to 5:00 p.m., Monday through Friday; from 9:00 a.m. to 4:00 p.m., Saturday; and from 10:00 a.m. to 4:00 p.m., Sunday.

Observatory

The Sommers-Bausch Observatory on the Boulder Campus is equipped with 18- and 24-inch-diameter reflecting telescopes and a variety of auxiliary equipment. The Department of Astrophysical, Planetary, and Atmospheric Sciences operates the observatory for astronomy courses and astronomical research.

The observatory is open to the public for viewing of planets, stars, and nebulae, as weather permits. There is no admission charge, but reservations are required, as space is limited. For further information, call (303) 492-8915.



Ombudsman Office

The Ombudsman Office provides an informal grievance procedure for those in the University community who have difficulty resolving conflicts with faculty, staff, or students. The office also offers an information and referral service, including information on University organizational structure, campus safety guidelines, and deadline dates. Anyone needing information about the University or aid in solving a problem can stop by UMC 328 or call (303) 492-5077.

Recreation Center

The Recreation Center offers the following facilities: swimming pools, ice rink, handball/racquetball courts, squash courts, a general gym for volleyball, badminton, fencing, and other activities, a fitness systems room with Cam II and Hydragym equipment, a free weight room, tennis courts, training room, and saunas. There are adjoining facilities, not part of the Recreation Center, but often available for recreational purposes that include an indoor running track, basketball gyms, and additional small gyms.

Any student who pays fees is automatically a member of the Recreation Center. Faculty, staff, alumni, affiliates, citizens, and daily guests are assessed user fees. For additional information on membership fees and other areas of the Recreation Center, call (303) 492-6561.

Free equipment may be checked out on a daily basis for badminton, racquetball, handball, squash, table tennis, basketball, tennis, baseball, football, rugby, soccer, water polo, horseshoes, track and field, hockey, and broomball. Ice skates and some outdoor camping equipment are available at a nominal rental fee.

The Recreation Center offers organized activities in:

Outdoor Programs. Outdoor program activities include technical rock climbing instruction, white water river rafting, wilderness backpacking trips, and nontechnical ascents of some of the highest peaks in Colorado. There is also an extensive variety of activities available in the winter. In addition to outdoor activities, educational seminars are offered on outdoor leadership, low impact camping, mountaineering equipment,





wilderness first aid, map and compass navigation, avalanche safety and forecasting, and nature interpretation. Outdoor equipment, including backpacks, sleeping bags, tents, and cross-country ski gear, is available for outdoor program functions. All outdoor program classes and trips are available to students and members at nominal rates. For further information regarding classes, trips, foes, or general information, call (303) 492-6080.

Intramurals. Loagues, tournaments, and special events are offered, including organized competition in tennis, handball, racquetball, squash, and other sports. Call (303) 492-7244 for further information.

Instruction. A variety of noncredit sports-oriented classes emphasizing participation, learning, and fun is available through the instruction program. Summer classes include aerobics, tennis, scuba, swimming, diving, windsurfing, and more. The Instruction Program phone number is (303) 492-5258.

Club Sports. There is a wide range of sports activities organized on the club sports level. Call the Club Sports Office. (303) 492-5471, for information on those olubs that are active during the summer months.

Services to Disabled Students

The Office of Services to Disabled Students (OSDS) provides special assistance in admission, registration, housing, financial aid, and counseling for disabled students. Modifications to educational, recreational, and housing facilities are being made to accommodate all students. Students who are permanently or temporarily disabled are served by the provision of on-campus transportation.

Attendant services are coordinated to assist severely physically disabled students. Mobility and orientation, access to a volunteer readers' pool, and special equipment are available for use by blind students. Interpreters for deaf students are provided. A program to support the academic work of students with learning disabilities has recently been developed; phone (303) 492-1591.

Student Health Service

The Wardenburg Student Health Service is a 22-bed hospital and outpatient clinic located on the Boulder Campus. The inpatient service and emergency room are closed during Summer Session and during semester broaks. Students needing



immediate care may utilize the walk-in clinic. Those wishing to schedule an appointment should call (303) 492-8321. Wardenburg's general information phononumber is (303) 492-5101.

During Summer Session, the outpatient clinic is open from 7:30 a.m. to 4:30 p.m., Monday through Friday, and 7:30 a.m. to 11:30 a.m. on Saturday. Semester break hours are 8:00 a.m. to 4:30 p.m., Monday through Friday, and 8:00 a.m. to noon on Saturday.

Student fees pay for unlimited physician visits. Ancillary services that are available for minimal charges include physical therapy, laboratory, and x-ray services.

The Apothecary, the Health Service's pharmacy, will fill prescriptions at reduced rates.

A health insurance plan is available to students (in addition to student fees). This plan supplements the services offered at Wardenburg by providing major medical hospitalization coverage to help students pay medical expenses.

University Memorial Center

The University Memorial Center (UMC) serves as the tocal point for campus nonacademic activities. Built as a memorial to those who died preserving our democratic freedoms and recently rededicated as a multicultural center, the UMC houses a reception desk that provides campus information; a games area featuring bowling, billiards, and an arcade; a photo lab; the Fine Arts Center with an art gallery, browsing room, and music listening rooms; the University Book Center; food service that includes a cateteria, grill, delicatessen, pizza parlor, vending area, Mexican cantina, and catering service with several private dining areas; a computerized ticket service; a copy center; and a variety of retail shops and services, including a travel agency, a flower shop, a record store. and banking facilities. The UMC also provides a conference center with special meating rooms; the Glenn Miller Ballroom; the Forum Room for lectures and movies; attractive lounges; and office space for the University of Colorado Student Union (student government), the Ombudsman, nonacademic room scheduling, KAIR, and numerous student organizations.



Veterans Office

The CU-Boulder Veterans Office assists eligible veterans and eligible dependents of veterans during their association with the University. Counseling and tutoring are available.

New and transfer students may visit or write the University Veterans Office stating their intent to enroll. If V.A. educational benefits have been used previously, it is essential to include the claim number. The V.A. requires that the student be enrolled for an approved degree objective. V.A. regulations now restrict independent study. Students should check with the V.A. office concerning benefits. If the degree-granting institution is not the University of Colorado, evidence from the other school should be submitted to verify that the courses taken during the summer will apply toward an approved dearee.

The University must enroll the veteran or eligible dependent with the V.A. Regional Office for the student to receive benefits. Promptness is imperative and a current local address is desirable. The V.A. now pays only after classes have been completed during each month. Financing should be planned accordingly.

Understanding the Schedule of Courses

Courses marked with the symbol 🛠 are special offerings in Summer Session 1985.

Courses offered through the Division of Continuing Education are announced at the end of departmental sections, as applicable.

At the top of each page are the following abbreviations:

Dept. No.—The department number is essentially for filling out course requests. Students should not confuse this with the major number.

Dept.—The department name abbreviated to a maximum of four spaces.

Crs. No.—The course number. Courses are numbered according to the following system: 100 and 200 levels (lower division), for freshmen and sophomores; 300 and 400 levels (upper division), primarily for juniors and seniors. Normally, courses numbered 500 to 800 are for graduate students only; see college and school sections for special provisions. Any exception to this system is explained in the course description.

Cr.—The number of semester hours of credit the course offers (3 means 3 semester hours; 2-4 indicates that credit is variable and students *must* indicate on course requests whether they want 2, 3, or 4 semester hours. Credits are

expressed in semester hours. One semester hour is the equivalent of 11/2 quarter hours.

Title of Course—An abbreviated description of the course.

- Term—A = First 5-week term
 - B = Second 5-week term
 - C = 8-week term
 - D = 10-week term
 - E and F = Intensives. Inclusive dates for each course noted in the Schedule of Courses.

Sec.—This is the section number and it is the same as the lecture number. When an L precedes the number (L004), it indicates a laboratory (lab) to be taken along with the lecture. When an R precedes the number (R010), it indicates a recitation (rec) to be taken along with the lecture. Some classes have all three: lecture, lab, and recitation.

Time—Meeting time of the class.

Days—Meeting days of the class (T is Tuesday and TH is Thursday).

Bidg.—The building abbreviation. See the list on the campus map.

Room-The room number.

Instructor—Instructor's name is printed when available.

24-Hour Time Clock

Application Instructions

Please follow instructions carefully Type or use ink and print legibly. Place an "X" in the appropriate boxes. Complete all applicable required information. No part of any previous record may be disregarded. Missing information (for example, social security number, accurate and complete information on the tuition classification section if you are claiming in-state tuition status, required signatures, etc.) will result in processing delays that could hinder your chances to be considered for admission. All incomplete applications will either be held until the necessary missing items are provided or be returned to you for completion.

Applications may be submitted for one term and one major only. If you wish to make a change, please notify the Office of Admissions in writing. Applications and credentials submitted for admission become the permanent property of the University.

Foreign students who have previously enrolled in a degree program at the University of Colorado, Boulder may use this application. Other foreign students must write the Office of Admissions, University of Colorado at Boulder, Regent Administrative Center 125, Campus Box 65, Boulder, Colorado 80309, for the appropriate application forms. Foreign students are considered to be those applicants who will be applying for or who already have a temporary visa. Note: Students who have established permanent resident status in the United States and have alien registration numbers are not considered foreign students and may apply to the University using this application form and instructions.

Students may not disregard any part of their previous educational background.

Failure to list and submit transcripts from all institutions previously attended may be cause for cancelling the admissions process, loss of transfer credit, rejection, or for dismissal.

If you are applying for financial aid and your student number is different from your social security number (see number 2 below), it is important that you notify the Office of Financial Aid of both numbers. Your financial aid application will be matched with your admission decision by your social security number. Use the instructions that correspond to the numbers on the front of the application form:

1. Full Legal Name.

Unless you request otherwise, CU will use the full legal name you give on this application for all of your CU records.

2. University Student Number.

New Student Social Security Number: Social security numbers are used for record keeping and identification purposes only. This number will be your student number.

Former/Continuing CU Student Number: You are a Former or Continuing CU student if you have ever attended any campus of the University as a graduate, undergraduate, or Special Student. If you attended CU beginning with Summer Session 1972 or any term thereafter, your CU student number is your social security number. If you attended CU before Summer 1972, your CU student number is a six-digit number preceded by three zeros (for example, 000-42-2525). If you do not remember your former six-digit number, please write the first three zeros and leave the rest blank.

6. Address to Which All Mailings Should Be Sent.

All application status and registration information will be sent to this address. It is imperative that this address be accurate. If this address changes, please notify the Office of Admissions immediately.

10. CU College or School and Major to Which You Are Applying.

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UNIVERSITY OF COLORADO RESIDENCE HALLS AGREEMENT - SUMMER 1985

GENERAL: This agreement and application for room and board, accompanied by a \$60 advance payment per individual, is required to reserve your accommodations. Send the application and advance payment to the Residence Halls Reservation Center, Hallett Hall 80. Boulder, Colorado 80310. All checks and money orders should be made payable to the University of Colorado Residence Halls. This application is for summer accommodations only.

NOTE. University regulations require that all freshmen live in the University residence halls for the summer term as well as the following academic year unless they are married or live with parents or relatives in the Boulder area and have permission to commute.

CANCELLATIONS: If a cancellation is received in the Residence Halls Reservation Center prior to two weeks before the beginning of the term or period for which the reservation is made, half the advance payment will be refunded. If a cancellation is received after two weeks prior to the beginning of the term, the entire advance payment will be forfeited.

UNIVERSITY LIABILITY: The University shall assume no responsibility for the theft, destruction, or loss of money, valuables, or other personal property belonging to, or in the custody of, the student for any cause whatsoever, whether such losses occur in the student's room, storage room, public area, elsewhere in the hall, or in baggage handling related to shipment or storage. Students are encouraged to carry their own personal property insurance.

WITHDRAWALS AND REFUNDS: If a resident withdraws from the University at the end of a term that is shorter than the term indicated on the front of this application, no liquidated damages will be charged, provided two-weeks' notice is given.

Residents who check out of the residence halls at any other time and for any other reason will be charged for the period of occupancy plus 10 days. There will be no refund for checkout during the last 10 days of the term. The period of occupancy is terminated only by formal checkout at the building office.

Freshmen may not move out of the residence halls during the term unless they withdraw from the University or are released by the Assistant Director of Housing, Hallett Hall 64.

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TERMINATION BY THE UNIVERSITY: Upon reasonable notice (normally 48 hours) the University reserves the right to terminate this Agreement for (1) failure of the student to make payment of charges promptly. (2) failure to comply with A Guide to Residence Hall Living or University of Colorado Student Conduct Policies and Standards which are by reference made a part of this Agreement (3) suspension from the University. (4) disciplinary action. (5) behavior which is incompatible with the maintenance of order and propriety in the residence halls. If this agreement is terminated by the University, the charge will be for the period of occupancy plus 10 days.
